

WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

Monday, March 3, 1941

Commonwealth of Massachusetts

Norfolk, ss.

To either Constable in the Town of Norfolk, in said County,

Greeting:

You are hereby required in the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts to notify and warn inhabitants of the Town of Norfolk, qualified to vote in Town affairs, to assemble in the Grange Hall on Monday, March 3, 1941, at 9 o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles, viz:

Henry D. Pond

Article 1. To choose by ballot the following Town Officers, viz: one Moderator for one year; three Selectmen, who shall act as Board of Public Welfare and Board of Health for one year; one Town Clerk, one Town Treasurer, one Collector of Taxes, one Tree Warden, three Auditors, two Constables, each for one year; one Assessor of Taxes; one Trustee of Public Library, one member of School Committee, each for three years.

Article 2. To hear and act on the report of the Town Officers.

Article 3. To grant and appropriate money for all necessary Town expenses, as follows, viz:

1. Schools.
2. Town Officers.
3. Public Library.
4. Memorial Day.
5. Electric Lights for the Town.
6. Bonds for Town Officers.
7. Interest.

8. Removal of Snow.
9. Public Welfare.
10. Roads.
11. Fire Department.
12. Law Enforcement.
13. Maintenance of Norfolk County Hospital.
14. General Expense.
15. Extermination of Gypsy Moth.
16. Soldiers' Relief.
17. Old Age Assistance.
18. Tree Trimming.
19. District Nurse.
20. W. P. A. Expenses.
21. Aid to Dependent Children.
22. To pay the salary of a clerk for the Selectmen.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning January 1, 1941, and to issue a note or notes therefor, payable within one year, and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with Section 17, Chapter 44, General Laws.

Article 5. To see if the Town will appropriate a sum of money for diphtheria immunization.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for Chapter 90 Road Work to be used with an allotment from the State and County or from either.

Article 7. To see if the Town will appropriate a sum of money for Band Concerts.

Article 8. To see if the Town will appropriate a sum of money to clear up tax titles.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to install a light at the residence of Henry Nemrow and appropriate money for the same.

Article 10. To see if the Town will appropriate \$63.20 to pay overdrawn accounts 1938 and 1939.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to transfer a sum of money from the Machinery Fund to the Machinery Maintenance Account.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to establish a reserve fund under Section 6, Chapter 40 of the General Laws, and appropriate a sum of money for the same.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Board of Selectmen and Departments under their jurisdiction to distribute equally the Town gas and oil and accessory business among the various dealers now doing business in the Town, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 14. To see if the Town will petition the Director of Accounts of the Department of Corporations and Taxation for the installation of an accounting system, in accordance with the General Laws, or take any action relative thereto.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to purchase a power sprayer for the Moth Department, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to maintain the municipal tennis courts, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to change the present system of Street Lighting known as Moonlight 1:00 A.M. schedule to Standard Midnight schedule, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 18. To see if the Town will pass a by-law to provide periodical audits of the Town's accounts annually under the supervision of the Director of Accounts of the Department of Corporations and Taxation in accordance with the provisions of Section 35, Chapter 44, General Laws, or to take any action relative thereto.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purchase of a piece of motor fire apparatus, of the pumper type and equipment, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 20. To see if the Town will accept as Town roads in the section of the Town known as Mirror Lake the following: Oak Road, approximately 300 feet, and Pine Road approximately 300 feet, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to install street lights on Mirrow Lake Avenue and Cedar Road, Norfolk, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to install a light on pole 7/16 between the residence of Frank Bartell and Carl Pearson, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 23. To see if the Town will choose any Committee or to hear or act on the report of any Committee or Town Officer or to instruct any Committee or Town Officer.

The polls shall be opened at 9:00 A.M. and shall be closed at 7:00 P.M.

Hereof, fail not, but make return of this warrant, with your doings thereon to the Town Clerk, on or before the hour of said meeting.

March 3, 1941

RECORDS OF ADJOURNED ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

March 17, 1941

Pursuant to the foregoing adjournment, the Inhabitants of Norfolk, qualified to vote in Town Affairs, met in the Grange Hall on Monday, March seventeenth, 1941. The meeting was called to order at 7:30 o'clock p. m. by the Moderator, Arthur D. Hill and the meeting proceeded as follows, viz:—

Article 2. Voted unanimously to accept the reports of the Town Officers as presented in the Town Reports.

Article 3. Voted unanimously to grant and appropriate the following money for the necessary Town expenses, viz:—

1. Schools, thirty one thousand, two hundred dollars.
2. Town Officers, two thousand, seven hundred dollars.
3. Public Library, four hundred nintey dollars, including dog tax receipts of three hundred forty dollars and forty cents.
4. Memorial Day, seventy five dollars.
5. Electric Lights, two thousand four dollars and seventy seven cents.
6. Bonds for Town Officers, one hundred twenty dollars.
7. Interest, one hundred fifty dollars.
8. Removal of Snow, two thousand two hundred fifty dollars.

9. Public Welfare, two thousand seven hundred fifty dollars.
10. Roads and Chapter 81, four thousand one hundred dollars.
11. Fire Department, two thousand five hundred dollars.
12. Law Enforcement, two thousand five hundred dollars.
13. Maintenance of Norfolk County Hospital, five hundred seventy eight dollars and sixty three cents.
14. General Expense, two thousand five hundred dollars.
15. Extermination of Gypsy Moth, six hundred sixty six dollars.
16. Soldiers' Relief, one hundred dollars.
17. Old Age Assistance, seven thousand dollars.
18. Tree trimming, three hundred dollars.
19. District Nurse, three hundred fifty dollars.
20. W. P. A. Expenses, two thousand dollars.
21. Aid to Dependent Children, one thousand seven hundred dollars.
22. Clerk's Salary (Clerk for Selectmen) six hundred dollars.

Article 4. Voted unanimously that the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, be and hereby is authorized to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning January 1, 1941 and to issue a note or notes therefor, payable within one year, and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with Section 17, Chapter 44 of the General Laws.

Article 5. Voted unanimously that the Town appropriate the sum of forty dollars for diphtheria immunization.

Article 6. Voted unanimously that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand dollars for Chapter 90 Road Work to be used with an allotment from the State and County or from either.

Article 7. Voted unanimously that the Town appropriate the sum of one hundred dollars for Band Concerts.

Article 8. Voted unanimously that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars to clear up tax titles.

Article 9. Voted unanimously that the matter be left in the hands of the Selectmen and that they make relocation of present lights instead of making new installations.

Article 10. Voted unanimously that the Town appropriate sixty three dollars and twenty cents to pay overdrawn accounts of 1938 and 1939.

Article 11. Voted unanimously that the Town transfer the sum of two thousand dollars from the Machinery Fund to the Machinery Maintenance Account.

Article 12. Voted unanimously that the Town appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars for a Reserve Fund, to be expended as authorized by Section 6, Chapter 40 of the General Laws and that the unexpended balance of this year be added to this Reserve Fund.

Article 13. Voted unanimously that the Selectmen be instructed to purchase gas, oil, and accessories where it is for the best interest of the Town.

Article 14. Voted unanimously no action be taken.

Article 15. Voted unanimously that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of nine hundred dollars to purchase a power sprayer for the Moth Department.

Article 16. Voted unanimously this be included in General Expense.

Article 17. Voted unanimously the Town change to the Standard Midnight schedule of Street Lighting.

Article 18. Voted unanimously no action be taken.

Article 19. Voted that the Town raise and appropriate three thousand five hundred dollars for the purchase of a piece of motor fire apparatus, of pumper type and equipment.

Article 20. Voted no action be taken.

Article 22. Voted no action be taken.

Article 22. Voted that this matter be left in the hands of the Selectmen and that they make relocation of present lights instead of making a new installation.

Article 23. Voted that the Town instruct the Advisory Board to have their report available to the voters of the Town at least forty-eight hours before the adjourned Annual Town Meeting.

Voted to request the Selectmen to remove Mr. Sharon's name from the Jury List.

Meeting adjourned at 9:02 o'clock p. m.

WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

Monday, March 2, 1942

To either Constable in the Town of Norfolk, in said County,

Greeting:

You are hereby required in the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts to notify and warn inhabitants of Norfolk, qualified to vote in town affairs, to assemble in the Grange Hall on Monday, March 2, 1942, at 9:00 o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles, viz:

Article 1. To choose by ballot the following Town Officers viz: one Moderator, for one year; three Selectmen, who shall act as Board of Public Welfare and Board of Health, for one year; one Town Clerk, one Town Treasurer, one Collector of Taxes, one Tree Warden, three Auditors, two Constables, each for one year; one Assessor of Taxes, one Trustee of Public Library, one School Committee, each for three years; one Trustee Josiah Ware fund for three years and one Assessor of Taxes for one year to fill vacancy.

Article 2. To hear and act on the report of the Town Officers.

Article 3. To grant and appropriate money for all necessary Town expenses, as follows, viz:

2. Town Officers.
3. Public Library.

4. Memorial Day.
5. Electric Lights for the Town.
6. Bonds for Town Officers.
7. Interest.
8. Removal of Snow.
9. Public Welfare.
10. Roads.
11. Fire Department.
12. Law Enforcement.
13. Maintenance of Norfolk County Hospital.
14. General Expense.
15. Extermination of Gypsy Moth.
16. Soldiers' Relief.
17. Old Age Assistance.
18. Tree Trimming.
19. District Nurse.
20. W. P. A. Expenses.
21. Aid to Dependent Children.
22. To pay the salary of a clerk for the Selectmen.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning January 1, 1942, and to issue a note or notes therefor, payable within one year, and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with Section 17, Chapter 44, General Laws.

Article 5. To see if the Town will appropriate a sum of money for diphtheria immunization.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for Chapter 90 Road Work to be used with an allotment from the State and County or from either.

Article 7. To see if the Town will appropriate a sum of money for Band Concerts.

Article 8. To see if the Town will appropriate a sum of money to clear up tax titles.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote and appropriate a sum of money to pay land damages on Main Street, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to transfer a sum of money from the Machinery Fund to the Machinery Maintenance Account.

Article 11. To see if the Town will appropriate a sum of money to purchase a Truck for the Highway Department.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purchase of an automobile of the convertible ambulance type to be used as a cruiser for the Police Department or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to appoint a committee to make a study relative to the practicability of a consolidated grade school by addition to the present Center School or by new construction; this Committee to be composed of all elective Town Officers and the Superintendent of Schools, the Principals of the Center School and the City Mills School, the Advisory Committee, the Fire Engineers, the President of the Norfolk Neighborly Club, and three members experienced in the building trades to be appointed by the Moderator. The Chairman pro tem of such Committee shall be the Town Moderator until the permanent officers of Chairman, Vice Chairman, and Secretary are chosen at the first official meeting by majority vote of those members attending. No meeting shall be official: without being called by the Chairman or by at least five (5) members of the Committee; without due notice as to time and place being posted at least two days before such meeting on the bulletin boards of the two Post Offices in the Town; and without a quorum of seven (7) members of the Committee present. This Committee may meet in a Town owned building as designated by the Selectmen, and registered voters of the Town may attend as observers any or all official meetings of the Committee and may address the chair. Said Committee shall be instructed to lay special stress on economy of building, selection of site, types of construction such that labor of citizens of

the Town may be used in great part thereof, feasibility of incorporating facilities for town meetings or other assemblages in the original building or by addition if later deemed necessary, and on possible utilization of funds or aid by any Federal or State program if such are available.

The majority report of this Committee and any minority reports, each representing the opinion of at least three (3) members of this Committee, shall be made a part of and printed in the Seventy-fourth Annual Town Report for the year ending December 31, 1943.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Board of Selectmen to petition the Massachusetts General Court for the passage of legislation authorizing the Commissioner of Correction and/or the Commissioner of Public Health to enter into a contract with the Town of Norfolk to permit the Town to connect to the State Prison Colony water system and/or the Pondville Hospital water system and buy water therefrom, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 15. To see if the Town will appropriate a sum of money to paint the Fire House, Roller and Tool Shed.

Article 16. To see if the Town will appropriate a sum of money for Home Defense or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to appoint a Planning Board.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to accept the provisions of Section 69, Chapter 152 of the General Laws, Ter. Ed., as amended by Chapter 435 of the Acts of the Year 1939, providing for the payment of Workmen's Compensation to injured employees of the Town.

Article 19. To see if the Town will choose any Committee or to hear or act on the report of any Committee or Town Officer or to instruct any Committee or Town Officer.

The polls shall be opened at 9:00 A. M. and shall be closed at 8:00 P. M.

Hereof, fail not, but make due return of this warrant, with your doings thereon to the Town Clerk, on or before the hour of said meeting.





REPORT OF THE SCHOOL COMMITTEE

To the citizens of Norfolk, the School Committee submits its annual report:

Regular meetings of the School Committee continue to be held at the Center School at 8 P. M. on the Thursday evening before the fourth Monday of each month, except during July and August.

The sagging condition of the Center School building has been remedied, and we are trying to keep the buildings in as good repair as possible. All of the buildings need painting on the outside, and we hope to do some of this painting in 1942.

Several more hand tools have been added to our Manual Training equipment and also a metal working lathe. A small start has been made in sheet metal work and we hope to do more of this work soon. The boys are much interested in their work and they are showing considerable aptitude, which should stand them in good stead later on in life.

The Domestic Science Room is taking on a cheerful, home-like appearance with new equipment as described in the Superintendent's report. It is enjoyed by the girls and is very useful as a meeting place for activities connected with the school.

The Committee would be very glad to have the town's people visit this room and note its improvements.

We feel that Norfolk now has as good Manual Training and Domestic Science rooms as any nearby town of its size.

We have estimated our Annual Budget for 1942 to be \$31,200, the same amount as in the past two years.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Committee of Norfolk:

The year 1941 has seen further consolidation of the gains recorded last year, with quiet and steady progress in all lines. We have continued to use the two school buildings as one school, with some grades wholly in one and some wholly in the other. Only one grade had to be divided—the fourth, part of whose pupils work with the third at the Center School and part with the fifth at City Mills; Miss Hall has the entire second grade at the latter school, while Miss Murphy and Mr. Washburn have the first and eighth as separate grades at the Center. This gives special attention to the start beginners make in school and to preparation for high school work in another town. Each of the other three teachers has two consecutive grades. Pupils in each room in the City Mills school are nearly of an age and they live together and play together happily. All Classes are nearly equalized in numbers. This arrangement requires little more transportation and has proved to be much more efficient than our former plan of two separate schools. We anticipate the time when all our classes will be in one consolidated school. This is our nearest approach to it.

There have been no changes in our teaching force and almost none save needed repairs in our buildings. The foundations of the Center School were strengthened as well as possible. An iron-working lathe has been added to the new equipment listed last year for the Industrial Arts shop. That work has increased in effectiveness, even though the room is still used but one day each week. Under Mr. Twombly's guidance the boys do much good work and quickly take the shop attitude. Beside articles they make for themselves they have floored the Household Arts room and done other work for the school. All this gives good opportunity for boys to discover whether they wish to work at some trade or industry, whether they should choose an industrial course at High school or perhaps go to the Trade school—perhaps even whether they would like to become teachers of Industrial Arts. The latter will soon be even more needed than the former if the pres-

ent shortage of teachers continues acute. The increasing demands of the war and of Industry will make constantly heavier demands for workers. Our boys at the Boston Trade School continue to do an improved quality of work, reflecting credit on themselves and on our school and town. One has won the privilege of entering on the aviation course—open only to the limited number which can be accommodated and those the ones who have done superior work for two years in either cabinet-making, machinery, or automobile courses. This school presents a wonderful opportunity to boys who are fitted for trade training.

Special attention has this year been given to development of the work in Household Arts. When, on account of her marriage, the resignation of Miss King was received her place was filled by choice of Mrs. Ingraham. The latter has had excellent basic training in Massachusetts State College, Simmons College, and Fitchburg Summer School, together with good practical experience in managing the home and in community service. Her report, quoted in full, gives evidence of her planning. For this work the room formerly used for woodworking has been refitted. It was re-floored by the boys; new windows and door, sheathing for walls and ceiling, and an oil-burning heater, and linoleum rugs have made it an attractive living room. To the two sewing machines already on hand (treadle and electric, there have been added electric range, electric refrigerator, enamel sink, set of utensils and dishes, work tables, long mirror, electric iron and board—complete equipment for cooking as well as sewing. The room is eagerly used also by Girl Scouts, who have provided curtains for the windows.

The work in Art and music progresses under the efficient administration of Mrs. Judd and Miss Goucher. In both lines pupils work with freedom and enjoyment. The former, in commenting on her work, mentions her objectives—development of appreciation of beauty, good taste, hand skill and the enrichment of other lines of school work. Miss Goucher summarizes her words thus:

“Music in the Norfolk schools is showing steady improvement. Our plan of teaching necessarily looks towards the future. We begin with the child in the very first grade and teach him to find joy in music through learning to participate in group singing.

"Under the system in use at the present time children, at the end of a complete eight-year cycle, will be able to read music at sight correctly and in harmonizing parts. This they will do independent of assistance from teacher or musical instrument."

Attention is also called to the efficient work of our health department. Reports of Physician and Nurse are appended.

At the moment of submitting this report our schools, in common with all our communities, are feeling the import of the World War. One year ago we were facing the uncertainties of the foreign war in which we seemed to be increasingly involved; today we are a part of the world-struggle, deeply concerned, determined to win, concerned with its full import. Our teachers appreciate and study together their responsibility for the security and care of their pupils, for their preparation to understand, share, and defend this land of freedom, and readiness to make and administer the peace which is to follow. They are working together as one school and they appreciate the confidence and support of our community. For them and to them, as to their pupils, to you, and to the community I return my sincere thanks for the support and cooperation so freely given.

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL, CENTER SCHOOL

To the Superintendent of Schools:

Once again the time for an annual school report is due. One can but regret that limitation is necessary in telling of the work being done. The schools function quietly and efficiently day by day. Much of a teacher's reward is realized in the growth and attainment of his pupils month by month.

I would not wish to single out the accomplishment or work of any individual teacher but rather commend all for their continued faithfulness and attention to common tasks. The group has been fortunate in the fact there have been no teacher changes this year.

It was a pleasure to learn that it would be possible for Mr. Twombly to continue his Norfolk assignment in Manual Training. The shop work has gone particularly well. The Home Economics work is marked by decided improvement. Mrs. Marion Ingraham has strengthened this department by personal effort and interest. The addition of individual Shop and Economics rooms to the school is proving helpful. Defense activities are being carried out according to the limited physical conditions of the school.

Each Home Economics group and Shop class is enrolled as a 4-H Club, interlocking the work of the school with that of club activity. These clubs and the Girl Scout Troop constitute a strong extra-curricula program.

School texts and supplies have been granted in the usual adequate manner. Special equipment has been purchased for the Home Economics department. A splendid set of interchangeable wall maps has been added to school room requirements, also, globes essential in the study of social subjects. In the special subject field, art and music have been given their place. The school glee club will broadcast over the radio this coming March.

The Class of 1940 presented the most successful of the series of annual school productions. The three-act comedy "Aunt Minnie from Minnesota," followed by a dance, proved a delightful community attraction. Class Day in June was arranged about the theme "America the Beautiful." The Class Day Exercises were held in the Administration Building at the Oval and drew a large and appreciative audience. The annual class trip to Boston was greatly enjoyed by the members of the graduating class. The annual trip of the City Mills school should also be mentioned. The Children's Museum and Franklin Park were visited this year. The help of Mr. Holmes in this is greatly appreciated.

The professional and ethical spirit existing in the cordial relations with Superintendent and School Committee make the teachers' lot in Norfolk a pleasant one. We look forward with pleasure to continued and faithful effort. This is the best possible manner in which to express appreciation to those whom we serve.

REPORT OF THE NORFOLK HOUSEHOLD ARTS TEACHER

To the Superintendent of Schools:

Every Friday, for the past half year, I have had the pleasure of teaching Household Arts in the Norfolk Center School to the girls in the sixth, seventh, and eighth grades. To see the transformation of the old "Tramp House," over the hill from the school, into a Household Arts room has been a joy. We are very comfortable there now and nearly fully equipped for sewing and cooking.

My general aim in teaching sewing to the sixth grade has been to develop ability in the girls to do the fundamental sewing and embroidery stitches without at the same time creating a dislike for the subject. With this thought in mind, I had them start with small articles of brightly colored materials, such as holders and stuffed animals. They are now working on needle cases and tea aprons. They have used both the treadle and electric sewing machines throughout this project.

My program with the seventh grade has been the construction of needed garments. The objectives with this class have been to develop some ability in the care and use of the sewing machine, the selection and use of the commercial pattern, the construction of garments and desirable working habits while sewing.

So far the nine girls in this class have completed among them four broomstick skirts, two tailored white blouses, two jumpers and one tea apron. Six of them are now working on jumpers, two on

blouses, one on shorts and the new member of the class has started an apron.

While waiting for cooking equipment, the eighth grade had some lessons in nutrition and also made some holders. They are now working on the 4H breakfast program and will go on to the lunch and supper unit before the year is over.

In teaching this cooking class I have been emphasizing good nutrition in the hope that twenty years from now children will not be found unfit on account of nutritional deficiencies.

Perhaps the main purpose in stressing good nutrition is to develop in the girls an interest in eating daily the proper foods in order to improve their general well-being and their efficiency.

Beside emphasizing good nutrition I am trying, as much as possible, to have the girls cook in family quantities so that when a girl finishes the eighth grade she should have the necessary confidence in her own ability as a cook to prepare a meal for the family successfully at a minimum of cost.

All my classes in Norfolk are 4H clubs. The charts, books and achievement requirements of the 4H organization are a great incentive to the girls.

To complete the work of the school year, we are planning two parties: first, a supper to be given by the girls to the Industrial Arts boys, who also belong to 4H clubs; and secondly, a style show for the parents.

I have had many helpful suggestions from some of the girls' mothers and from many of the girls themselves. I shall welcome any others, and will try to work them into my program.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL PHYSICIAN

To the Superintendent of Schools:

Following is a report of the school physician for the Town of Norfolk for the year 1941.

One hundred forty-eight pupils of the Center and City Mills Schools were examined. Twenty-six pupils were found with diseased tonsils and notices were sent their parents. Six students were given notices because of marked caries of the teeth. One student was given a notice because of infection of the throat.

During the year one student contracted infantile paralysis and the school children were examined by the school nurse and the school physician.

Several children suffered from scarlet fever and the school children had daily examinations.

Upon being investigated no adequate place to prepare and serve them was available; also, the lunches that the bus pupils bring were in nearly every instance found to be above average from a health standpoint—dark breads, fruit, and nutritive drinks being much in evidence. The milk served in the schools during the cold weather supplies a nourishing drink for the few who do not carry their own, and a good number buy the milk at school.

The dental clinic again proved its worth and the Local Chapter of the Red Cross is to be highly commended for helping in this work. We thank, also, the Local Seal Sale Committee for continuing to supply the funds for the milk.
