

WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

Monday, March 5, 1945

Commonwealth of Massachusetts

Norfolk, ss.

To either Constable in the Town of Norfolk, in said County,

Greetings:

You are hereby required in the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts to notify and warn inhabitants of Norfolk, qualified to vote in town affairs, to assemble in the Grange Hall on Monday, March 5, 1945 at 9:00 o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles, viz:

Article 1. To choose by ballot the following Town Officers viz: one Moderator, for one year; three Selectmen, who shall act as Board of Public Welfare and Board of Health, for one year; one Town Clerk, one Town Treasurer, one Collector of Taxes, one Tree Warden, three Auditors, two Constables, each for one year; one Assessor of Taxes, one Trustee of Public Library, one School Committee, each for three years; one Trustee Josiah Ware fund for three years.

Article 2. To hear and act on the report of the Town Officers.

Article 3. To grant and appropriate money for all necessary Town expenses, as follows, viz:

1. Schools.
2. Town Officers.
3. Public Library.
4. Memorial Day.
5. Electric Lights for the Town.
6. Bonds for Town Officers.

7. Interest.
8. Removal of Snow.
9. Public Welfare.
10. Roads.
11. Fire Department.
12. Law Enforcement.
13. Maintenance of Norfolk County Hospital.
14. General Expense.
15. Extermination of Gypsy Moth.
16. Soldiers' Relief.
17. Old Age Assistance.
18. Tree Trimming.
19. District Nurse.
20. For Rationing Board.
21. Aid to Dependent Children.
22. To pay the salary of a clerk for the Selectmen.
23. For Diphtheria Immunization.
24. For Reserve Fund.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning January 1, 1945, and to issue a note or notes therefor, payable within one year, and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with Section 17, Chapter 44, General Laws.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for Chapter 90 Road Work to be used with an allotment from the State and County or from either.

Article 6. To see if the Town will appropriate a sum of money to clear up tax titles.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to fix the salaries of the elected officers.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to transfer a sum of money from the Machinery Fund to the Machinery Maintenance Account.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the installation of approved Traffic Lights at the intersection of Main Street and Auto Route 115, or take any other action thereto.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, or transfer from available funds in the treasury, a sum of money for the purchase of War Bonds or other bonds that are legal investments for savings banks, in order to establish a post-war rehabilitation fund, in accordance with the provision of Chapter 5, Acts of 1943.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to transfer from any available funds now in the Treasury, a sum of money for the construction of a Town water system, as authorized by the legislature or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 12. To see if the Town will choose any Committee or to hear or act on the report of any Committee or Town Officer or to instruct any Committee or Town Officer.

The polls shall be opened at 9:00 A. M. and may be closed at 1:00 P. M.

Hereof, fail not, but make due return of this warrant with your doings thereon to the Town Clerk, on or before the hour of said meeting.

RECORD OF ANNUAL MEETING

March 5, 1945

Pursuant to the foregoing Warrant, the Inhabitants met in the Grange Hall on the first Monday of March, A.D. 1945 it being the fifth day of said month.

The meeting was called to order at 8:55 o'clock A. M. by the Moderator, William S. Gallagher, and the Warrant and Constable's return thereon were read by him.

The ballot box was examined and found to be empty. It registered 000.

RECORDS OF ADJOURNED ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

March 19, 1945

Pursuant to the foregoing adjournment the Inhabitants of Norfolk, qualified to vote in Town affairs, met in the Grange Hall on Monday, March 19th, 1945. The meeting was called to order at eight o'clock p. m. by the Moderator, Walter T. Holmes and the meeting proceeded as follows, viz:—

Article 2. Voted unanimously to accept the reports of the Town Officers as presented in the Town reports.

Voted to take up Article 11 before taking up Article 3.

Article 11. Voted by voice vote that the Town transfer the sum of fifteen thousand dollars from any available funds now in the Treasury, for the construction of a Town water system as authorized by House Bill 282 and the Board of Selectmen is authorized to act as Board of Water Commissioners until such time as a Board of Water Commissioners shall have been elected as approved by law.

Voted to dismiss this Article from the Warrant.

Article 3. Voted to take up each section of this Article separately.

Voted to grant and appropriate the following money for necessary Town expenses, viz:—

1. Schools, thirty-one thousand dollars. Unanimous vote.
2. Town Officers, four thousand dollars. Unanimous vote.
3. Public Library, two hundred fifty dollars plus dog tax receipts of three hundred forty eight dollars and of this amount one hundred thirty dollars is for the Librarian's salary. Unanimous vote.
4. Memorial Day, one hundred dollars. Unanimous vote.
5. Electric Lights for Town, one thousand nine hundred fifty four dollars and fifty three cents.

6. Bonds for Town Officers, ninety three dollars and seventy five cents. Unanimous vote.
7. Interest, two hundred dollars. Unanimous vote.
8. Removal of Snow, four thousand five hundred dollars. Unanimous vote.
9. Public Welfare, one thousand five hundred dollars. Unanimous vote.
10. Roads, three thousand seven hundred fifty dollars. Unanimous vote.
11. Fire Department, two thousand seven hundred fifty dollars. Unanimous vote.
12. Law Enforcement, two thousand three hundred dollars. Unanimous vote.
13. Maintenance of Norfolk County Hospital, three hundred ninety dollars and seventy eight cents. Unanimous vote.
14. General Expense, two thousand five hundred dollars. Unanimous vote.
15. Extermination of Gypsy Moth, six hundred fifty seven dollars. Unanimous vote.
16. Soldiers' Relief, one thousand dollars. Unanimous vote.
17. Old Age Assistance, eleven thousand dollars. Unanimous vote.
18. Tree Trimming, three hundred dollars. Unanimous vote.
19. District Nurse, three hundred fifty dollars. Unanimous vote.
20. For Rationing Board, two hundred dollars. Unanimous vote.
21. Aid to Dependent Children, one thousand five hundred dollars. Unanimous vote.
22. To pay the salary for a Clerk for the Selectmen, seven hundred dollars. Unanimous vote.
23. Diptheria Immunization, fifty dollars.
24. For reserve fund, two hundred fifty dollars. Unanimous vote.

It was moved and voted to reopen Sec. 22, to raise the amount and then voted to keep the appropriation as it was.

Article 4. Voted unanimously that the Town Treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen, be and hereby is authorized to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning January 1, 1945 and to issue a note or notes therefor, payable within one year, and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with Section 17, Chapter 4 of the General Laws.

Article 5. Voted unanimously that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand two hundred twenty five dollars for Chapter 90 Road Work to be used with an allotment from the State and County or from either.

Article 6. Voted unanimously that the Town appropriate the sum of one hundred fifty dollars to clear up tax titles.

Article 7. Voted unanimously that the Town fix the salaries of elected officers as they are at present.

Article 8. Voted unanimously that the town transfer three thousand dollars from the Machinery Fund to the Machinery Maintenance Fund.

Article 9. Voted unanimously that the Town appropriate seven hundred fifty dollars for the installation of traffic lights at the intersection of Main Street and auto Route 115.

Article 10. Voted no action be taken.

Article 12. No action was taken.

Meeting adjourned at 10 o'clock p. m.

To either Constable in the Town of Norfolk in said County.

Greetings:

You are hereby required in the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts to notify and warn the Inhabitants of Norfolk, qualified to vote in Town affairs to assemble in the Grange Hall on Friday, September 14, 1945 at 8 o'clock in the evening then and there to act on the following articles, viz:—

Article 1. To see if the Town will vote to establish a water supply system and authorize the Board of Selectmen to act as Water Commissioners until Water Commissioners are chosen.

Article 2. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer a sum of money for the purpose of establishing a water system, or take any action in relation thereto.

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to transfer a sum of money from available funds for the maintenance of the water department or take any action relative thereto.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to elect a Board of Water Commissioners at the annual Town meeting in 1946 said Board to consist of three members to be elected in the first instance one for one, one for two, and one for three years and thereafter to elect annually one Water Commissioner for three years.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to establish zoning by-laws in pursuance of Sections 25 to 30A of Chapter 40 of the General Laws of Massachusetts, or take any action relative thereto.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to amend the By-Laws of the Town of Norfolk by adding the following: Meetings of the Registrars of Voters for the Registration of Voters shall be held on the first Wednesday of each month at the Town Offices at 7:30 in the evening, excepting however those Wednesdays following or within the periods when registration of voters is prescribed by law.

RECORDS OF SPECIAL TOWN MEETING

September 14, 1945

Pursuant to the foregoing Warrant, the Inhabitants of Norfolk met in the Grange Hall on Friday evening, September 14th A. D. 1945.

The meeting was called to order by the Moderator, Walter T. Holmes, and the Warrant and Constable's return thereon were read by him.

The meeting proceeded as follows, viz:—

Article 1. Voted by a vote of one hundred thirty seven for and sixty three against (137 to 63) that the Town establish a water supply system and authorize the Board of Selectmen to act as Water Commissioners until Water Commissioners are chosen.

Article 2. Voted by a vote of one hundred thirty for to forty eight against (130 to 48) that the Town raise and appropriate thirty thousand dollars for the purpose of establishing a water system and to meet said appropriation the Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, be and hereby is authorized to borrow thirty thousand dollars and to issue bonds or notes of the Town therefor, due and payable in not more than twenty years in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 44 of the General Laws.

Article 3. Voted that the Town transfer the sum of fifteen thousand dollars from any available funds for the maintenance of the Water Department.

Article 4. Voted to dismiss this Article from the Warrant.

Article 5. Voted to establish Zoning By-Laws in pursuance of Sections 25 to 30A of Chapter 40 of the General Laws of Massachusetts.

Article 6. Voted to dismiss this Article from the Warrant.

Article 7. Under this Article no action was taken.

Meeting adjourned and Warrant dismissed.

WATER DEPARTMENT

Report of the acting Water Commissioners of the Town of Norfolk, for the year ending December 31, 1945

The Water Commission was established by a vote of the Town meeting of March 19, 1945, and it was further confirmed by a vote of a Special Town Meeting, held on September 14, 1945, directing the Board of Selectmen, to act as Water Commissioners, until such time as the Town shall elect Water Commissioners.

The sum of \$15,000.00 was transferred from the general balance in the Town Treasury to the Water Department, also the sum of \$30,000.00 was voted to carry on the extension of the original layout of the system.

Bids were advertised, for the purchase of water pipe of various sizes and the successful bidder was the Keasby Matison Co. of Ambler, Pa.

Bids were advertised for the excavation of the pipe trenches and the successful bidder was the Hancock Construction Co. of Medfield, Mass.

Arrangements were entered into with The Commonwealth of Massachusetts Department of Correction, whereby the Town could purchase water from the State Prison Colony, with the Town taking delivery of the water at the entrance to the Colony. The Committee who had the pleasure of representing the Town in this matter, received every consideration possible from Mr. Doyle of the Department of Correction, in bringing about a satisfactory agreement on price to be paid the Commonwealth for the Water used by the Town.

The committee did not have easy going in securing the necessary materials to permit the work to start. For the heavy castings, it was necessary to place the orders several times before they finally came through, owing to labor troubles incurred by the manufacturers. Work was actually started as of November 12, and for a few days it looked as though the work would get through to Mann's corner before the freeze-up took place. Two weeks of real rain so saturated the ground that in some cases it was necessary to open the trench to the width of ten feet at the top to get fifteen inches at the bottom, six feet

below. The department did get 546 linear feet of the 10 inch main laid before it was decided to stop the work until spring.

Superintendent Callahan of the Street Department took over the work of laying the water mains and house services, though the water mains had not reached any of the homes on Main Street. A good number of the owners had dug the trenches from their homes to the street edges. To those who had done this work, the service pipes were laid so that these trenches could be backed filled.

A great deal of credit goes to Mr. Callahan for his interest shown in the water works. He spent many hours at his own expense going to other towns, where this work was going on, finding the easy way to do the hard things best.

All of the large pipe is now on location also the fittings for same. The work will be resumed as soon as weather conditions permit.

ZONING BY-LAWS OF THE TOWN OF NORFOLK

Unanimously voted at Special Town Meeting held on
September 14, 1945

SECTION 1.

In pursuance of the authority conferred by Sections 25 to 39A, inclusive of Chapter 40 of the General Laws (Ter. Ed.) and for the purpose of promoting the health, safety, convenience, morals or welfare of the inhabitants of Norfolk by lessening congestion in the streets; securing safety from fires, panic or other dangers; providing adequate light and air; preventing the overcrowding of land, and with a view to encouraging the most appropriate use of land; avoiding undue congestion of population; facilitating the adequate provision of transportation, water, sewerage, schools, parks and other public requirements; and by other means in accordance with a comprehensive plan now, therefore The ByLaws of the Town of Norfolk are hereby amended by adding the following:

Definitions

A. "Lot"—a lot is a parcel of land occupied or intended to be occupied by one building or use, with its accessories, and including the open spaces accessory to it, which is defined in a deed or plan recorded with Norfolk Deeds or Registered with the Norfolk Registry District. No land which is within the boundaries of a street, accepted, proposed, or dedicated, shall be included in determining lot areas.

B. "Erected"—shall include altered, rebuilt, remodelled or moved.

C. "Frontage"—is that distance between the side lines of a lot, measured along the set-back established in Section, on corner lots the owner may elect on which street the same shall front.

SECTION 2

For the purpose of general designation only, the Districts may be named as follows:

1. Residential: Business Districts at or near the following: Route 1A; Main Street; at or near the Norfolk Depot on Rockwood Road to the corner of Boardman Street and Rockwood Road.

1. Residential: All land in Norfolk not set off and included in a Business or Industrial District.

2. Business: Business Districts at or near the following: Route 1A; Main Street; at or near the Norfolk Depot on Rockwood Road to the corner of Boardman Street and Rockwood Road.

3. Industrial: Main Street; Route 1A;

a. A parcel of land bounded Southerly by Miller Street 500 feet Easterly by Myrtle Street, 300 feet Northerly by a line parallel with the Southerly boundary and 300 feet therefrom Westerly by a line parallel with the Easterly line and 500 feet therefrom.

b. A parcel of land on the Easterly side of Myrtle Street containing .807 acres as shown on plan of land belonging to Mrs. J. B. Anthony recorded with Norfolk Deeds 1106 page 392 and described in metes and bounds by deed recorded with Norfolk Deeds Book 1681 page 253.

SECTION 3

Use regulations

In a residential district no building shall be erected which is designed or intended to be used for mercantile mechanical, manufacturing or other commercial use on land situated in a residential district, except as hereinafter provided.

1. Permitted uses.

The following are permitted in a residential district: private dwelling house; municipal, educational, religious uses, agricultural, greenhouse or nursery including the sale of produce similar to that raised on the premises; poultry or stock raising; telephone exchange; ice storage or harvest; licensed inns; cemetery; private club not conducted for profit; Accessory use on the same lot with and customarily incident to any of the above permitted uses and not detrimental to a residential neighborhood. Any of the following uses shall be considered "accessory use";

1. The renting of rooms to not more than 4 persons.
2. Furnishing table board to not more than 5 persons.
3. Garage for not more than 3 automobiles
4. Storage of 1 commercial vehicle (except from vehicles).

Any of the following uses provided the use is not injurious, noxious or offensive to the neighborhood and only if authorized by the Board of Appeals:

Aviation Field. Fur Farm. Riding Stable. Stone Quarry.
Soil, loam sod, sand or gravel removal.

Signs.

1. Real estate sign advertising rental, lease or sale of the premises and not exceeding 12 sq. ft. in area.

2. Sign or bulletin board incidental to a permitted use and not exceeding 12 sq. ft. in area unless authorized by the Board of Appeals, and in no case to exceed 16 sq. ft. in area.

3. Sign advertising authorized accessory use and not exceeding 1 sq. ft.

EXCEPTION

The Board of Appeals may authorize the conversion of a single family dwelling, in existence at the time of the adoption of this By-Law, to accommodate two families.

SECTION 4

Business District Uses

In a Business District no building shall be erected and no building or premises shall be used for any purpose injurious, noxious or offensive to a neighborhood by reason of the emission of odor, fumes, dust, smoke vibration noise or other cause nor for any purpose except;

1. Any use permitted in residential district.
1. Hotel or lodging house. Restaurants.
3. Filling station garage, or storage of automobiles.
4. Municipal Use.
5. Newspaper or job printing.
6. Office or bank.
7. Retail or wholesale stores or any and all establishments wherein goods and services, or either of them, are sold, rented or offered directly to the consumer, customer or other patron.
8. Tailor shops, plumbing and heating establishments, place of amusement or assembly, trailer or overnight camps, barber shops, bakery.
9. Bowling alley paint shop, beauty parlor

SECTION 5

Industrial District Uses.

In an Industrial District no building shall be erected and no building shall be used for any purpose injurious, noxious or offensive to a neighborhood by reason of the emission of odor, fumes, dust, smoke, noise or other cause, vibration, industrial waste except:

1. Any use permitted in Sections 3 and 4.
2. Manufacturing, employing unobjectionable motive power, utilizing hand labor or quiet machinery and processes, if authorized by the Board of Appeals.

SECTION 6

Non-Conforming Uses

1. Continuation of non-conforming uses. Any lawful building or use of a building or premises or part thereof existing at the time

this By-Law or any amendment thereto is adopted may be continued although such building or use does not conform to the provisions thereof and such building or use may on the approval of the Board of Appeals be extended throughout such premises, provided such use has not been discontinued for a period of one year.

2. **Change of non-conforming uses.** The Board of Appeals may permit any non-conforming use to be changed to any specified use not more detrimental or objectionable to a neighborhood.

3. **Limitation of restoration.** No non-conforming building which has been damaged by fire or other causes to the extent of more than 80% of its assessed value shall be repaired or rebuilt except in conformity with this By-Law unless the Board of Appeals so authorizes.

SECTION 7

HEIGHT REGULATIONS

RESIDENCE DISTRICTS

(a) The limit of height of all buildings in all residence districts shall be two and one-half stories, not to exceed thirty-five feet.

(b) The limitations of height in feet shall not apply to chimneys, ventilators, skylights, tanks, bulkheads, pent-houses and other necessary features usually carried above roofs, nor to towers or spires of churches and other buildings if such features are in no way used for living purposes.

BUSINESS AND INDUSTRIAL DISTRICTS

The limit of height in business and industrial districts shall be two and one-half stories, not to exceed thirty-five feet.

SECTION 8

AREA REGULATIONS

In residence districts as provided in Section 3 land laid out after the adoption of this By-Law shall provide for each dwelling a minimum frontage of one hundred feet and a minimum lot area of ten thousand square feet. Lots shown on any plan duly recorded by deed or plan at the time this By-Law is adopted may be used.

SECTION 9

PERCENTAGE OF LOT COVERED

The percentage of lot which may be covered by any building used for dwelling purposes shall in no instance exceed the following maximum provisions:

(a) One-family: 25 percent. And no dwelling shall be erected within twenty-five feet of the side line of any street, nor within ten feet of a side lot line; nor within twenty-five feet of any rear lot line.

(b) In Business and Industrial districts no buildings shall be erected so that it covers more than 70 percent of the lot.

SECTION 10

ADMINISTRATION

Inspector of Buildings:

1. The Board of Selectmen, forthwith upon the adoption of this By-Law shall appoint some suitable person to be Inspector of Buildings. Such appointee shall hold office at the pleasure of the Board of Selectmen, and until his successor is appointed and accepts office.

2. The Inspector of Buildings shall enforce the provisions of this By-Law and exercise the powers and duties as provided in Section 29 of Chapter 40 of the General Laws (Ter. Ed.) as amended.

3. All applications for building permits shall be in writing and shall be accompanied by a plan drawn to a scale and showing the size and dimensions of the lot or lots to be built upon, the streets, and other premises that it abuts, the size and location of the buildings to be erected or altered. The application shall set forth the use or uses proposed or intended and such other information as requested by the Inspector of Buildings.

1. **Certification of Occupancy.** No premises or buildings or part thereof hereafter erected or altered wholly or partly, in use or structure, or the open spaces pertaining to which are in any way reduced, shall be used until the Inspector of Buildings shall have certified on the building permit, or, in case no permit is issued, shall have issued a certificate of occupancy specifying the use to which the premises or the building upon being sufficiently completed to comply with the provisions and regulations relating thereto may be put.

2. **Board of Appeals** Within 30 days after the adoption of this By-Law, the Board of Selectmen shall appoint a Board of Appeals of five members for terms of such length and so arranged that the term of one appointee will expire each year, and two associate members appointed in like manner, which shall act on all matters within its jurisdiction under this By-Law in the manner prescribed in Section 30 of Chapter 40 of the General Laws, as amended, and subject always to the rule that it shall give due consideration to promoting public health, safety, convenience and welfare, encouraging the most appropriate use of land and conserving property value that it shall permit no building or use injurious, noxious, offensive or detrimental to a

neighborhood, and that it shall prescribe appropriate conditions and safeguards in each case.

3. **Other Regulations.** This By-Law shall not interfere with or annul any by-law, rule, regulation or permit, provided that, unless specifically excepted, where this By-Law is more stringent it shall control.

4. **Validity.** The invalidity of any section of provision of this By-Law shall not invalidate any section or provision hereof.

14. General Expense.
15. Extermination of Gypsy Moth.
16. Soldiers' Relief.
17. Old Age Assistance.
18. Tree Trimming.
19. District Nurse.
20. Aid to Dependent Children.
21. To pay the salary of a clerk for the Selectmen.
22. For Diphtheria Immunization.
23. For Reserve Fund.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning January 1, 1946, and to issue a note or notes therefor, payable within one year, and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with Section 17, Chapter 44, General Laws.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for Chapter 90 Maintenance to be used with an allotment from the State and County or from either.

Article 6 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for Chapter 90 Construction to be used with an allotment from the State and County or from either.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to fix the salaries of the elected officers.

Article 8. To see if the Town will appropriate a sum of money to clear up tax titles.

Article 9. To see if the Town will appropriate a sum of money to provide quarters for the American Legion Post #335.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to accept Chapter 723, Acts of 1945, of the General Laws viz: Act authorizing the establish-

ment and maintenance of a Municipal Department for furnishing information and advice and assistance to Veterans of World War II or other veterans.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$4,400.00 from the Federal Works Agency, to defray engineering expense for future extension of the Town Water System, or take any action in relation thereto.

Article 12. To see if the Town will transfer the sum of \$4,400.00 of Federal Funds to the Water Department to expend as directed by the Federal Works Agency.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum of money for the purchase of a Police Car, or take any action in relation thereto.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to accept Chapter 391 Acts of 1923 viz: Water rates and charges not paid within sixty (60) days shall become liens on the property.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to transfer the unexpended balance of the original \$15,000.00 Water appropriation from the General Fund back to the Water Department, for use in the original construction program.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum of money for the installation of a Street Light at the residence of A. Waitkevich on Campbell Street or take any action in relation thereto.

Article 23. To see if the Town will choose any Committee or to hear or act on the report of any Committee or Town Officer or to instruct any Committee or Town Officer.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL COMMITTEE

To the citizens of Norfolk the School Committee submits its Annual Report:

Regular meetings of the School Committee continue to be held at the Center School at 7:30 P. M. on the Thursday evening before the fourth Monday of each month, except during July and August. Special meetings are also held when the need arises.

Norfolk has the smallest number of pupils in the Walpole High School for several years, due to many existing conditions, but in September 1946, there will be an increase of about twelve or thirteen students, and the following year there will be another increase, as the Norfolk seventh grade is large in numbers now.

We have reason to feel proud of the fine work many of our boys and girls are doing in High School, which we feel shows the good training they are receiving in our Norfolk Schools in their preparation for future work.

Once again two graduates of Norfolk Center School and Walpole High School—Eunice Demerritt and Adelaide Washburn—were awarded the Fales Scholarship in December, on the basis of character, ability, and scholarship. Both of these graduates are now attending college.

The Norfolk Neighborly Club is to be commended for the establishment of a yearly award to the Norfolk student in Walpole High School who attains the highest scholastic standing for the four years of attendance. In 1945 this award was presented to Miss Adelaide Washburn.

The Norfolk Teacher's Club has planned an award for the highest ranking pupil in the Norfolk eighth grade, and the Norfolk Men's Club has proposed an award of some sort, and are contemplating furnishing an entertainment for pupils in the schools at some future date.

The year of 1945 has been one of the most successful years the schools of Norfolk have ever enjoyed. There has been very little lost time due to weather conditions or sickness.

We have been handicapped by the inability at times to keep up our teaching staff, although our superintendent has performed yeoman's service in keeping us supplied. The pupils of both the Center and City Mills Schools are doing good work, and promise to arrive at High School as well or perhaps better prepared than in previous years.

We are pleased to announce that Mr. Eaton has been able to procure for us a new Music Supervisor who seems to be outstanding, and we hope to be able to provide those pupils who wish it, instrumental instruction.

No Art Teacher has been available as yet, but we hope to be able to find one by September. In the meantime our teachers are doing very creditable work in carrying along the art studies.

Our school supplies are adequate although we have not been able to get all the needed books because they are not obtainable at present.

The Home Economics classes are progressing very satisfactorily as are also the Manual Training classes. We have been given to understand that Mr. Roscoe Twombly, the well liked and successful Manual Training teacher, who left us to go into the armed forces, will be with us again in September.

A new sound movie projector, a music recorder, and an amplifier have been recently added to our school equipment, and we are now on an equal footing with the other towns of our Union. Our pupils enjoy these new things very much, and we are pleased with the beneficial results noted so far. The Manual Training room has been able to provide the necessary tables for the above mentioned apparatus.

The repairs made during the year have been rather extensive and also expensive. Half of the roof of the Center School had to be re-shingled and a new waterproof floor laid on the tower.

Storm windows have been put on both the Center and City Mills Schools. An oil burning system had to be installed in the boiler at the Center School because of our inability to get coal enough to keep operating. This is very satisfactory, economical, much cleaner, and it allows us much needed storage space.

A tile floor has been laid in the Home Economics building which is more sanitary and durable, as well as better looking.

At the City Mills School we were compelled to install a new modern toilet system, also a larger pump and tanks to care for the water supply, and a supplementary electrical heating arrangement to keep the toilet rooms from freezing in extreme cold weather.

We are sorry that it is costing the town so much for repairs, but the expense of keeping these old buildings in usable condition will not end, and the money spent would go far towards maintaining an up to date building, such as we planned several years ago, and which was rejected by the town's people at that time.

The "No School" whistle will be blown at 7:15 A. M. for High School pupils and at 7:45 A. M. for Norfolk pupils. "No School" will be broadcast over the Radio Station W.B.Z. instead of over W.N.A.C. as in previous years.

We are fortunate in having such a loyal and competent teaching staff who are able to so thoroughly prepare our pupils, considering some handicaps they are laboring under.

We wish to take this opportunity to thank the town's people, our teachers, principals, and the Superintendent for their cooperation and helpful support.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENTS OF SCHOOLS

To the School Committee of the Town of Norfolk:

I hereby submit my third annual report as Superintendent of Schools for the year ending December 31, 1945. Following, there are several reports from the various school departments which will explain in detail the work accomplished in the various fields.

The Norfolk Elementary School Reading Program

All of us who work with the students in the elementary school feel that the reading program is of the greatest importance. In every group of children entering the first grade, there are some who lack maturity sufficient for immediate success in learning to read. Others of the group are ready to read, and some are able to read quite well when they arrive.

It is our hope that a definite program can be worked out so that every child will be able to have the proper reading instruction. It is very difficult for one teacher to handle from 35 to 40 pupils of about seven years of age, and teach them reading when there are four distinct levels of reading ability in the class.

In a recent issue of the Massachusetts Educational News, organ of the Department of Education, the features of an adequate reading program for elementary grades are outlined. Some of the points follow:

1. Proper provision for reading readiness training.
2. A well organized reading system. (At Norfolk we use the Elson-Gray and Gates Reading Systems).
3. Strict and careful attention to every child's progress, according to individual ability in:
 - a. Adequate sight vocabulary.
 - b. Independence in work recognition.
 - c. Ability to get meaning from material read.
4. Oral reading taught for its own values.
5. A testing program. (There is a need for a testing program in the Norfolk Schools. There is a final test made in reading for grades 3, 4, 5, and 6. There should be a place for an intelligence test, a reading readiness test, and tests insuring the development and maintenance of reading scales).

6. Understanding the varied aims, possibilities, and methods of reading.
7. Provision for individual variation within each grade. Tests show that the average grade has a span of 4 or 5 grades in reading ability. Children should read what they can read, hence much reading material should be supplied.
8. Special provision for seriously retarded. (In Norfolk there is a need for a special helping teacher for some students who are very much retarded).
9. A large, varied, and attractive assortment of books for supplementary reading. (We need extra reading books that are clean and inviting, story and picture books, and books that supplement units being carried on by the children. Now that the war has ended books will be available).
10. Reading in an integrated program.

All of us do hope that a satisfactory and efficient reading program can be developed, with the means available, to produce better reading in the Norfolk Schools. Reading is very important, and I wish to repeat what was said in the report of 1943: "Reading is the most important subject in the grade school work, as all other school work is dependent upon the ability to read for meaning in other textbooks."

Training in Service for Norfolk Teachers

Last spring, in connection with the Medway School Department and the School Departments of Millis, Westwood, and Medfield, a series of lectures on Intercultural Relationships was given. This was in keeping with the general program of the Governor's Committee for the promotion of a better understanding of religious and racial tolerance.

The viewpoints of the three major faiths, Protestantism, Catholicism, and Hebrewism were presented by leaders of the three faiths, namely, President Everett Herrick of the Andover-Newton Theological School, Father Michael J. Ahern of Weston College, and Rabbi Levi A. Olan, of Worcester, Massachusetts. The course was completed by Miss Doris Boyd of the Chelsea School Department, a practical teacher, who showed us how to put the material into everyday classroom use.

This fall, in keeping with the principle of In Service Training, arrangements were made with the Boston University School of Edu-

education, for a course entitled "The Elementary School", which elementary teachers of Norfolk are attending for 15 weeks. This is a practical course dealing with every day teaching procedures in the elementary school. There are several instructors who have stressed more particularly the fields of reading, social study, geography, the consideration of teaching units, and mental and physical health of the school child.

College credit is granted for this course, and many of our teachers may continue to take other courses as they may be offered, and in the near future receive a degree from Boston University. It is the hope of the School Department that from this in-service training the work of the teachers in the classroom will be improved, thus benefitting the children of the school.

The Teacher Situation in the State at Large

For three years previous to last September, there was a distinct scarcity of high school teachers. The lack of teachers at this level was caused by several reasons; namely, the drafting of men teachers, the enlistment of women teachers, the higher wages offered by defense plants, and the marriage and moving away of other teachers.

However, with the close of the war, men from industry and the armed forces wish to return to public school teaching. Others, who had no chance to teach, but had graduated from college and are now returning and are looking for teaching positions. It can definitely be said that the conditions on the high school level are improved, and more men are available now than at any time during the last four years.

In the elementary field, the situation is acute. During the early war years, many former married teachers returned to the elementary classrooms. We are losing elementary teachers for several reasons: More attractive positions in their home town or city, better paying positions in larger towns and cities, and the return of a soldier who has married an elementary teacher causes the loss of this teacher when it is impossible to find a home in our community. Girls, rather than entering the Teachers' Colleges during the war years, took good paying positions in offices and defense plants; therefore, there are very few replacements graduating from the State Teachers' Colleges, and states as far away as Oregon are bidding for our Teachers' College graduates.

Here, at Norfolk, we should feel very happy to think that in spite of the teacher shortage, we have been able to carry on with a rather high standard of teaching in spite of a state-wide teacher shortage. With the coming of another year and with the possible loss of teachers in the elementary schools, the School Department wonders how replacements can be made.

Health Examinations and Safety Education

At a recent conference of Superintendents of Schools and members from the Department of Public Health, the matter of physical examinations was discussed seriously. It was the consensus of opinion that physical examinations should be long enough to give a definite answer to the pupil's physical needs, that they should be given in the presence of the parents, and a discussion should take place between the school doctor and the parents, to discuss the corrective steps necessary. It was also thought that a thorough physical examination occasionally was of more importance than an examination every year.

We hope in the future that the parents will be closer to the school health department in connection with the physical examination.

There is great need for safety education in all schools. In Norfolk, we have been fortunate in having close cooperation with the Registry of Motor Vehicles, which this fall gave an illustrated talk on the hazards of the highway. The teachers in all the grades have emphasized safety education—automobile, fire, swimming, etc. We do hope that the parents will cooperate with us in bringing home to the pupils the need of care in walking to and from school, or to and from other homes or stores.

Conclusion

May I call your attention to the excellent work of the members of the School Committee, who give much of their time in the best interests of the school children of Norfolk. The principals and teachers of Norfolk too, do more than is expected. They help with Girl Scouts outings, trips, etc. The teachers help the pupils with their projects while at the Norfolk Schools, and continue their interest and help until their education is completed at Walpole High School, or at some College. As Superintendent of Schools, I appreciate this interest and good work. I wish to thank the Committee, Principals, and Teachers, and all other employees of the School Department for their help in making 1945 a successful school year at Norfolk.

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL — CENTER SCHOOL

Mr. E. Perley Eaton, Superintendent,

My Dear Mr. Eaton:

Once again it is a pleasure rather than a duty to report the harmonious relations existing between School Committee Members, the Superintendent of Schools, and the Teaching Staff. Given such conditions there could be but one result, a year of satisfactory progress and educational attainment.

Temporary circumstances have affected only the special teacher group and the return to pre-war conditions will soon remedy this. Mrs. Mabel Greeley now instructs in Home Economics as a result of the resignation of Mrs. Priscilla Morton. Katheryn Donati Clark, teacher of Grades III and IV, left in the fall and was replaced by Mrs. Frances Currier, also a graduate of Bridgewater Teachers College.

The Class Day Exercises of the Class of 1945 were well attended. The citizens of the town look forward yearly to this event, there being no local high school to afford this feature of justifiable community pride.

The Norfolk Neighborly Club for the first time presented a prize of twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) to the Norfolk member of the Senior Class of Walpole High School receiving the highest scholarship grades for the four year course. The award this year went to Adelaide Washburn, a graduate of the Center School, Class of 1941.

It has been brought to the attention of the principal that the Norfolk Teachers' Club and the Norfolk Men's Club plan to give recognition to the Center School graduates at the forthcoming Class Day Exercises in June. These gestures of community interest are highly gratifying.

Superintendent Eaton has arranged for a Harvard-Boston University Extension Course of fifteen weeks duration, to be given upon Tuesday afternoons in the Medfield High School building. This is a "refresher course" open to the teachers of Medfield, Millis, Norfolk and Westwood. Three of the Center School teachers from the Norfolk group have taken advantage of this professional opportunity.

The most important matter to be covered in this report is the urgent need of a new consolidated school in Norfolk. It should be constructed to include Grades I through IX.

Insofar as possible the School Committee and Superintendent have covered and remedied the multiple defects of existing physical conditions of the Center School. Notwithstanding, the word menace is none too strong a word to describe conditions still in evidence. It is a fire trap and completely out-moded.

In the upper grades it is no longer possible to conduct the Social and General Science subjects as they should be taught, due to the inadequate provisions of space and physical equipment. For the social, dramatic and extra curricular activities an assembly hall is imperative. I would be negligent in my responsibility as a school principal if I failed to call attention to these things.

In behalf of the teachers I desire to express appreciation of the methods employed in the supervision of our work by the Superintendent, and the freedom granted us relative to instruction in the class room. This explains why teachers enjoy working in the Norfolk Schools and why they are contented to remain here.

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL — CITY MILLS SCHOOL

I herewith submit the following report of the City Mills School.

With no change in the arrangement of classes, Grade II and part of Grade III in Mrs. Wells' room, Grade V and part of Grade VI in Mrs. MacBride's room, the work has steadily and satisfactorily progressed.

Near the close of the school year in June, the children, under Miss Wyeth's direction presented an entertainment on the school playground, consisting of a Flag Drill by Grades II and III, and a Spanish Operetta by Grades V and VI.

Mrs. Saunders supervised the Health Program of games and contests.

An exhibition of Art and other work which the children had accomplished during the year was shown in each class room. Ice cream was furnished by the Education Committee of the Norfolk Neighborly Club. Many parents and friends attended.

Three pupils from Grade V participated in the Union Spelling Bee held at Westwood.

In October the children enjoyed a bus trip to the Wayside Inn, where they were graciously received and entertained by the hostess. I believe they came home with a greater knowledge of the Colonial style of living.

The sale of stamps and bonds has decreased since the war ended, but it has amounted to \$976.90 since January 1945 and to \$6,373.88 since April, 1942.

The sanitary condition of the building is greatly improved by the installation of modern plumbing. Electric heaters in the toilets and storm windows where necessary add much to the comfort of the building.






