

WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

COMMONWEALTH OF MASSACHUSETTS

Norfolk, ss.

To either Constable in the Town of Norfolk, in said County,
Greeting:

You are required in the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts to notify and warn inhabitants of Norfolk, qualified to vote in Town affairs, to assemble in the Grange Hall on Monday, March 4, 1946 at 9:00 o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles, viz:

Article 1. To choose by ballot the following Town Officers viz: one Moderator, for one year; three Selectmen, who shall act as Board of Public Welfare, and Board of Health, for one year; one Town Clerk, one Town Treasurer, one Collector of Taxes, one Tree Warden, three Auditors, two Constables, each for one year; one Assessor of Taxes, one Trustee of Public Library, one School Committee, each for three years; one Trustee Josiah Ware Fund, for three years; one Water Commissioner, for one year; one Water Commissioner, for two years; one Water Commissioner, for three years.

Article 2. To hear and act on the report of the Town Officers.

Article 3. To grant and appropriate money for all necessary Town expenses, as follows, viz:

1. Schools.
2. Town Officers.
3. Public Library.
4. Memorial Day.
5. Electric Lights for the Town.

6. Bonds for Town Officers.
7. Removal of Snow.
8. Interest.
9. Public Welfare
10. Roads.
11. Fire Department.
12. Law Enforcement.
13. Maintenance of Norfolk County Hospital.
14. General Expense.
15. Extermination of Gypsy Moth.
16. Soldiers' Relief.
17. Old Age Assistance.
18. Tree Trimming.
19. District Nurse.
20. Aid to Dependent Children.
21. To pay the salary of a clerk for the Selectmen.
22. For Diphtheria Immunization.
23. For Reserve Fund.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning January 1, 1946, and to issue a note or notes therefor, payable within one year, and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with Section 17, Chapter 44, General Laws.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for Chapter 90 Maintenance to be used with an allotment from the State and County or from either.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for Chapter 90 Construction to be used with an allotment from the State and County or from either.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to fix the salaries of the elected officers.

Article 8. To see if the Town will appropriate a sum of money to clear up tax titles.

Article 9. To see if the Town will appropriate a sum of money to provide quarters for the American Legion Post #335.

* Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to accept Chapter 723, Acts of 1945, of the General Laws viz: Act authorizing the establishment and maintenance of a Municipal Department for furnishing information and advice and assistance to Veterans of World War II or other veterans.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$4,400.00 from the Federal Works Agency, to defray engineering expense for future extension of the Town Water System, or take any action in relation thereto.

Article 12. To see if the Town will transfer the sum of \$4,400.00 of Federal Funds to the Water Department to expend as directed by the Federal Works Agency.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum of money for the purchase of a Police Car, or take any action in relation thereto.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to accept Chapter 391, Acts of 1923 viz: Water rates and charges not paid within sixty (60) days shall become liens on the property.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to transfer the unexpended balance of the original \$15,000.00 Water appropriation from the General Fund back to the Water Department, for use in the original construction program.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to meet the Water Department Notes due December 15, 1946, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to purchase a truck or trucks for the Highway Department, or take any action in relation thereto.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to transfer a sum of money from the Machinery Fund to the Machinery Maintenance Account, or take any action in relation thereto.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to accept a sum of money left to the Town by the late Maria Mann, to be executed as is provided in her last will and testament, or take any action in relation thereto.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to appoint a Committee to consider the advisability of purchasing a voting machine or do or act anything relating thereto.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to purchase a lot of land as a site for a future consolidated School Building or take any action in relation thereto.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum of money for the installation of a Street Light at the residence of A. Waitkevich on Campbell Street or take any action in relation thereto.

Article 23. To see if the Town will choose any Committee or to hear or act on the report of any Committee or Town Officer or to instruct any Committee or Town Officer.

The polls shall be opened at 9:00 A.M. and will be closed at 8:00 P.M. Hereof, fail not, but make due return of this warrant, with your doings thereon to the Town Clerk, on or before the hour of said meeting.

RECORD OF ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

March 4, 1946

Pursuant to the foregoing Warrant, the Inhabitants met in the Grange Hall on the first Monday of March, it being the fourth day of said month, A.D., 1946.

The meeting was called to order at 8:55 o'clock A.M. by the Moderator, Walter T. Holmes and the Warrant and Constables' return thereon were read by him.

The ballot box was examined and found to be empty. It registered 000.

RECORDS OF ADJOURNED ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

March 18, 1946

The Inhabitants of the Town of Norfolk met in the Grange Hall on Monday, March 18th, 1946. The meeting was called to order by the Moderator, Walter T. Holmes and the meeting proceeded as following, viz:—

Article 2. Voted unanimously to accept the report of the Town Officers as presented in the town report.

Article 3. Each section was voted on separately. The following appropriations were made.

1. Schools, thirty one thousand dollars.
2. Town Officers, three thousand five hundred dollars.
3. Public Library, two hundred and fifty dollars plus dog tax receipts (two hundred nineteen dollars and nineteen cents.)
4. Memorial Day, one hundred dollars.
5. Electric Lights for Town, two thousand one hundred six dollars and fifty seven cents.
6. Bonds for Town Officers, one hundred dollars.
7. Removal of Snow, five thousand dollars.
8. Interest, one hundred dollars.
9. Public Welfare, one thousand five hundred dollars.
10. Roads, four thousand two hundred dollars.
11. Fire Department, two thousand eight hundred dollars.
12. Law Enforcement, two thousand three hundred dollars.
13. Maintenance of Norfolk County Hospital, four hundred dollars.
14. General Expense, two thousand five hundred dollars.
15. Extermination of Gypsy Moth, six hundred seventy four dollars, and eighty two cents.
16. Soldiers Relief, one thousand dollars.
17. Old Age Assistance, eleven thousand five hundred dollars.
18. Tree Trimming, three hundred dollars.

19. District Nurse, three hundred fifty dollars.
20. Aid to Dependent Children, one thousand five hundred dollars.
21. To pay salary of a Clerk for the Selectmen, seven hundred dollars.
22. For Diphtheria Immunization, fifty dollars.
23. For Reserve Fund, one thousand dollars.

Article 4. Voted unanimously that the Town authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning January 1, 1946 and to issue a note or notes therefor, payable within one year, and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with Section 17, Chapter 44, General Laws.

Article 5 Voted unanimously that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand five hundred dollars for Chapter 90 Maintenance to be used with an allotment from the State and County or from either.

Article 6. Voted to take no action on this article.

Article 7. Voted unanimously to fix the salaries of the elected officers as they were in 1945.

Article 8. Voted unanimously that the Town appropriate the sum of one hundred fifty dollars to clear up tax titles.

Article 9. Voted that the Town appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars to provide quarters for the American Legion Post No. 335.

* Article 10. Voted that the Town accept Chapter 723, Acts of 1945 of the General Laws, viz: Act authorizing the establishment and maintenance of a Municipal Department for furnishing information and advice and assistance to Veterans of World War II and other veterans and appropriate the sum of three hundred dollars for this department.

Article 11. Voted unanimously that the Town accept the sum of four thousand four hundred dollars from the Federal Works Agency to defray engineering expenses for future extensions of the Town

Water System and that the Board of Water Commissioners be authorized to execute a contract with the Federal Works Agency.

Article 12. Voted unanimously that the sum of four thousand four hundred dollars of Federal Funds be transferred to the Water Department to expend as directed by the Federal Works Agency.

Article 13. Voted unanimously that the Town appropriate the sum of one thousand three hundred fifty dollars for the purchase of a police car:

* Article 14. Voted that the Town accept Chapter 391, Acts of 1923—viz: Water rates and charges not paid within sixty (60) days shall become a lien on the property.

Article 15. Voted that the Town transfer the unexpended balance of the original \$15,000.00 Water appropriation from the General Fund back to the Water Department for use in the original construction program.

Article 16. Voted unanimously that the Town appropriate the sum of two thousand two hundred dollars to meet the Water Department notes due December 15, 1946.

Article 17. Voted unanimously that the Town appropriate the sum of two thousand eight hundred dollars to purchase a truck or trucks for the Highway Department and that if possible to purchase a surplus army truck at less cost to the Town it be bought.

Article 18. Voted unanimously that the Town transfer the sum of three thousand five hundred dollars from the Machinery Fund to the Machinery Maintenance Fund.

Article 19. Unanimously voted that the Town accept the sum of one thousand dollars left to the town by the late Maria Mann for "To hold and invest the same and accumulate the income thereon until such time as said Town shall establish a High School and erect a building therefor, when said fund with all accumulations thereon, shall be applied by said Town toward the erection of such a building"—as specified in her last will and testament.

Article 20. Voted unanimously to dismiss this article from the warrant.

Article 21. Voted unanimously that the Town appropriate the sum of two thousand dollars to purchase through the School Committed a lot of land, now owned by James T. Buckley of this town and containing fourteen acres more or less, for a site for a future consolidated grade school, the aforesaid land being bounded approximately as follows: On the north by Boardman Street; on the east by land of Richard T. Glass and Pamela Harlow Fay, or right of way thereon and adjacent thereto; on the south by land of Malcolm Greene, on the west by lands of aforesaid James T. Buckley and Franklin T. Clark.

Article 22. Voted unanimously that the Town appropriate the sum of twenty-five dollars for the installation of a street light at the residence of A. Waitkevich on Campbell Street.

Article 23. Under this article no action was taken.

The meeting was called to order by the Moderator, Walter T. Holmes, and the Warrant and Constable's return thereon were read by him.

The ballot box was examined and found to be empty. It registered 000.

The following named persons having been appointed election officers, were sworn as such by the Town Clerk, namely: Alvin J. Freeman, William S. Gallagher, James R. Farrell, Olga Pitt, and Maude Virchow.

Robert Neil was police officer.

All preliminaries required by law were complied with and the polls were declared open at 9:00 o'clock A.M.

The polls were declared closed at 8:00 o'clock P.M.

The ballot box registered 612 and the names checked on the voting list and the ballots taken from the box, when counted, were found to agree.

The votes having been counted in open town meeting it was found that Edward E. Hall had 302, Charles H. Weeber, Jr., 308 and blanks 2. Charles M. Weeber, Jr., was elected Selectman.

The meeting proceeded as follows, viz:—

Article 2. Voted to change from residential to business districts on North Street from the southerly junction of Union Street to Shear St. at the Wrentham line and Rockwood Road, Route 115 easterly side from pole 40 to pole 50 by a vote of "YES" 130, "NO" 0.

Article 3. Voted to appropriate one hundred dollars to install five street lights at Mirror Lake.

Article 4. Voted unanimously that the Town appropriate sixteen dollars and fifty cents to install a street light on Park Street between Grove Street and the residence of Albert Dalghren.

Article 5. Voted unanimously that the town appropriate seventy-five dollars for the observance of Memorial Day.

Article 6. Under this article no action was taken.

Article 7. Voted unanimously to authorize the Trustees of the Josiah Ware Fund to invest the Maria Mann Fund.

June 10, 1946

Pursuant to the foregoing Warrant, the Inhabitants of Norfolk met in the Grange Hall on Monday evening, June 10, 1946.

The meeting was called to order by the Moderator, Walter T. Holmes at 8.00 o'clock p.m. The reading of the warrant was waived and the meeting proceeded as follows, viz:—

Article 1. Voted to transfer from surplus account one hundred fifty dollars to repair the tennis court.

Article 2. Voted to change the following property from residen-

tial to business district; land now owned by Michael Mattson. The land in said Norfolk on the northeasterly side of Rockwood Road bounded and described as follows: Beginning at an iron pipe in the ground in the line of said Rockwood Road at a point 108.05 feet northwesterly from a County Highway Bound thence N. 44° 30' 45" W by said Rockwood Road one hundred fifty (150) feet to an iron bar at land of Allan Carver; thence N 80° 36' 15" E by said Carver land, seventy and thirty-five one hundredths (70.35) feet to stake by iron bar; thence N 7° 57' 45" W by stone wall and said Carver land one hundred seventy four and 73/100 (174.73) feet to a drill hole in boulder; thence N 7° 49' 30" W by said stone wall and land now or formerly of Thomas Glenn, Trustee, seventy-nine and 25/100 (79.25) feet to iron pipe by fence; thence S 85° 24' 30" E by remains of wire fence and land now or formerly of Callahan, one hundred twenty-five (125) feet; thence S 8° 03' 10" E by land of Mattson two hundred seventy-two and 24/100 (272.24) feet to iron pipe; thence S 45° 29' 15" W, by land of Mattson one hundred twenty-nine (129) feet to point of beginning containing one acre. Article 5. Voted to raise and appropriate twenty-five hundred dollars for maintenance and operating expenses for the water department.

Article 6. Voted to transfer the sum of four hundred dollars from Chapter 90 to Chapter 81 Account.

REPORT OF THE WATER COMMISSIONERS

February 7, 1947

Mr. Holmes and Mr. Weeber took over the active work of the Board in March 1946. The firm of Whitman & Howard, Engineers of Boston were employed to lay out the system and to advise the board. Up to that time about 500 feet of pipe had been laid starting from the prison property. Since that time 18,709 feet of pipe have been laid in the following streets: Main, Rockwood, Cleveland, Boardman, Seekonk, Union and North. A meter pit has been installed and the proper hydrants have been set to conform to underwriters requirements.

The previous board had contracted with Robert Hancock to do the digging and back filling of the trench and the resurfacing of the road. The town employees were to lay the pipes. It soon became apparent to the board that the contractor did not know how to do this work and he did not have equipment to facilitate the work as was shown by the large stretch of road that was opened up, which at times caused serious traffic difficulties, also a great deal of damage was being done to the remainder of the road. When the town appropriated additional money for the work it was decided to cancel the contract of Robert Hancock and ask for new bids with the contractor to do all the work of digging and installing of mains. The board received twelve bids and awarded it to P. & P. DiMascio & Sons., Co., of Dorchester, the low bidder. This firm's work has been very satisfactory and progressed as rapidly as supplies were available. The work finally had to be shut down due to delays in receiving cast iron fittings, hydrants, and gate valves. Many of these items were borrowed from other towns but even their supplies became

exhausted, also it was costing too much to send men and trucks around to various places to pick up these items.

There are now 42 users. This number has proved disappointing especially in view of the fact one half of these users are on Boardman and Seekonk Streets two streets which were not included in the original boards plan. It will take at least five times the above number of users for the system to pay its own way.

Greeting:

You are required in the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts to notify and warn inhabitants of Norfolk, qualified to vote in Town affairs, to assemble in the Grange Hall on Monday, March 3, 1947, at 9:00 o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles viz:

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning January 1, 1947, and to issue a note or notes therefor, payable within one year, and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with Section 17, Chapter 44, General Laws.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, or transfer from unappropriated funds in the treasury, a sum of money for Chapter 90 Highway Maintenance or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 6. To see if the Town will appropriate a sum of money to clear up tax titles.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to fix the salaries of the elected officers.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to transfer a sum of money from the Machinery Fund to the Machinery Maintenance Account.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to remove snow and ice from private ways therein open to public use or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a

sum of money for a new oil burning boiler for heating system at the Fire House or take any other action in relation thereto.

Rockwood Road from the junction of Main and Rockwood to junction of Rockwood and Boardman; property adjoining Rockwood Road to a depth of 200 feet on each side from accepted way. Subsection 3, Section 2 Industrial—1. Route 1-A in its entirety—property adjoining Route 1-A to a depth of 200 feet on both sides of accepted way. 2. Main Street in its entirety—property adjoining Main Street to a depth of 200 feet on both sides of accepted way.

Article 19. To see if the town will vote to accept Ash Road or any portion thereof.

Article 20. To see if the town will vote to accept the provisions of Section 42A-42F, inclusive, Chapter 40., viz: Water rates and charges not paid within sixty (60) days shall become liens on the property.

Article 21. To see if the Town will choose any Committee or to hear or act on the report of any Committee or Town Officer or to instruct any Committee or Town Officer.

The polls shall be opened at 9:00 A.M. and will be closed at 8:00 P.M. Hereof fail not, but make due return of this warrant, with your doings thereon to the Town Clerk, on or before the hour of said meeting.



REPORT OF THE SCHOOL COMMITTEE

To the citizens of Norfolk the School Committee submits its Annual Report:

Regular meetings of the School Committee are held at the Center School at 7.30 P. M. on the Thursday evening before the fourth Monday of each month, except during July and August. Special meetings are held when necessary.

We are happy to report that all departments of the Norfolk Schools are being operated to their utmost capacity. All class rooms are filled, and it would be hard to find room for five more pupils in the two buildings.

Our supervisory staff are eminently satisfactory and show a deep interest in their pupils and the future welfare of the town.

The physical part of the buildings is still our greatest problem, although we are trying to make conditions as comfortable as we can with the buildings we have, and we try to keep our repairs down as much as possible, although there are always repairs to some extent to be made.

Recently we have made alterations to the heating plant at the City Mills School which we hope will reduce our cost considerably, and also give added comfort on cold days.

The townspeople will find under the reports of the Superintendent and the Principals matters of serious study. We must heed the suggestions of our Superintendent with reference to higher salaries for

our faculty. Norfolk is very fortunate in having such an excellent teaching staff, and we must not allow them to be lost to us because of economic needs.

The School Committee is very grateful for the fine cooperation received from the people of Norfolk in these trying times. We should all strive toward a new and modern School Building in the very near future.

Once again we wish to thank all teachers, parents, and the Superintendent for their fine cooperation during the year 1946.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Committee of the Town of Norfolk:

I hereby submit my fourth annual report as Superintendent of Schools for the year ending December 31, 1946. Following, there are reports from the principals and supervisors, which will explain in detail the work accomplished.

The Norfolk School Faculty

At the present time in Norfolk, there are six full time teachers and three part time teachers or supervisors: Music, Domestic Science, and Manual Training. There is still need for a part time Supervisor of Art, but with only one day's work per week to offer, it has been impossible to obtain one. We have hoped that by joining with Hopedale and Medfield in hiring an Art Supervisor, we would be able to offer full time employment. However, to date, neither Norfolk, Medfield, nor Hopedale has a Supervisor of Art.

The faculty is well trained. All of our teachers are graduates of standard normal schools, with at least two years' training beyond high school. Several of our teachers have Bachelor's degrees, which

indicate that these teachers attended at least four years at Normal School or College. Some of the other teachers are working at Colleges of Boston now to earn credits for a degree. Last winter, all of our teachers took a Boston University course in the Principles of Elementary Education. However, the experience in the classroom is of great value, and the teachers without degrees have many years of successful teaching experience to their credit.

The turnover in all school faculties has been great, and Norfolk has been no exception. As you know, I came to Norfolk in 1943, and only three of the original teachers are now on our faculty. This is a turnover of 50% which is not too high, for at Medfield in the same time, the change was 83.5%, and at Westwood the turnover was 76%. We must appreciate the work of the teachers who have remained at the Norfolk schools. Their years of service are of benefit to the town and its children. You need only to check the record of the graduates at higher schools and colleges to note the good work of our faculty. The more stable the faculty, the better the system.

We must take steps to pay our teachers higher salaries, so that there will be less changing. It is difficult to get teachers to come into Norfolk for several reasons: (1.) Distance from home town (2.) Salary, present and future (3.) Condition of buildings (4.) Size of classes. Teachers today can shop about before they take a job, and select the one that offers the best future. The School Committee has realized for some time that higher salaries were necessary, and during the last few years have increased the salaries of the teachers. In 1947 a substantial salary increase is absolutely necessary, and the town of Norfolk must face a higher school budget. The School Department must consider both sides of the question, that of the teachers, and that of the taxpayers. But, as the taxpayers demand more services, the costs will be higher. You have only to read the daily paper to realize that teachers throughout the country are in need of higher salaries. Governor Bradford, in his inaugural address stated clearly that the need for greater salaries for teachers was absolutely necessary, and gave us the hope of larger state reimbursements because of higher teacher salaries. The Federal Office of Education, too, has a bill before Congress to reimburse the small and poorer towns for a part of the cost of teachers' salaries so that educational opportuni-

ties throughout the country as a whole will improve. These reimbursements will help Norfolk, and will come soon, perhaps before 1947 ends.

The School Committee has found it necessary to request in this year's budget, funds enough to increase each teacher \$500.00. It is our hope that you, as voters, and taxpayers, will appropriate the money to make possible a better and more stable faculty at Norfolk.

Present State Reimbursements

The Town of Norfolk receives a large sum from the State each year as reimbursement for money used for schools.

In the past five years, since 1941, the total state reimbursement from Educational funds is as follows:

This total reimbursement is made up of several items, namely, School Fund Part I, based on salaries paid teachers; School Fund Part II, aid to smaller towns; Superintendent's Salary; High and Trade School Tuition; High and Trade School Transportation.

School Fund Part I, amounts to about \$1225 each year. This reimbursement is on the basis of \$200.00 per teacher, with proper training and more than two years experience. With less than the required training and experience, the amount is \$100.00 to \$150.00 per teacher.

School Fund Part II, is distributed to the smaller towns, but is very small in the case of Norfolk, about \$200.00. When this return is figured, the other reimbursements are subtracted, so when transportation and tuition to higher schools is removed, the figure is small.

The tuition of pupils at High School, is reimbursed to the Town at the rate of 50%, not to exceed 50% of the State approved rate for that school. The tuition rate at Walpole High School has constantly

increased from \$115.00 in 1944, to \$150.00 starting in January 1947. The reimbursement for this tuition will be \$75.00 as the State approved rate at Walpole is \$150.00.

The number of pupils at the High School has decreased in the past few years, and has started to increase again:

1943—63; 1944—66; 1945—48; 1946—53; Sept. 1946—55
In September 1947, we expect 70 or more pupils. This figure increases from two causes, (1) more pupils of High School age move into Norfolk (2) more enter High School than graduate or leave High School. It is needless to say that this year's 8th grade is much larger than the group to graduate from Walpole High School (12 Pupils). There are also an average of about five pupils at Trade or Vocational School. The reimbursement to these schools is 50% of the cost also.

In other words, the Town of Norfolk must look to higher costs because of High School tuition. Next year, we may have to use approximately \$2700.00 more for tuition to High School. One of the reasons that school department has been able to meet the expanding costs of local education, without increasing the total budget, is that the number of tuition pupils decreased during the years of rising costs. The change has come, and we can expect larger classes at High School.

The transportation of Norfolk pupils to High or Vocational Schools is reimbursed to the Town at the rate of 100% of the actual cost. The transportation costs have increased, and an adjustment upward has been made. This means that the Town must appropriate more money to pay the bill, which the State will repay sometime after July 1st, 1947. To make it clear to you that there is a limit on the transportation figure, the state pays all of the cost up to 40 cents per pupil per day, plus three quarters of the amount above this, but none to exceed 80 cents per day. Norfolk has been close, but as long as attendance at High School holds up, the reimbursement will be the total amount spent. The reimbursement for High School Transportation alone is about \$3000.00, whereas Vocational Transportation usually is returned at about \$250.00.

Legislation is now being prepared to distribute \$21,000,000.00 to the towns of the State, because of Educational costs. Norfolk will come in for this and the local tax outlook will be brighter.

Last Spring (March 16, 1946) Norfolk pupils participated in a Conference on Radio and Education, and were presented by the Columbia Broadcasting System. The work was conducted by Mrs. Martina McD. Driscoll, Supervisor of Music, Massachusetts Department of Education. Mrs. Driscoll and Miss Day did much work in acquainting the Norfolk children with the music. Everyone was pleased with the results and much information was gained by the experiment. The following pupils were selected by Mrs. Driscoll after much testing, and participated in the program: Anne Legge, Dorothy Fredrickson, Barbara Bartholomew, Priscilla Boyden, Lawrence Lang, Richard Leverone, William Hagberg, and Thomas Ravinski. Norfolk appreciated the work of Mrs. Driscoll, and Harry S. Broudy, Director of Graduate Study at North Adams Teachers' College, who helped Mrs. Driscoll prepare the demonstration of Directed and Undirected Listening.

It has been a pleasure to work in Norfolk, for one is able to see progress from year to year. The Superintendent appreciates the help of the School Committee, the teachers, the parents, and all that have aided in the educational activities of the Town of Norfolk.

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPLE—CENTER SCHOOL

To the Superintendent of Schools:

As a member of the Board of Directors, Massachusetts Teachers Federation, I am in a position to obtain an extensive viewpoint of State-wide teaching conditions. I know of no community the size of Norfolk that encounters so little "teacher trouble". I believe the answer to be this: the fair treatment accorded Norfolk teachers by the School Committee Members and the Superintendent. The only two changes in the teaching staff this year were because the teachers resigning did so to establish homes for themselves.

The Class of 1946 held highly satisfactory Class Day Exercises at the conclusion of the school year. A very fair per cent of this group is doing good work as Freshmen in Walpole High School.

The Norfolk Neighborly Club scholarship prize of twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars for the Norfolk member of the Senior Class was awarded to Eleanor M. Campbell, Walpole High School.

The Norfolk Teachers Club scholarship award was presented to Barbara Bartholomew, and the Men's Club good citizenship prize to William Wyllie, at the Class Day Exercises. Both of these were twenty-five dollar (\$25.00) awards.

The 1946 Fales Scholarship was won by Eleanor M. Campbell, who graduated with honors from Walpole High School and now attends Emmanuel College.

The extra curricular activities of the school deserve generous mention. All boys of Grades Seven and Eight are members of Four H Craftsmanship clubs. The Girls of Grades Seven and Eight are enrolled in Four H Home Economics Clubs. The Girl Scout Troop and Brownies have greatly expanded in the past year. Audubon Clubs are flourishing in the upper grades. A Good-will Correspondence Club will be inaugurated in Grade Eight as a Social Science project the second half of the school year. The teachers serving as group leaders of these activities are Miss Day, Miss Torrey, Mrs. Greeley, Mr. Washburn and Mr. Twombly.

An outstanding social event was the 1946 Class Trip. Parents and friends furnished cars for transportation and a delightful all day outing at York Beach, Maine, was enjoyed by the graduates. The cooperation existing between home and school in Norfolk is highly commendable and a tribute to the type of citizenship enjoyed in this community of ours.

The highlight of the 1945-46 school year was the purchase by the School Committee upon recommendation of Mr. Eaton, of a moving picture projector, amplifier, and musical recorder. As a result of this equipment it will now be possible to arrange a visual education program of most helpful nature. Already a fine series of films is being shown in the various class rooms.

The Inter-town Annual Spelling Bee of 1946 proved highly successful from the Norfolk point of view. The championship cup was brought to our Town for the third year in succession. Grades Six, Seven and Eight all won in their class. The Grade Five contest was won by the Islington School of Westwood.

The physical conditions of the school buildings in Norfolk are inadequate for the program of study, recreation and social activities of a modern school. I hope the very near future will witness the erection of a consolidated school worthy of the fine type of children living in Norfolk. The potential value of the contribution these young people may give to our community, the state, and the nation can never be measured in dollars and cents. They deserve the best we can offer them.

In closing, I again express appreciation of the thoughtfulness and personal interest of School Committee Members, the Superintendent, and Norfolk citizens in the teachers and students of the Norfolk Public Schools.

A Spelling Bee schedule has already been planned and practice spelling bees in actual contests with the microphone have commenced in preparation for the Union Spelling Bee to be held in Norfolk in May. We hope our spellers will make a good showing for us in Union competition.

This year the students in the upper grades will again enter the S. P. C. A. poster contest as they have in previous years.

Two other art contests are also being entered this year; one, the "America the Beautiful" Crayon Contest sponsored by the Milton Bradley Company and the other the Scholastic Art Awards Contest sponsored by R. H. White Company.
