

WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

Monday, March 7, 1949

Commonwealth of Massachusetts

Norfolk, ss.

To either Constable in the Town of Norfolk, in said County,

Greeting:

You are required in the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts to notify and warn inhabitants of Norfolk, qualified to vote in Town affairs, to assemble in the Grange Hall on Monday, March 7, 1949, at 9:00 o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles viz:

Article 1. To choose by ballot the following Town Officers viz: One Moderator, for one year; one Selectman for one year, one Selectman for two years, one Selectman for three years, Selectmen to act as Board of Health; one member Board of Public Welfare for one year, one member Board of Public Welfare for two years, one member Board of Public Welfare for three years; one Town Clerk, one Town Treasurer, one Collector of Taxes, one Tree Warden, three Auditors, two Constables, each one for one year; one Assessor of Taxes, one Trustee of Josiah Ware Fund, one Trustee of Public Library, one School Committee, each for three years; one Water Commissioner, for three years.

Article 2. To hear and act on the report of the Town Officers.

Article 3. To grant and appropriate money for all necessary Town expenses, as follows, viz:

1. Schools.
2. Town Officers.
3. Public Library.
4. Memorial Day.
5. Electric Lights for the Town.
6. Bonds for Town Officers.
7. Interest.
8. Removal of Snow.
9. Public Welfare.
10. Roads — Chapter 81.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning January 1, 1949, and to issue a note or notes therefor, payable within one year, and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with Section 17, Chapter 44, General Laws.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, or transfer from unappropriated funds in the treasury, a sum of money for Chapter 90 Highway Maintenance or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 6. To see if the Town will appropriate a sum of money to clear up tax titles or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to fix salaries of the elected officers or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to transfer a sum of money from the Machinery Fund to the Machinery Maintenance Account or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purposes of constructing a consolidated school building and originally equipping and furnishing the same; determine how the money shall be provided for, by taxation, by borrowing under authority of Chapter 44 of the General Laws, by borrowing under authority of Chapter 297 of the Acts of 1946, as amended by Chapter 312 of the Acts of 1948; or take any action relative thereto.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to provide quarters for the American Legion Post #335 or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to provide transportation to swimming classes at Franklin, for the children of Norfolk or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to accept Pine Road for a distance of (200 ft.) and Oak Road for a distance of (200 ft.), both streets being dead end, running northwesterly off of Mirror Lake Avenue or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 13. For all future extensions of water mains, the water takers on such extensions shall be charged an annual minimum water rate in an amount, the aggregate of which such annual minimum water rates shall be three per cent of the cost of the extension and installation of an eight inch line for a period of fifteen years, and that the Water Board be authorized to enter into contracts with such takers whereby said takers shall guarantee payment of such minimum sums for said period of fifteen years, and that all other persons desiring to connect to said extension within the fifteen year period be obligated to pay such proportionate part of the original cost of the extension as said Board decides is fair and just, for the remainder of the fifteen year period, provided a contract entered into with said Board and that all contracts hereunder shall be signed and delivered to the said Board before any

money shall be expended on any extension. All such contracts shall be recorded by said Board in the Registry of Deeds at Norfolk County and shall constitute a lien on the premises affected thereby, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to pay unpaid bills of 1948 or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 15. To see if the Town will appropriate a sum of money to repair Ash Street or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 16. To see if the Town will appropriate a sum of money to install street lights in front of the residences of the following or take any other action in relation thereto.

1. Walter R. Wood, North Street.
2. Bennet Wilson, King Street.
3. Alfred Hayber, Grove Street.
4. Nels T. Carlson, Turner Street.
5. Frederic Woodworth, Lawrence Street.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to rescind its action requiring that the Board of Auditors be elected at its next annual meeting or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the treasury, a sum of money for Chapters 81 and 90 Highway Maintenance, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 19. To see if the Town will appropriate a sum of money for the Norfolk Cemetery Association under General Laws Chapter 114, Section 16, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to purchase a tractor and equipment for the highway department or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to accept Leland Road, Lake Shore Rd., Priscilla Avenue, and River Road or any portions thereof or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 22. To see if the Town will choose any Committee or to hear or act on the report of any Committee or Town Officer or to instruct any Committee or Town Officer.

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to transfer from Water Revenue received in 1947, a sum of money for Water Department Maintenance, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to repair the Town garage.

The polls shall be opened at 9:00 A.M. and will be closed at 8:00 P.M.

ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

March 7, 1949

Pursuant to the foregoing Warrant the Inhabitants met in the Grange Hall on the first Monday in March, it being the seventh day of said March, A. D. 1949.

The meeting was called to order by the Moderator Walter T. Holmes. The reading of the Warrant was waived by those present.

The ballot box was examined and found to be empty. It registered 000.

RECORDS OF ADJOURNED TOWN MEETING

March 21, 1949

The Inhabitants of the Town of Norfolk met in the Grange Hall on Monday, March 21, 1949. The meeting was called to order by the Moderator, Walter T. Holmes at 8 o'clock P. M. and the meeting proceeded as follows, viz:—

Article 2. Voted unanimously to accept the reports of the Town Officers as presented in the Town reports.

Article 3. Each section of this article was voted separately and unanimously. The following appropriations for necessary Town expenses were made.

1. Schools, fifty one thousand dollars.
2. Town Officers, four thousand seven hundred sixty seven dollars.
3. Public Library, two hundred fifty dollars plus dog tax.
4. Memorial Day, three hundred dollars.
5. Electric Lights for Town, two thousand four hundred ninety five dollars and twenty-nine cents.
6. Bonds for Town Officers, one hundred thirty dollars and fifty cents.
7. Interest, one hundred dollars.
8. Removal of Snow, four thousand five hundred dollars.
9. Public Welfare, two thousand five hundred dollars.
10. Roads—Chapter 81, five thousand dollars.
11. Fire Department, three thousand three hundred dollars.
12. Law Enforcement, three thousand two hundred dollars.
13. Maintenance of Norfolk County Hospital, one thousand five hundred sixty four dollars and sixty one cents.
14. General Expense, three thousand five hundred dollars.
15. Extermination of Gypsy Moth, six hundred seventy-five dollars.

16. Soldiers' Relief, one thousand dollars.
17. Old Age Assistance, eleven thousand five hundred dollars.
18. Tree Trimming, three hundred dollars.
19. District Nurse, four hundred fifty dollars.
20. Aid to Dependent Children, four thousand dollars.
21. To pay the salary of a Clerk for the Selectmen, four hundred forty dollars.
22. For Diphtheria Immunization, fifty dollars.
23. For Reserve Fund, two thousand dollars.
24. Veterans' Administration, two hundred dollars.
25. Water Department, notes and interest due in 1949; notes, three thousand five hundred dollars; interest, six hundred dollars; total four thousand one hundred dollars.
26. Norfolk County Retirement System, four hundred seventy-five dollars and eighty-three cents.
27. Old Age Assistance Administration, six hundred dollars.

Article 4. Voted unanimously that the Town Treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen, be and hereby is authorized to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning January 1, 1949, and to issue a note or notes therefor, payable within one year, and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with Section 17, Chapter 44, of the General Laws.

Article 5. Voted unanimously that the Town raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated funds in the treasury, the sum of one thousand dollars for Chapter 90 Highway Maintenance.

Article 6. Voted unanimously that the Town appropriate the sum of one hundred dollars to clear up tax titles.

Article 7. Voted unanimously that the Town fix the salaries of the elected officers and appointees as follows, i. e. Selectmen, six hundred dollars; Town Clerk, one hundred fifty dollars; Town Treasurer, four hundred fifty dollars; Tax Collector, eight hundred dollars including water bill collections; Assessors, one thousand two hundred dollars; Town Accountant, five hundred twenty dollars; Board of Welfare, two

hundred twenty-five dollars; Water Commission, one hundred fifty dollars; Sealer of Weights and Measures, fifty dollars; Town Counsel, one hundred fifty dollars; Inspector of Animals, seventy-five dollars; Inspector of Buildings, one hundred dollars; Auditors, seventy-five dollars; Election Officers, seventy-two dollars; Registrars of Voters, one hundred fifty dollars.

Article 8. Voted unanimously that the Town transfer the sum of two thousand forty-seven dollars from the Machinery Fund to the Machinery Maintenance Account.

Article 9. Voted unanimously that the sum of two hundred forty one thousand dollars be raised and appropriated for the purpose of constructing a school building and originally equipping and furnishing the same; all substantially in accordance with plan submitted to the Town in a report by the School Building Committee appointed by the Moderator on March 15, 1948, and that to meet the said appropriation the sum of one thousand dollars be raised in the tax levy of the current year, and that the Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, be and hereby is authorized to borrow the sum of two hundred thousand dollars in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 297, of the Acts of 1946 as amended by Chapter 312 of the Acts of 1948, and the sum of forty thousand dollars under authority of Chapter 44 of the General Laws, and to issue bonds or notes of the Town therefor payable in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 44 of the General Laws, so that the whole loan shall be paid in not more than twenty years from the date of issue of the first bond or note.

Also voted that the Building Committee appointed under Article 22, Section 3 of the Warrant for the Annual Town Meeting held on March 15, 1948 be authorized to enter into all necessary contracts and agreements to carry out the work, provided however that no contracts or agreements shall be entered into, or a loan issued under this vote unless and until approval is obtained from the School Building Assistance Commission of a construction grant under authority of Chapter 645 of the Acts of 1948.

Article 10. Voted unanimously that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars to provide quarters for the American Legion Post #335.

Article 11. Voted unanimously that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred twenty five dollars to provide transportation to swimming classes at Franklin for the children of Norfolk.

Article 12. Voted unanimously that the Town accept Pine Road for a distance of two hundred feet and Oak Road for a distance of two hundred feet, both streets being dead end, running northwesterly off of Mirror Lake Avenue.

Article 13. Under this Article no action was taken.

Article 14. Voted unanimously that the Town appropriate the sum of two hundred fifteen dollars and forty nine cents for December 1948 unpaid bills. Electric light; two dollars and sixty five cents, Fire Department; thirty dollars, interest on 1948 Water Department notes; total, two hundred forty eight dollars and fourteen cents.

Article 15. Voted unanimously no money be appropriated under this article as allowance was made under Article 3, Section 10 to cover this.

Article 16. Voted unanimously no money be appropriated and that those who want street lights should appear before the Advisory Board to state their cases.

Article 17. Voted unanimously that the Town rescind its action requiring the Board of Auditors be elected at its next annual Town Meeting.

Article 18. Voted unanimously that the Town raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the treasury a sum of money for Chapter 81 and 90 Highway Maintenance.

Article 19. Voted that the Town appropriate five hundred dollars for the Norfolk Cemetery Association under Chapter 114, Section 16 General Laws.

Article 20. Voted unanimously that no appropriation be made.

Article 21. Voted unanimously that the Town of Norfolk accept as Town roads in the west section of the Town, generally known as the Populatic Lake area, Leland Road for a distance of approximately four hundred ninety five yards northwesterly from the junction with Miller Street to the junction with Priscilla Ave., adjacent Lot A-50; Priscilla Avenue for a distance of one thousand fifty yards from the junction with Leland Road northerly to the junction with Lake Shore Drive adjacent Lots A 173 and A 174; Lake Shore Drive for a distance of approximately six hundred five yards northwesterly and northerly to the junction with River Road adjacent Lot A-256; River Road from the junction with Lake Shore Drive for a distance of approximately one

thousand eight hundred thirteen yards easterly to the junction of Myrtle Street, these streets having been released to the Town by their present owner. Designated portions of streets and lot locations can be determined by referring to Sheets 4 and 5 of Lot A on plan 6616A filed with certificate of title No. 31035 with Registry District of Norfolk County.

Article 22. Under this article no action was taken.

Article 23. Voted unanimously that the Town transfer two thousand dollars from the 1947 Water Revenue to Water Department Maintenance.

Article 24. Voted unanimously that the Town raise and appropriate one hundred dollars to repair the Town garage.

Meeting adjourned and Warrant dismissed.

- (5) 1946 Reserve Fund, two hundred thirty dollars.
- (6) 1947 Reserve Fund, five hundred twenty dollars.

Selectmen's Report

Meetings: 2nd and 4th Mondays at 8:00 P. M.

The year 1949 witnessed another year of steadily increasing municipal costs. We have endeavored to keep expenses at a minimum and yet give an efficient government. We would like to draw your attention to the graphs on Page 28 showing expenditures and receipts, particularly to the rising cost of welfare and the large percentage of the total town expenditures used for this purpose. School expenses have also risen sharply and are due for a larger increase this year.

George F. Campbell, who served the town efficiently and well as Town Treasurer for 30 years, resigned as of December 31, 1949. The Selectmen appointed Clarence S. Fuller to fill the unexpired term.

Your Selectmen advertised for bids to borrow money for the new school. A rate of 2% was obtained for \$240,000.00 with a premium of \$4768.80. This premium paid for the work involved in obtaining the loan and the balance will be applied against the first bond payment when it comes due. The Town, while paying only for 50% of the cost of the school, must pay the interest on the entire amount of \$240,000.00.

It will be necessary soon to make a change in our library. The Library Committee has a suggestion which you will find under their report.

We have an article in the warrant pertaining to the construction of sidewalks. It will be necessary for the safety of school children and others to start such a project in the near future.


We suggest that thought be given to the construction of a new fire-proof Town Garage at some future date. Our present one is too small, has inadequate heating and is totally lacking in respect to a modern garage.



WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

Monday, March 6, 1950

Commonwealth of Massachusetts

To either Constable in the Town of Norfolk, in said County,

Greeting:

You are required in the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts to notify and warn inhabitants of Norfolk, qualified to vote in Town affairs, to assemble in the Grange Hall on Monday, March 6, 1950, at 9:00 o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles, viz:

Article 1. To choose by ballot the following Town Officers viz: One Moderator, for one year; one Selectman, for three years, to act as Board of Health; one member of Board of Public Welfare for three years; one Town Clerk, one Town Treasurer, one Collector of Taxes, one Tree Warden, two Constables, each one for one year; one Assessor of Taxes, one Trustee of Public Library, one School Committee, one Water Commissioner, each for three years.

Article 2. To hear and act on the report of the Town Officers.

Article 3. To grant and appropriate money for all necessary Town expenses as follows, viz:

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning January 1, 1950, and to issue a note or notes therefor, payable within one year, and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with Section 17, Chapter 44, General Laws.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the treasury, a sum of money for Chapter 90 Highway Maintenance or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury, a sum of money for Chapter 90 Highway Construction, or take any action in relation thereto.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury a sum of money for Chapter 81 highways, or take any action in relation thereto.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury, a sum of money to meet School Building Notes and Interest Due in 1950 or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to transfer from Water Revenue received in 1949, a sum of money for Water Department Maintenance, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury, a sum of money to purchase a piece of fire apparatus and equipment for same, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury, a sum of money to pay land damages to the following:

Agnes S. Bristol and Edna J. Hubbard—North Street

or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury, a sum of money to clear up tax titles or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to fix salaries of the elected officers or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury, a sum of money from the Machinery Fund to the Machinery Maintenance Account or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury, a sum of money to provide quarters for the American Legion Post #335 or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury, a sum of money to provide transportation to swimming classes at Franklin, for the children of Norfolk or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following: on all future extensions of water mains, the water takers on such extensions shall be charged an annual minimum water rate in an amount, the aggregate of which such annual minimum water rates shall be three per cent of the cost of the extension and installation of an eight-inch line for a period of fifteen years, and that the Board of Water Commissioners be authorized to enter into contracts with such takers whereby said takers shall guarantee payment of such minimum sums for said period of fifteen years, and that all other persons desiring to connect to said extension within the fifteen-year period be obligated to pay such proportionate part of the original cost of the extension as said Board decides is fair and just, for the remainder of the fifteen-year period, provided a contract is entered into with said Board and that all contracts hereunder shall be signed and delivered to the said Board before any money shall be expended on any extension. All such contracts shall be recorded by said Board in the Registry of Deeds at Norfolk County and shall constitute a lien on the premises affected thereby, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury, a sum of money to purchase a tractor and equipment for the Highway Department or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury, a sum

of money for garbage disposal or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to lease to Norfolk Post American Legion the land and buildings known as City Mills School for a term of five years at \$1.00 per year, when said school building is vacated by the School Department, or take any other action in relation thereto.

* Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Board of Selectmen to permit the Library Committee to use as a Town Library the building known as the Old Fire Station when said building is vacated by the School Department, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to appoint a committee to investigate and consider the advisability of the Town joining a Regional High School District, or take any action in relation thereto.

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to remove the position of Chief of Police from Civil Service subject to the affirmative vote of the State Legislature, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury, a sum of money to construct sidewalks on Rockwood Road and Main Streets around the center of town or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to abandon that portion of Lake Street from Medway Street, southwesterly 2550 feet, to the boundary of land owned by William Michelson, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following streets:

Geneva Street

Malcolm Street

Ware Street

or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following: That in a new building development, the Board of Water Commissioners

be authorized to enter into an agreement with the developer whereby the developer shall guarantee the return of 6% on the original cost of the water installation for a period of 15 years, or take any action in relation thereto.

Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to install a street light on Pole 23/23 on Everett Street in front of the residence of P. Kozak, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 29. To see if the Town will vote to prohibit hunting on private land without the written permit of the owner, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 30. To see if the Town will vote to obtain water for the residents of Everett Street, Pondville, from the Town of Wrentham from a water line on Vine Street, Wrentham, or take any other action in relation thereto. (Petition)

Article 31. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following suggested building code for the Town of Norfolk:

Sec. 1—This by-law shall be known as the "Building Code" of the Town of Norfolk, Mass.

Sec. 2—All new work to conform to this code. No building or structure shall hereafter be constructed, altered, or removed, or any foundation started, without obtaining a permit to build.

Sec. 3—No building shall be sheathed, lathed, or plastered until certified by the building inspector.

Sec. 4—The building inspector may revoke a permit after issuance in case of misstatements or misrepresentation.

Sec. 5—No permit shall be required for any building of less than 100 square feet of floor space.

Sec. 6—Permit shall expire one year from date of issue.

Sec. 7—No dwelling shall be covered with any objectionable material on roof or sidewalls such as tar paper, tin, etc., except while under construction.

Sec. 8—No shacks shall be erected except for use of contractors during construction of permanent structure. Permits for above shack shall be issued with a time limit as a temporary structure.

Sec. 9—(a) All dwellings shall have all corner posts braced with not less than 2" x 4" braces.

(b) All dwellings shall have collar ties spaced not more than 4 ft. o. c.

(c) No privies shall be built without permission of the Board of Health.

Sec. 10—Fire Safeing shall comply with the Mass. Safety Code.

Article 32. To see if the Town will vote to amend Sec. 9 (a) of the present zoning laws to read as follows: No building shall be erected within 25 feet of the side line of any street, or way designated as a street or right of way on any lot plan, subdivision, or development, or within 10 feet of any side lot line.

The polls shall be opened at 9:00 A. M. and will be closed at 8:00 P. M.

Hereof fail not, but make due return of this warrant, with your doings thereon to the Town Clerk, on or before the hour of said meeting.

The equipment of the Department amounts to the following:

There are snowplows for each piece of equipment.

All of the equipment is in good mechanical repair but the older trucks and the tractor need replacing.

A new tractor with a loading scoop, a brush mower, and plow would be a valuable addition in saving hand labor.

The town now has approximately 43 miles of road, having added two miles at Populatic and 400 feet at Mirror Lake at the last Annual Meeting. These roads need considerable work done on them. They are in very bad condition.

The major accomplishments of the year 1949 were:

1. Elimination of bad corner near the residence of E. C. Hale on Union Street.
2. Completing the tarring of Grove Street (approx. 2,000 feet).
3. Tarring King Street to residence of B. Wilson (approx. 1,800 feet).
4. Resurfacing approx. 6,000 feet at Populatic Lake.
5. Resurfacing and widening Seekonk Street for approximately 1 mile.
6. In addition many feet of resurfacing was done on various other streets.

During 1949, considerable work was done spraying poison ivy along the streets with good results. We hope to continue this project and eventually destroy the ivy.

The program was completed as required by the State.

We contemplate doing the following jobs in 1950:

1. Regrading and reconstructing the corner of Boardman St. and Route 115 to eliminate the blind corner and the pitch of the road.
2. Reconstruction of Main Street between Norfolk and City Mills. This job will require several years depending on the money available.

These members serve without pay, elect their own chairman, and meet from time to time during the year with the Selectmen and Town department heads to assist and advise on all town matters, particularly those involving expenditures. They check carefully all items of the Town Warrant and publish their recommendations before Town meetings. The Board also assists in preparation of the annual budget. Each year the annual town meeting appropriates a reserve fund which is administered by the Advisory Board to meet emergencies not otherwise provided for in the budget. The Board is the taxpayer's representative in all Town affairs.

As drought conditions have been very serious this year, particularly during the months of July and August, our payroll greatly exceeded the estimate for the year. Also, conditions were such that forest fire hose and two and one-half inch hose had to be purchased.

The new law requiring gas masks, effective July 1, 1949, again took away from our appropriation. These facts should explain our need for adequate appropriation.

Again we call your attention to the age and condition of present fire apparatus. The latest truck is now eleven years old, while the other apparatus is much older.

We hope you will seriously consider the article for new apparatus and equipment in the 1950 warrant. The town's buildings are increasing rapidly, many outside of hydrant limits and certainly in need of protection.

The apparatus requested and planned would be of the tank-truck variety, carrying a tank of about 700 gallons water capacity with a pump of suitable capacity. This would be arranged to give the apparatus two so-called live lines to work with immediately on arrival at a fire. One line of inch and one-eighth and one of inch and one-half suitable for both building and brush fires, in or out of the hydrant district.

We trust that you will see the need of this apparatus, and equipment for same.

Acting upon the recommendation of the Advisory Board and of the District office, Dept. of Public Welfare, at Brockton, the voters of Norfolk, at the adjourned town meeting (1948), created the office of The "Board of Public Welfare," and at the annual town meeting (1949) elected the present board.

Ruth Shea, 3 years

Ethel Bartell, 2 years

Francis Dineen, 1 year

After consulting with the Board of Selectmen and Doris Carr, social worker, the board had a brief outline of its duties and set out to do the best job possible. Meetings were arranged for the first and third Thursdays of the month.

From March (1949) thru December (1949), 44 old age cases have been aided at the cost of \$27,352.88. Fifteen persons have been aided under "Aid to Dependent Children." The money spent for this was \$5,-049.33 and \$1,797.48 was spent on "General Relief."

If the money spent for welfare in 1949 were to be compared with that spent in 1948, an increase would be noted. This can be attributed to two factors: 1st, an added number of recipients and 2nd a \$4.00, state sanctioned, monthly increase for "leisure time activities."

This board, and its social worker, have endeavored to do an honest job, in helping the needy and of spending the taxpayers' money. We hope that we have served you well.

During 1949, thirteen new service connections were installed bringing the total to 84. No additional water mains were installed so the total length of mains in service remains at 4.1 miles.

Average daily water consumption was 9,000 gallons. In this connection, an expression of appreciation is extended to water users for their cooperation in the conservation of water during the water shortage period which occurred during the Fall months. After the water warning was issued and the request made to conserve the water supply, the water consumption was temporarily reduced approximately thirty percent.

The drought period of 1949 caused many private wells to run dry. As a result, many voters have requested when the water mains will be extended to their respective sections of the town. Also private builders have asked for the basis on which mains can be installed and water supplied to homes built in new developments.

Any such extensions involving expenditures on behalf of the Town requires consideration and approval by the voters. In anticipation of the problems of financing future extensions, an article was incorporated in the 1949 warrant proposing a procedure for extending water mains,

whereby the cost of the extension would be apportioned between the immediate beneficiaries and the Town. This proposal was rejected.

Undoubtedly the question will be revived annually, so the Board of Water Commissioners recommend that the voters carefully consider the problems involved and be prepared to present their views at the annual Town Meeting.

Report of the School Committee

To the Citizens of Norfolk the School Committee submits its Annual Report:

Regular meetings of the School Committee are held at the School Building at 7:30 P. M. on the Thursday evening before the fourth Monday of each month, except during July and August. Special meetings are held when necessary.

All classrooms are being operated at more than maximum capacity. Our faculty is most satisfactory and shows a keen interest in the welfare of our children. The crowded conditions in each classroom present a challenge to our teachers to maintain the usual efficiency under the most trying conditions. Teachers and children alike are looking forward with optimism and vigor to the opening of our New Central School Building in September 1950.

The school budget continues to feel the pressure of higher costs in High School Tuition and of the increased numbers entering High School from our larger graduating classes. We will have over 80 pupils in High School in September 1950. Pupils in our elementary grades will number 275 more or less in September 1950. This is the largest enrollment ever in the Town of Norfolk, and will necessitate the addition of another regular teacher which will make our teaching staff the largest ever.

The School Committee wishes to thank all teachers, parents and citizens for its cooperation with the School Department during 1949.

Report of Superintendent of Schools

To the School Committee of the Town of Norfolk:

I hereby submit the report of the Superintendent of Schools after a period of four months in this position. Because of the short time I have been here, most of my time has been spent in study and observation of the educational system and plant operation as it is now and shall be in your new building in order to inaugurate a base for long-range planning and plant operation as school administrator. Therefore, I plan to evaluate my observations, mention major changes and show briefly the objectives we should bear in mind in the future.

Following this report are reports of the Principals, Supervisor of Home Economics, Supervisor of Art, and School Nurse. The reports of the Manual Training Supervisor and Supervisor of Music have been omitted due to the short time they have been engaged in Norfolk.

Change in Administration

Last June Mr. E. Perley Eaton, former Superintendent of Schools here for six years, resigned to accept a similar position in Athol. Superintendent of Schools George C. Roy in Massachusetts School Union #33 was elected to replace Mr. Eaton. We are all indebted to Mr. Eaton for the progressive advancement in Education made during his administration. We extend our best wishes for success and happiness to him in his new position.

Changes in Personnel

The following resignations became effective at the close of school in June: Supervisor of Music, Walter Smith; Supervisor of Manual Training, Ralph Pearson; Grade III, Dorothy Magraw; Grade II, Dorothy Frye. Appointments to these vacancies will be noted in the listing of the personnel. To the above we offer our appreciation for services rendered our schools and wish them continued success in their new endeavors.

This was an increase of \$2,716.68 over 1948 that the Town of Norfolk received from the Commonwealth on account of Education.

In 1950 Norfolk should receive from state sources in its treasury on account of Education a little more than in 1949. This will come chiefly on account of Superintendent of Schools salary. The new figure will approximate \$1,244.44 as compared to \$450.56.

Tests

Before the end of the present school year, we are planning to administer both group intelligence as well as group achievement tests. The former measures the innate ability to learn while the latter measures book knowledge which has been acquired. These will be used for diagnostic purposes. The individual cases will be studied and the weaknesses of each pupil will become the starting point for learning in his case.

Reading and Phonics

The aim of reading is primarily comprehension of the meaning or content of sentences. The objective of phonics is to acquire ease in the pronunciation of words. Since the goals of each differ we are scheduling the reading and phonics separately.

Legislation—1950

A bill, S-87, sponsored by the Massachusetts Council of Public Schools would increase state aid to schools by 15 million dollars.

Involved in the proposed formula are net average membership and local amount of money spent on Education in terms of the state average spent on Education. Communities that would invest more than the state average of local funds in Education would receive more proportionally than communities that spend less than the state average.

Instruction

The proper teaching infers the mental, physical, social, and emotional development of the pupil. The student should have an objective, have assignments which he is able to do, have an opportunity to acquire the basic skills, but be guided by the teacher to see beyond the immediate problem and be given a chance for personal judgment when he is old enough. Norfolk is fortunate to have teachers who are quite capable based on the above. A reasonable amount of the question and

answer method, recitation, reporting, testing, writing methods, along with the socialized procedure, project method and visual aid techniques is our objective of presentation.

New Building

This report would be incomplete if we were to omit reference to your new school. In my opinion your Building Committee Members, your School Committee Members have given unselfishly of their time and effort; your townspeople have accepted the need for a new school; and in September you will see the fruit of your combined efforts materialize.

As to location the site of your school building is large enough and is as near the center of your community as circumstances permit. With the new site many outside athletic and physical education activities should be developed. The school itself should allow for more modern techniques in teaching. Many of these were too difficult to put into practice in the present classrooms due to lack of space and equipment. Modern schools use movable furniture which is the only type now sold by school furniture supply houses. Tile floors in the corridors and classrooms should prove serviceable and practical. Incandescent lighting will allow the proper candle power throughout the building.

The fact that the plans for your building have been approved by the Office of the School Building Assistance Commission speaks very highly for your Committees.

Recently I read the following: "It is difficult to prepare for tomorrow, today with yesterday's tools." Certainly a school building is a most important tool of Education. You in Norfolk will be in keeping with the times now and in the future with your new modern school plant.

Conclusion

In closing I wish to thank the members of the School Committee, the members of the Building Committee, the Principals, the members of the entire School Personnel and the Townspeople for their whole-hearted cooperation.

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL—CENTER SCHOOL

To the Superintendent of Schools:

The writing of the Principal's report for the past few years has been as much of an expressed hope for things to come as a summary of things accomplished.

Due to the splendid response of Norfolk citizens at the Annual Town Meeting of 1949, and the cooperative efforts of the School Committee, Superintendent of Schools, and the School Building Committee, we can now speak in the positive, inasmuch as the proposed new school building is a growing reality.

Following is a brief summary of Center School activities for the School Year 1948-49. The teaching staff of the school itself experienced but one change. Mrs. Ruth Fernald was assigned to Grade III in place of Mrs. Dorothy Magraw who was elected to a position in Millis. The new supervisors are:—Art, Mr. Frederick Wellsman; Music, Mr. Roland Young; Manual Arts, Mr. William Edwards.

The Class Day Exercises, Class of 1949, were well presented. The theme was "Stephen Foster, His Life and Musical Works." The musical numbers from his compositions were delightfully sung by the members of the Glee Club.

The Scholarship Prize and the Good Citizenship Prize, previously awarded by the Teachers' Club and the Norfolk Men's Club were not given this year. The Norfolk Neighborly Club prize of twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) presented to the member of the Senior Class in Walpole High School from Norfolk was presented to David Winslow. The Fales Scholarship, a most substantial award made annually from the Fales Scholarship Fund, was awarded to David Freeman, who is now attending Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute, Troy, New York. Also, one was awarded to Thomas Jackson, a student at Boston College.

The teachers have endeavored to sustain scholarship standards in the Grades and to prepare the pupils of junior high level for the work ahead of them in senior high school.

We no longer need to call attention to the handicaps of instruction and recreation in our schools as the solution of these problems lie ahead in the new school and its ideal environment.

The teachers were pleased to welcome Mr. George C. Roy as the new Superintendent of Schools in Norfolk, and found him most co-

operative in all respects. To him and the members of our School Committee we express sincere appreciation for the professional spirit of good will and understanding prevailing in our work together.

A bus ride to the Children's Museum was enjoyed by Grades I and V. Movies in the Children's Theater and a personally conducted trip and lecture through the museum with lunches eaten before the fire in a large fireplace added to the pleasure of the outing.

The Annual Field Day with its program and contests ended with refreshments of ice cream and cookies for the boys and girls. The large crowd of parents and friends who attended showed the splendid interest which has always been demonstrated at this school.

With the new school building under construction, the children and teachers are looking forward to entering it with great joy and anticipation. I know that there will be a slight note of regret, at least on my part, at leaving City Mills School.

To the Superintendent of Schools:

The program for Grades Seven and Eight has been in the main about the routine program of previous years. The Seventh Grade girls have learned the fundamentals of sewing, including basting, hemming, running stitch and back stitching. Instruction is also given in the use and operation of the sewing machine.

The Eighth Grade girls have worked upon the usual three units of meal preparation—breakfast, luncheon and dinner. They occasionally provide special spreads for the School Committee, teaching staff members, etc., as practical units of instruction.

The girls receive credit in 4-H Club work also, as both Grade Seven and Grade Eight girls are enrolled in projects under supervision of this department. The Center School enjoys a fine record in sustaining the extra curricula 4-H work and finds these activities both interesting and helpful.

Report of the Supervisor of Art

To the Superintendent of Schools:

The modern trend in Art Education is away from teaching drawing and painting as isolated subjects and towards teaching art as an integral part of everyday living. In this way emphasis is placed on all children, rather than on the so-called talented child. The program is based on the common problems that arise in the course of everyday living, including such subjects as home furnishings and decoration, daily dress, and decorating for social functions.

Art has become an outlet for stimulating ideas. The grade school teacher has found that she can provide incentive and stimulus through a variety of activities. Results are fundamentally good. Art has become a highlight of the school program.

The study of color throughout the grades has been based on the mixing of the three primary colors. The use of magazine illustrations plays an important part in presenting to the students possibilities of the everyday use of color in home decoration, fashions, foods, community planning, etc. Our cut paper work provides unusual and invaluable training in three dimensional design.

The eighth grade project in community planning should result in many interesting three dimensional models of modern homes. This subject enables the students to apply their varied abilities and knowledge of color to a practical problem.

Report of the School Building Committee

To the Citizens of Norfolk:

The School Building Committee herewith submits its report.

Since the voters of Norfolk unanimously approved upon March 21, 1949, the recommendations of the School Building Committee, much has been accomplished to put into action the machinery to erect our much needed school building.

Final drawings and specifications were prepared by the M. A. Dyer Co., and after careful examination by the Committee and after some changes, final approval of the plans and specifications was given and bid proposals were advertised for opening September 29, 1949, at 8:00 P. M., at the Fire Station.

Seventeen general contractors bid on the job and as many sub-contractors submitted bids for heating, plumbing, electrical and roofing contracts. The lowest general contract bid was in the amount of \$212,000.00. After investigation as to the integrity, ability and capacity of the bidder, your committee voted to accept the lowest of the three low bidders. The contract was signed in the amount of \$212,000.00 on October 7, 1949, with the Harty Construction Company of Boston. It is expected that the building will be completed on or before July 7, 1950.

Ground was broken upon Thursday, October 13, 1949. Brief exercises were held by the Town Officials, School Committee Members, the teaching staff, and the pupils from the Center and City Mills Schools. A glorious October day gave its blessings to the occasion.

At the time of the printing of this report the construction of the new Central School building is well underway. This project has been on the minds and in the hearts of many of our citizens for more than twenty years. To these people and all the voters of Norfolk who have made it possible for us to realize this dream goes the deepest gratitude of our children and their teachers. Most sincerely they thank you for the chance to study and play, for they will now possess opportunities equal to those of their neighbors in nearby towns.

Once again, the School Building Committee desires to thank all the voters and interested citizens of Norfolk who cooperated with us in developing this civic project to its present state of near completion.
