## REPORT OF BOARD OF SELECTMEN

Meeting 2nd and 4th Mondays at 8:00 P.M.

The parking lot has been completed and is being used daily by a large number of parkers. This parking area has relieved congestion at and near the stores and post office to a considerable extent. We expect to black top it in the future.

In May a dedication ceremony was held at the Town Hall for the purpose of dedicating the World War II Memorial tablet which was erected earlier in the year. Some grading and planting was done just prior to this affair in an effort to enhance the setting of the monument.

At this time we would like to make note of the fact that Norfolk Grange No. 135 donated the shrubbery which has been planted on either side of the stone.

This board, in conjunction with the School Committee, carried through a polio vaccine program for first and second grade pupils. We will cooperate to the fullest extent with any further program at such time the State shall direct.

At Mann's Pond an effort was made to improve conditions at the beach area by widening the beach both in length and depth. This area was also covered with sand and some rubbish barrels were installed. The townspeople are indebted to the Wm. Ray family for allowing the use of the pond as a swimming area. An additional swimming area is badly needed in town. The Recreational Committee is working at this problem now.

An effort to recondition the skating rink at the rear of the tennis courts was made with some success and a pole has been installed on which we hope to erect flood lights. We feel that any project which will be beneficial to the young people of the Town is a very worthwhile program.

We would like to call your attention to an article which we were requested to insert in the warrant by a group of representatives of the youth of Norfolk. This article calls for an appropriation of money to purchase a piece of land on Boardman Street from Mr. Ervin Ware. These young people hope to be able to use this site for recreational purposes and possibly erect a small meeting place.

The layout of Boardman Street is just about completed and work will be started this year.

We would also like to call your attention to the fact that it was not necessary to hold a special town meeting during the past year.

**WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING**

**Monday, the Fifth Day of March, A.D. 1956**

THE COMMONWEALTH OF MASSACHUSETTS

NORFOLK, ss.

To either Constable in the Town of Norfolk, in said County,

Greetings:

You are required in the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, to notify and warn the inhabitants of Norfolk, qualified to vote in Town affairs, to assemble in the New School Auditorium on Monday, March 5, 1956 at 12:00 o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles, viz:

Article 1. To choose by ballot the following town officers, viz: One Moderator, for one year; one Selectman, for three years; to act as Board of Health; one Town Clerk; one Town Treasurer, one Collector of Taxes, one Tree Warden, two Constables, each for one year; one Trustee of Public Library, for three years; one member School Committee for three years; two Water Commissioners, one for one year and one for three years; one Assessor for three years; one member of Board of Public Welfare for three years; two members of Planning Board, one for one year and one for five years.

Article 2. To see if the Town will vote to fix the salary and compensation of all elective officers of the Town; Moderator, Selectmen, Town Treasurer, Town Clerk, Tax Collector, Tree Warden, Assessors, Board of Public Welfare, Board of Water Commissioners, School Committee, Planning Board and Regional District School Committee.

Article 3. To grant and appropriate money for all necessary Town expenses as follows, viz:

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year begin-

ning January 1, 1956 and to issue a note or notes therefor payable within one year, and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with Section 17, Chapter 44, General Laws.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury, a sum of money for Chapter 90 Highway Maintenance or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury, a sum of money for Chapter 90 Highway Construction, or take any action in relation thereto.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury, a sum of money for Chapter 81 Highway Maintenance to be used with a sum of money allocated by the State, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated funds in the Treasury, a sum of money to be used for Highway maintenance and construction, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from Water Revenue a sum of money for Water Department Maintenance, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury, a sum of money from the Machinery Fund to the Machinery Maintenance Account, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 11. To see if the Town will appropriate from Surplus Revenue the amounts of the State and County share on Chapter 81 and Chapter 90 projects with a proviso that the sums received from State and County are credited back to Surplus Revenue upon receipt, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury a sum of money to provide for spraying by airplane of insecticides for the control of mosquitoes and Gypsy Moths which cannot be reached by spraying from the roads, or take any other action in relation thereto

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury or transfer from overlay, a sum of money to purchase a new Police Cruiser and grant permission to the Board of Selectmen to trade or sell the present Police Cruiser, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury, a sum of money to restore the tennis courts on Main Street to proper playing condition, or take any other action in relation thereto. Petition.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury, a sum of money to resurface Ash Road, or take any other action in relation thereto. Petition.

Article 16. To see if the Town will appropriate a sum of money for mosquito control in accordance with a bill now before the Legislature entitled "An Act Creating a Mosquito Control Project in Norfolk County", or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to prohibit hunting on private land without the written permit of the owner, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to abandon that portion of Lake Street from Medway Street, south-westerly 1300 feet, more or less, to poultry house of Lewis A. Rawl, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Water Commissioners to negotiate for the purchase of land for the protection and development of a well field, as recommended by the engineering firm of Whitman and Howard, for which test borings have been completed, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to Amend Section 2 of Chapter 1 of the ZONING BY-LAWS of the Town of Norfolk dated March 16, 1953; To include in the Industrial Area as follows: (C) A parcel of land on Dedham Street from Wrentham line, Northeasterly to property of Commonwealth of Massachusetts, Easterly to a depth of approximately 1800 feet to property of N. Y., N. H. & H. Railroad (Wrentham Branch) and Westerly to a depth of 1400 feet.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate by a bond issue or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury a sum of money to extend water service from the Jones residence on Cleveland Street to a point of service at or beyond the Molloy

residence on Cleveland Street, depending on subscribers beyond said point of service, under the conditions of Article 17 as voted at the Annual Town Meeting on March 6, 1950, or take any other action in relation thereto. Petition.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a tract of land owned by Ervin D. Ware on Boardman Street; Said land comprising two acres more or less and bounded as follows: Northerly by land owned by Town of Norfolk known as Medway Branch, westerly by Boardman Street, easterly by Joseph Roche, Jr. and Lillian Carpenter Johnson, and southerly by land of Olaf Olson, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury, or transfer from overlay a sum of money to purchase sanders for the highway department, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury, or transfer from overlay a sum of money for capital costs for the King Philip Regional School District, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 25. To see if the Town will choose any Committee or to hear or act on the report of any Committee or Town Officer or to instruct any Committee or Town Officer.

The polls shall be open at 12:00 A.M. and will be closed at 8:00 P.M. Hereof fail not, but make due return of this warrant, with your doings thereon to the Town Clerk, on or before the hour of said meeting.

Voted to authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning January 1, 1955 and to issue a note or notes therefor payable within one year, and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with Section 17, Chapter 44, General Laws.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury, a sum of money for Chapter 90 Highway Maintenance or take any other action in relation thereto.

Voted to raise and appropriate \$1,000.00.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury, a sum of money for Chapter 90 Highway Construction, or take any action in relation thereto.

Voted to raise and appropriate \$2,000.00.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury, a sum of money for Chapter 81 Highway Maintenance to be used with a sum of money allocated by the State, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Voted to raise and appropriate \$3,450.00.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated funds in the Treasury, a sum of money to be used for Highway maintenance and construction, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Advisory Board recommends to raise and appropriate \$2,950.00.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to transfer from Water Revenue a sum of money for Water Department Maintenance, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Voted to transfer from Water Revenue \$7,000.00

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury, a sum of money from the Machinery Fund to the Machinery Maintenance Account, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Voted to transfer from Machinery Fund to Machinery Maintenance \$3,293.13.

Article 11. To see if the Town will appropriate from Surplus Revenue the amounts of the State and County share on Chapter 81 and Chapter 90 projects with a proviso that the sums received from State and County are credited back to Surplus Revenue upon receipt, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Voted to transfer from Surplus Revenue \$20,650.00.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury a sum of money to install and maintain two street lights on Tucker Road; one street light in front of package store of Lawrence Curtis on Myrtle Street; and one street light at corner of Main Street and Carlson Circle.

Voted to install two street lights on Tucker Road, to relocate one of the present street lights on Myrtle Street to a location in front of the package store of Lawrence Curtis on Myrtle Street. Further recommends to raise and appropriate \$60.00 for this item.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury a sum of money to provide for spraying by airplane of insecticides for the control of mosquitoes and Gypsy Moths which cannot be reached by spraying from the roads.

Voted to raise and appropriate \$1,500.00.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury, a sum of money for the dedication of the World War II Memorial.

Voted to raise and appropriate \$300.00.

Article 15. Voted to authorize the Board of Selectmen to lease to Norfolk Post American Legion the land and buildings known as City Mills School for a term of five years at \$1.00 per year.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote: For all future extensions of water mains, the water takers on such extensions shall be charged the regular water rates plus a 3 percent annual charge for the cost of the extension and installation of an eight inch line for a period of fifteen years, and that the Water Board be authorized to enter into contracts with such takers whereby said takers shall guarantee payment of such three per cent annual charge for said period of fifteen years in addition to the regular water rates, and that all other persons desiring to connect to said extension within the fifteen year period be obligated to pay such proportionate part of the original cost of the extension as said Board decides is fair and just, for the remainder of the fifteen year period, provided a contract entered into with said Board and that all contracts hereunder shall be signed and delivered to the said Board before any money shall be expended on any extension. All such contracts shall be recorded by said Board in the Registry of Deeds of Norfolk County and shall constitute a lien on the premises affected hereby, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Voted no.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate by a bond issue or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury a sum of money to install approximately 4000 feet of water mains on Everett Street from the residence of James Valentine to the Wrentham Town line and to install in the Town of Wrentham approximately 1600 feet of water mains to make a connection with the existing main in the Town of Wrentham under the conditions of Article 17 as voted at the Annual Town Meeting on March 6, 1950. (Petition)

Postponed indefinitely.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury a sum of money to pay the principal and interest on the bonds voted in Article 17 becoming due in 1955.

Postponed indefinitely.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate by a bond issue or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury a sum of money to extend the water mains northerly on Rockwood Road a distance of approximately 3500 ft. to land formerly owned by Estella Callahan, now owned by William Oblaczynski, under the conditions of Article 17 as voted at the Annual Town Meeting on March 6, 1950.

Postponed indefinitely.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury a sum of money to pay the principal and interest on the Bonds voted in Article 19 becoming due in 1955

Postponed indefinitely.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury a sum of money to resurface Tucker Road for a distance of approximately 2000 feet, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Voted to raise and appropriate \$500.00.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury a sum of money to resurface Chestnut Street a distance of approximately 400 ft. or take any other action in relation thereto.

Voted to raise and appropriate \$300.00.

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury a sum of money to purchase a new tractor for highway department and grant permission to the Selectmen to trade or sell one Oliver Tractor and one McCormick Tractor, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Voted to transfer from Surplus Funds \$5,000.00.

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury a sum of money to purchase a fire truck and grant permission to the Board of Selectmen to trade or sell one 1929 Model A Ford Fire Truck or take any other action in relation thereto.

Voted to transfer from Surplus Funds \$3,000.00, and moved for the sale or trade of one 1929 Model A Ford Fire Truck.

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to change Chapter 1, Section 3 of the Zoning By-Laws, first paragraph, to be read as follows: In a residential district no building shall be erected which is designed or intended to be used for mercantile, mechanical, manufacturing or other commercial use on land situated in a residential district and no foundation or cellar hole shall be used as a residence except as hereinafter provided.

Voted: Yes, 99; No, 13.

Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to amend Chapter 1, Section 3 of the Zoning By-Laws, sub-topic No. 3 relative to trailers, busses, or other mobile units to read as follows: Parking of trailers, busses, and mobile units, or use of trailers, busses, or other mobile units for residence in excess of thirty days.

Voted: Yes 74, No 28.

Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to amend Chapter 1, Section 8, of the Zoning By-Laws, to read as follows: In residential districts as provided in Section 31 and laid out after the adoption of this By-Law shall provide for each dwelling a minimum frontage of 150 feet and a minimum lot area of 30,000 square feet. Lots shown on any plan duly recorded by deed or plan at the time this By-Law is adopted may be used, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Voted: Yes, 121; No, 1.

Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to amend Chapter 1, Section 9 of the Zoning By-Laws to read as follows: The percentage of lot which may be covered by any building used for dwelling purposes shall in no instance exceed the following maximum provisions: (a) one family: Twenty-five percent, and no building shall be erected within fifty feet of the side line of any street, nor within twenty-five feet of a side line; nor within twenty-five feet of any rear lot line, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Voted unanimous.

Article 29. To see if the Town will vote to add to Chapter 1, Section 10, Paragraph D, of the Zoning By-Laws, to read as follows: A permit under which no work is commenced within six months after issuance shall expire; or take any other action in relation thereto.

Voted unanimous.

Article 30. To see if the Town will vote to amend Chapter 1 of the Zoning By-Laws by adding a new section to read as follows: Section 11: Enforcement A. Whoever violates any provision of this By-Law shall be liable to a fine of not more than twenty dollars (\$20.00) for each violation. B. If any owner, agent or occupant fails to obey any lawful order of the Inspector of Buildings with respect to any violation or any use contrary to the provisions of this By-Law, the Inspector of Buildings shall revoke any permit issued for the occupation of the premises, shall make complaint to the Supreme Court or any court of competent jurisdiction for an injunction or order restraining further use of the premises and shall take any other action that may be necessary to enforce the provisions of this By-Law, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Voted unanimous.

Article 31. To see if the Town will choose any Committee or to hear or act on the report of any Committee or Town Officer or to instruct any Committee or Town Officer.

Voted that the Moderator appoint a Committee of Five, one of them to be a member of the Water Board, to make a study of the water question and report to the next Annual Town Meeting.

Voted to continue the present recreational committee.

## REPORT OF THE WATER DEPARTMENT

During the past year, 21 new house services were made. This brings the total number of services up to 230.

There were no extensions made to the system during 1955.

Mr. Roy Jacobson of Boardman Street is the Collector of Water revenue and all inquiries and payments of water bills should be sent to him.

Mr. Edwin Pink of Union Street is the superintendent of the Water Department. His phone number is Franklin 1486W. Due to the fact that Mr. Pink is employed on a part time basis, it helps materially if he is given advance notice of water installations so that he can plan his work.

The water commissioners have put an article in the warrant asking for the authorization to negotiate for a tract of land for the protection and development of a well field. The location has been tested for quantity and quality by the firm of Whitman and Howard, engineers for the water department. Their tests show the supply is adequate and the location is very good because the tract of land is some distance away from any houses. This source of supply has also been approved by the State Department of Public Health.

The board feels that the townspeople should give this article serious consideration at this time while the land is assessed at a low value.

While it is true that the present system of buying water from the Norfolk Prison Colony and the Town of Wrentham is satisfactory, we are virtually tenants at will and should plan for the future development of our own supply and pumping system.

#### REPORT OF THE MOTH SUPERINTENDENT AND TREE WARDEN

Insect pest control was carried out by means of aerial spray. During this program, approximately 1500 acres of town property and 155 acres of Prison Colony property were sprayed with DDT, and satisfactory results were obtained in the control of Elm Leaf Beetle, Gypsy Moth, Tent Caterpillar, and Mosquitoes. Later in the summer, however, we were pestered by a serious infestation of Japanese Beetle, and, following the August floods, Mosquitoes in quantity. Norfolk was not unique in these respects, as both insects constituted a state-wide problem. With these Summer infestations in mind, it is hoped by this department that funds will be available for both an early and a mid-season aerial spray program.

The function of the Tree Department has been, and will continue to be, threefold.

First, we share with towns throughout the entire section of the state the problem of dead and dying Elm trees. Since last Winter, over 80 trees have succumbed to Dutch Elm Disease in Norfolk. Shade tree laboratories are working at top speed in an attempt to find an effective means of control, but, so far, the only procedure to be followed is the removal of infected trees at the earliest possible stage. This is sometimes costly, but always necessary.

Secondly, there is the condition of our roadsides to be improved. Working in conjunction with the Highway Department, we are removing brush and undesirable trees which are impairing visibility along the roads, and, in several instances, are actually encroaching upon the traffic lanes. Such work has been done on parts of Pond Street, King Street, Tucker Road, and Boardman Street between Rockwood Road and Main Street. We expect to progress with this phase of our work, choosing the more critical conditions as our primary objectives, until the entire town has reached a stage of optimum landscape beauty with minimum hazard to traffic.

The third, and not the least important function of the department has been to provide necessary overhead clearance on our roads. The County specifies 14 feet as minimum clearance, and it is an obvious fact that low branches on many of the roads reduce the clearance to far less than that. With the truck traffic in mind, Route No. 115 has been completed satisfactorily, as has the entire length of Main Street. Hazardous spots on other streets have been rectified, but this operation must continue until every road in the town meets the county requirements.

Norfolk has a wealth of natural beauty which is being revealed and augmented as work progresses. This beauty being the concern of the entire community, we can best express our appreciation for past cooperation by inviting future suggestion and recommendations.

I would like to submit the following report of the Civil Defense Agency for the year 1955.

The Auxiliary Police unit has had an active year conducting drills and attending classes in instruction on Auxiliary Police duties. At present we have eighteen men fully equipped and trained, five men that are in training, and openings for two new men. Full strength of the unit has been set at twenty-five active men. A turkey raffle was held in December to raise funds to purchase winter clothing for the men. Your Auxiliary now stands ready and able to be of real use to the town in any emergency that may require their help.

Our Communications Officer Albert Leverone has set up an excellent communications system. By the use of Ham radio and police and fire radios the town is able to work all of the surrounding towns. A direct radio contact with Sector State Civil Defense Headquarters in Stoughton is now in operation. By the use of a State Police Receiver we are able to keep posted with State Civil Defense Headquarters in Natick. I believe that Norfolk has the best radio set-up in the area.

Mrs. Loreda Dybes has been appointed Chief of the Women's Services and is now in the process of organizing the unit. Your Civil Defense Unit needs the help of the ladies as well as the men and we will welcome all who wish to join.

A First Aid course is almost ready to start. A public notice will be posted in the near future and it is my hope that all will take advantage of this course.

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## REPORT OF THE KING PHILIP REGIONAL SCHOOL DISTRICT COMMITTEE

Since March 1955 your Regional School Committee has held 46 regular meetings and approximately 20 special meetings. It has also made a number of visits to other schools and has met frequently with the Massachusetts School Building Assistance Commission (hereafter referred to as the M.S.B.A.C.) and with officials of the Massachusetts Department of Vocational Education. By following this program it is felt that we have taken full advantage of all state aid as well as technical advice available to us.

### Organization

On April 7, 1955 an organizational meeting was held at which the following officers were elected: Hugh McC. Marshall, Chairman; Edward H. Hemmingsen, Vice-Chairman; Seth A. Armen, Treasurer and Phyllis B. Bailey, Secretary. At this time it was also voted that Mr. Frederick J. Delaney would become the Regional Superintendent, when

this office was to be filled, and that the School Superintendents of Norfolk and Plainville, presently Mr. George C. Roy and Mr. Laurence G. Nourse, would become Assistant Superintendents. However, until these positions are filled, about July 1956, these three men were engaged to work as Educational Consultants. As the work progressed, other Committee members were appointed to assume responsibility for various phases of the work such as: Mr. Melvin Chevers, publicity and art work; Mr. Goodwin and Mr. Freeman, insurance; Mr. Bond to work on acquiring land and titles in cooperation with our Counsel Mr. Harry Webb; Mr. Skinner on fire protection and safety; Messrs. Freeman, Goodwin and Chevers on salaries, and Messrs. Hemmingsen and Ravinski as organizers and committee representatives of the vocational advisory groups—Mr. Hemmingsen on Machine Shop and Mr. Ravinski on Carpentry and Woodworking.

The Vocational Advisory groups to whom we are grateful for their able assistance are as follows:

Applicants for position of Clerk of the Works were interviewed on June 15th and Mr. Leo F. Tetreault of Walpole was chosen by the Committee on June 29th.

#### School Site

As previously reported, the decision to build the Regional School on Franklin Street was made after thoroughly investigating six other locations and finding that the contour of the land and character of the soil made it the most economical from the standpoint of grading and drainage. Professional appraisers established fair land values: A topographical survey was made by Mr. John Warren.

The results of percolation tests and borings were excellent; approval was obtained from the town Planning Board of our general plot plan and a new right of way for owners of lake shore property and the land was purchased after a public hearing was held for all owners and abutters.

A small parcel of land has been purchased between Shears and Franklin Streets upon recommendation of the Mass. Highway Dept. in order to obtain a safe and practical main entrance for school busses from Route No. 140. Every effort has been made to execute the land purchasing with fairness and consideration and the Committee sincerely appreciates the cooperation received from the land owners.

#### **Roads and Entrances**

In locating and obtaining approval of entrances and exits to the school property the Committee has consulted with and followed the advice of our architect, state and local highway engineers and town officials. Provision is being made for other possible entrances and exits should the need arise at some future date.

#### **Building Plans**

The Educational Specifications, drawn up by the Consultants, formed the basis from which they arrived at space requirements. These gave the architect information required for preliminary plans. Many drawings were submitted, much time spent in study and many changes made after our first meeting on plans with the M.S.B.A.C. before preliminary plans were finished and approved by the Educational Consultants, the Committee and the M.S.B.A.C. on November 2, 1955. The teachers from the three towns were also consulted in this work to get their advice and suggestions on details affecting the facilities in their various fields of instruction.

Between November 2nd to January 18th, 1956 when final plans were submitted by the architect, frequent meetings were held with his engineers to work out details of equipment coming under the general contract. Equipment to be used for instruction and recreation will be purchased under separate contract.

Four sets of final plans were delivered to the Committee on January 18th for study by the members from the three towns, the Consultants and Clerk of the Works. Specifications were ready a week later and a meeting is scheduled with the M.S.B.A.C. for January 30th to get their final approval.

#### **Vocational Training Program**

The Vocational School program has been set in accordance with state regulations and with the advice of Mr. Leslie J. Nutting, Supervisor of Trade and Industrial Education, who has been very helpful and cooperative. Based on surveys conducted by him and the Consultants, he recommended the teaching of House Carpentry and Machine Shop Practices. At this same time, Messrs. Hemmingsen and

Ravinski were appointed as Committee representatives to organize and carry on the work of the vocational advisory groups for the Machine and Carpentry Shops. The names of group members from industry are listed under Organization.

On November 16th, Mr. Nutting accepted the machinery lists suggested by the advisory committees and a month later obtained free, two lathes with all attachments valued at \$4,608, from government surplus. We hope to get additional tools and equipment from this source for both shops.

The background and knowledge of Messrs. Hemmingsen and Ravinski, together with the advice of industrial men on the vocational advisory committees has made it possible to plan for extensive training on both shops.

The woodworking shop is planned so that it will be flexible, offering instruction in house framing, cabinet and interior finish work, as well as millwork and the erection of prefabricated homes in accordance with the demands of this locality.

The Machine Shop will be equipped to lay a good foundation for training in this field so that students will be prepared for more advanced work and study either in industry or schools.

In addition to the two vocational shops, a strong industrial arts program will be included in the regular school curriculum. An experienced and capable director will administer the vocational program and advise on industrial arts, working closely with guidance and other school officials. He will start work early and assist in setting up the shops and installing equipment so that the program will be well organized when school opens.

#### **The Architect**

In choosing Walter F. Gaffney Associates, as our architect we feel that we are fortunate. His contract was not signed until June 3rd but he had already done much preliminary work. Mr. Gaffney, his assistants and engineers have been most cooperative and open minded to suggestions. They have devoted an immense amount of time to the work and have been glad to meet with the Committee and Consultants at all times.

#### **Publicity and Budget Information**

In accordance with the agreement drawn up in our brochure, the Regional School Committee has endeavored to keep town officials and voters posted on our plans and progress. This has been done through numerous press releases, open P.T.A. meetings and conferences with

selectmen, finance committees and other town officials. The name King Philip was chosen on April 21st after receiving suggestions from students in all three towns. The school seal, designed by Mr. Chevers, bears King Philip's mark or symbol which he used in signing treaties with the early settlers.


All information pertaining to the financing of the regional school has been covered with the three towns. In review—\$15,000 was voted by the three towns on November 15, 1954 at special town meetings for preliminary planning and an additional \$5,000 was voted at the regular town meetings in March 1955 for operating expenses—on June 1, 1955 the Committee voted to bond for \$110,000 to cover architect fees and other planning costs and so notified the selectmen of the three towns—professional estimates of school building costs were received on October 5, 1955 and reported to town officials at a meeting held on October 27, 1955—the 1956 budget was approved on November 23, 1955 and on December 14, 1955 it was voted to bond in the amount of \$2,215,000; notices were sent to the selectmen of the three towns on December 16th and subsequently this information was released to all local newspapers. It should again be pointed out that over \$100,000 of this amount will be reimbursed by the state in payment of planning costs. This is not part of the percentage the state pays toward the building cost.

As this goes to press on January 24, 1956, our schedule calls for plans and specifications to be submitted to contractors for bid on February 6th. Such bids will be due and received on March 6th and general contract bids opened on March 9th. As soon thereafter as possible the general contract will be awarded and construction started.

The chairman and members of the Regional School Committee wish to express their sincere appreciation for the full cooperation received from all townspeople and officials. Every effort will be made to justify the confidence placed in them.

## REPORT OF SCHOOL COMMITTEE

To the Citizens of Norfolk:

The School Committee submits its Annual Report.

Regular meetings of the School Committee are held at the Principal's Office at 7:30 P.M. on the Thursday evening before the Fourth Monday of each month, except during July and August. Special meetings are also held when necessary. Parents and any citizen of the town may attend any regular or special meeting to discuss any matters that do not come within the scope of the regular duties of the School Principal or Superintendent of Schools. Please contact the Superintendent if you are coming to a meeting in order that time be allotted for your visit and a definite time arranged for your appointment.

The School Committee again wishes to emphasize the rule for entrance age for children into our elementary school. Children who have reached the age of 5 years on or before the first day of April may enter the first grade in September of that year. No exception can be made to this rule and the Committee wishes to thank the parents for their cooperation in this regard.

We are pleased to report that our Superintendent of Schools, George C. Roy, and Director of Instrumental Music, Warren S. Freeman, have received their Doctor of Education degrees, and we wish to extend to them our sincere congratulations. Our school system is enriched by their academic achievements.

The school program, under the able direction of our Superintendent, our Principal, and Assistant Principal, continues to function in a most satisfactory manner. Our entire staff is cooperating in the best interests of our children and we continue to progress.

The Instrumental Music Program, now in its second year, has more than come up to our expectations and children and teachers alike are very enthusiastic over the results.

The elementary school building is adequate at the present time for the number of pupils in the building. Some classrooms have more pupils than is desirable for ideal conditions, but we expect to be able to make adjustments to improve this condition.

It appears almost certain that the King Philip Regional High School will be ready for occupancy in September of 1957. At that time 3 additional classrooms will be available to take care of our grades 1 thru 6.

The school budget for 1956 has been set at \$111,000. All items in the budget have been kept at a minimum and the amount requested is necessary to maintain our schools at the present peak of efficiency.

The School Committee again wishes to express its thanks to the entire school staff for its loyalty. To the parents and all citizens of Norfolk, who so generously cooperate with us, we thank you.

## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Committee of the Town of Norfolk:

Herewith I submit my seventh annual report as Superintendent of Schools in Norfolk. It includes a report of the Principal, Supervisors, School Physician, and the School Nurse. This gives us a brief review of the local educational happenings during the year just closed.

### Personnel

During the calendar year 1955, the following resignations took effect: Mrs. Barbara Strelke, Miss Ann O'Brien, Mrs. Priscilla Sargent, Miss Helene O'Toole, Mrs. Marjorie Werner and Mrs. Beverly Penniman, R.N.

### Second Year Programs

For the second consecutive year, three phases of the educational program, namely the Rinehart Handwriting System, the Instrumental Music Program, and the Cooperative Film Plan, have been in effect.

It would seem in order to repeat the major objectives of the Handwriting Program:

1. To teach the pupils to read and write both cursive handwriting and hand lettering (manuscript).
2. To predicate all techniques on the idea that the welfare of the child is of major concern and that everything possible will be done to insure correct posture and angle of vision. All handwriting and hand lettering will be built on the natural writing slate of the child in order that this correct posture and angle of vision may be maintained with ease and reduce to a minimum the problem of transition from lettering to cursive handwriting in the third grade.

3. To provide expert guidance and consultant services.
4. To insure a tenable handwriting philosophy based on extensive research and experience.
5. To provide adequate instructional and motivational materials for teachers and pupils with careful direction and follow-up to see that these materials are properly used.
6. To make adequate provision for individual differences as it relates to the handwriting of each child, also to permit teachers to proceed at the rate best suited to the class.
7. To give adequate attention to the problem of the left-handed writer and make available effective tests to determine the ratio of dexterity in prescribing for a beginner.
8. To teach the concomitants of neatness, accuracy and attention to detail along with a mastery in technical handwriting.
9. To achieve and surpass national norms in speed and quality of handwriting.
10. To teach handwriting with a minimum expenditure of time, effort and materials without over-emphasis on this subject.

We refer you to the Handwriting Report by Mr. William Rinehart, Director of the Rinehart Handwriting System for the program noted the first year.

Our Director of Instrumental Music, Dr. Warren Freeman, former Dean of Music at Boston University, received his Doctor of Education degree from the School of Music, Boston University, last summer. Progress of this program will be found in the Instrumental Music report.

The film cooperative plan has allowed us to have different educational films each month. Millis, Wrentham, Plainville, Norton, Foxboro, Franklin, and Mansfield, are the other school systems participating in this program. To date this plan has been accepted very enthusiastically.

#### **Conferences**

When parents wish conferences with the teachers, principal, or superintendent, concerning school business, these may be arranged by calling Franklin 1225.

It is our policy to schedule the parent-teacher conferences after school hours in order that each teacher carry on her regular program. We encourage cooperation between the home and the school and believe that if problems arise, conferences between parents and faculty members are most helpful.

### **Plant**

For the second consecutive year the addition is being used for the two first and two second grades. All other classrooms, with the exception of one which is being used for the Superintendent's office, are being used for their original purpose. Next September the one now used as an office will be used as a classroom. This will again fill the building, plus the addition, to capacity. In 1957 it is hoped that the new King Philip Regional High School will be open to ease the local school housing situation.

### **Operation**

Mrs. Gertrude MacBride was relieved of her teaching duties in September. She is now able to devote her full time to administration and supervision. We feel that under this plan results have been extremely gratifying.

In October, Miss Leanna Johnson was hired on a part-time basis as a secretary for the Superintendent. One can easily see the need for this service. There is considerable paper work, including correspondence, ordering and purchasing of books and supplies, preparation of payrolls and bills for payment. This arrangement has worked out well

### **Insurance**

For the third consecutive school year the \$1.00 per pupil per year school policy has been offered on a voluntary basis. Any student attending the Central School, as well as those attending high school from Norfolk, are eligible for the accident insurance at a cost of only one dollar a year. Applications are received each September and notices are sent home for parents concerning the policy.

This plan in which participation is entirely voluntary protects the student during the policy term for injuries received:

- (1) attending school during the hours and on the days when school is in session,

- (2) traveling directly to or from the Insured Student's residence and the school for such session, coverage not being effective not more than one hour before the time school begins and not more than one hour after the Insured Student is dismissed from school.
- (3) participating in school sponsored activities; except that this policy does not cover
  - (a) injuries resulting from participation in interscholastic sports by Insured Students enrolled in grades 9 through 12, including regularly scheduled practice sessions therefor or travel to and from such contests or practices,
  - (b) eyeglasses or prescriptions therefor,
  - (c) dental surgery, service or repair except as provided in Part A,
  - (d) air travel except as provided in Part C,
  - (e) war or any act of war (declared or undeclared), or
  - (f) treatment by any person employed or retained by the school.

"If the Insured Student, because of covered accidental bodily injuries, shall require the services of a registered graduate nurse, treatment by a physician or surgeon, or any necessary hospital care or service the Association will pay for the expense actually incurred for such items, provided such expenses are incurred within twenty-six weeks from the date of the accident, but in no event shall the total for all such items exceed, in the aggregate, \$2,500.00 for any one accident; except that in case of injury to one or more sound, natural, unfilled teeth, the amount payable under this Part A shall not exceed \$50.00."

In addition this policy covers a phase which we trust we will never need. In the event of dismemberment or death, additional payments are made.

We are pleased to report that exactly 292 are participating in this insurance this year. All payments requested of this company have been paid to date.

#### **Professional Attitude**

During the year teachers, principals, school committee members and superintendent have attended several professional meetings relating to the various phases of education. These meetings serve not only as a meeting place to hear and participate in the numerous educational programs but give each of us an opportunity to exchange ideas on countless educational topics with those in attendance.

Interpreting this information in relation to our own school system is most valuable.

By way of example your Superintendent attended the Massachusetts Conference on Education at the University of Massachusetts on September 8, 9 and 10. This probably was one of the most outstanding conferences on Education in the Commonwealth. About fifteen hundred people from all walks of life attended the conference. Six keynote addresses were given by six outstanding individuals. Topics were as follows:

Topic I—"What Should Our Schools Accomplish?"

Topic II—"In What Ways Can We Organize Our Schools More Efficiently and Economically?"

Topic III—"What Are Our School Building Needs?"

Topic IV—"Teacher Shortage and Teacher Supply Problems in Massachusetts."

Topic V—"How Can We Finance Our Schools—Build and Operate Them?"

Topic VI—"How Can We Obtain a Continuing Public Interest In Education?"

Some of the agreements concerning the first topic "What Should Our Schools Accomplish?" follow:

- "1. Retarded and Gifted Children deserve special attention with care for social development.
2. Priority must be given to Good Citizenship with Human Relations Workshops on the interdependence of man.
3. More emphasis on Moral values and religious attitudes.
4. The Teacher, and the Parent also, are the most important examples of Citizenship."

The second topic relating to organizing our schools more efficiently and economically formulated in part the following conclusions:

- "1. Majority felt elementary schools should house 150-800 pupils and secondary from 500 up to 1500 with a very strong majority opinion in favor of 300 pupils for both elementary and secondary.
2. Emphasis should be placed on the importance of subject matter to determine class size.
3. Citizens should encourage the support of special projects (e.g. psychiatric services").

Topic III which dealt with school building needs made in part the following deductions:

- “1. Schools should be built for community use under proper control and with the school use given priority.
2. What constitutes ‘fads and frills’ in school buildings depends largely upon the tastes of the community. It is a matter of local determination.
3. The Massachusetts Public Building Regulations are in need of continuous revision or they affect public school buildings.”

“Teacher Shortage and Teacher Supply Problems in Massachusetts” was topic four. Some conclusions were:

- “1. State teachers colleges and private institutions do not have the building facilities and personnel to handle additional enrollment.
2. Group felt standards for teachers should not be lowered. Raising of standards annually as planned by state law should attract more capable teachers.
3. Initial salaries should be increased.”

The financing, building and operating of schools, a problem for all communities, was topic five. Some conclusions were:

- “1. State should assume more financial aid.
2. Federal government should assist financially to a certain extent but not interfere with operation.
3. Group felt state aid should be based on ability of community to pay.”

To maintain the proper continuing public interest in Education, the sixth topic, it was felt that the following should be done:

1. Local businesses and other organizations should work to develop an effective public relations program showing the public that it has an important investment in public education.
2. Pupils should be encouraged to enter the teaching profession.
3. Lay groups should keep in mind the proper balance—scholastically and athletically for school programs.

### **Applying Findings Locally**

We are awaiting developments of the Norwood Area Mental Health Association. It appears that a Youth Guidance Center sponsored by the group will open in 1956. If this materializes and if Norfolk participates, it will be an asset for securing valuable information for the exceptional child.

Our elementary enrollment falls within the ideal number. At the secondary level the proposed enrollment of the King Philip Regional School falls within the ideal number.

Norfolk should be proud of the Central School. It is functional and in spite of the heavy rains caused us no great difficulty. It was erected economically and probably is one of the most economically constructed public schools in the state.

Teachers are very important in educational progress. Salaries in our general area are factors in hiring teachers.

Financing, equipping, operating school plants confront all. More funds must come from the local, state or federal levels. Each of you may do your part by notifying your representatives at the local, state or national level to carry out your wishes.

Education is the concern of all. The purposes of education at the turn of the twentieth century were to impart knowledge and to make pupils good.

In the first half of the twentieth century the base of education has stretched out greatly. Percentagewise more and more are remaining in school. Education today extends into the vocational as well as the professional areas.

A citizenry made up of young men and women who will respect the laws with their privileges and obligations is needed. Citizens of the town must never forget that education of our youth is the business of all, that the strongest defense is the best offense. Students today become tomorrow's leaders.

### **Enrollment**

There were 373 pupils enrolled in grades one through eight on October 1, 1955: Grades 1—46; 2—53; 3—43; 4—53; 5—51; 6—36; 7—38; 8—43. Enrolled in Walpole High School were: Grade 9—34; 10—25; 11—14; 12—21. Wrentham—1; Franklin—1. Two boys are attending Norfolk County Agricultural School, and three girls are attending the Peabody School in Norwood.

Next September it appears that we shall have approximately 43 pupils in grade 9; 73 in grades 10—12; making a total of 116 in Walpole Junior and Senior High Schools.

Until last September, when the eighth grade pupils graduated from the Central School they entered Walpole High School as members of the Freshman Class. Walpole was using the 8-4 system, which means that there were eight grades of elementary and grammar school and four years of high school. In September 1955, Walpole put into effect the 6-3-3 system: six years of elementary school; three years of Junior High; three years of Senior High School. The present ninth grade Norfolk students are now in the third year of Junior High School; the tenth grade students in the first year of Senior High; the eleventh grade students in the second year of Senior High, and the twelfth grade students in the third year or seniors in High School.

Before students graduate from the Central School an earnest effort is made to guide and direct them into the proper secondary school course. Ability, past performance and interest of each pupil, are important in determining the decision. Parent conferences in this connection are arranged at times for the good of the student.

Arrangements have been made with the Walpole Junior and Senior High School authorities to contact parents by phone daily when pupils are absent. We appreciate the cooperation rendered by the Walpole authorities, particularly Mr. Harold Strout, Principal of Walpole High School, Mr. Leonard Downes, Principal of Walpole Junior High School, and his Guidance Director, Mr. John Tokaz. Through the above officers a close contact is maintained of all Norfolk pupils attending Walpole High and Junior High School.

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## REPORT OF NORFOLK CENTRAL SCHOOL

To the Superintendent of Schools:

We herewith submit the report of the Norfolk Central School.

In the observance of American Education Week invitations were issued to the parents and citizens of Norfolk to visit the classrooms where the teachers and pupils were at work. The response was excellent, as many parents took advantage of this opportunity to become acquainted with the kind of work carried on at our school.

Because the staff desires to have a close working arrangement between the home and the school, parents are urged to call the office to make an appointment for a conference with their child's teacher. These parent-teacher conferences afford an opportunity for the exchange of ideas which look forward to improved educational experiences for the pupils.

To an experienced teacher probably the most outstanding observation is the many individual differences to be found among any group of children. Children of the same age vary widely in emotional and physical maturity, academic aptitude and special talents. Perhaps the

greatest difference between a good school today and many schools of fifty years ago is the recognition of such differences and a desire to give each child his chance to learn and to develop to his fullest capacity in accordance with his own abilities and talents.

It should be clearly understood that our elementary school places great importance on the basic skills and that the development of reading, oral and written expression, and number work occupy much time and thought on the part of teachers and much of the time of the pupils. Science, the social studies, art, music, handwriting and physical education also contribute to the educational program.

Our school strives to develop efficient habits of work; to encourage the growth of appreciation and ideals and moral values; to help the child achieve health of mind and body; and to help to develop the kind of attitudes which will result in a satisfactory adjustment to living.

National Book Week was observed with a display of posters and an exhibition and description of books of a very early date. We are especially grateful to the Norfolk Public Library for its cooperation in lending a large number of books at all grade levels.

As in the past, the School Department has afforded the pupils of the sixth grade the opportunity to study natural science and wild life through the bi-weekly instruction presented by the Massachusetts Audubon Society's Nature and Conservation program under the direction of Mrs. Manley and Miss Rademacher. Extensive study of our natural resources and the out-of-doors was made. This was climaxed by a trip in May to the Moose Hill Wild Life Sanctuary in Sharon.

Each year the pupils of our Central School prepare a special program to be presented at a regular P.T.A. meeting. At the April meeting a very fine operetta entitled "The Royal Playmate" was given by the pupils of grades five and six assisted by flower choruses from the lower grades. This was under the direction of Miss Elinore Cole, our Music Supervisor. The songs and costumes were enjoyed by all. In November the members of the P.T.A. were entertained by the pupils of grades five, six, seven and eight. This program was in the form of an old-fashioned musical concert. A band demonstration was also included. Later in the year the pupils in the first four grades will participate in a P.T.A. program.

The members of the faculty and the students of the Central School are most appreciative of the P.T.A.'s efforts in sponsoring the Field Trips each spring.

The eighth grade girls again had the privilege of participating in 4-H Club work through the sewing classes conducted every Wednesday afternoon from two to two-thirty o'clock. Each girl entered one article in the 4-H Contest Day held at the Norfolk County Agricultural School in Walpole in May. Dish towels, aprons, blouses and skirts were entered and many ribbons were received by the girls. In addition, three girls entered the Norfolk County Dress Contest and were awarded second and third prize ribbons. Since this was our first attempt at making dresses, we were most satisfied with the outcome.

In a well-balanced school program correlation between subjects in the curriculum is necessary. Much correlation between art and the social studies is always worthwhile. With this thought in mind, S.P.C.A. posters were made in grades six, seven and eight. Some of these posters stressing kindness to animals were entered in the annual S.P.C.A. contest with the usual gratifying results.

The Norfolk Teachers Club's accomplishments during the year 1955 have facilitated areas in our school program. Some of our funds were used to purchase a three-way portable radio to be used for emergencies, a portable electric dual unit for our health room and a light-weight folding metal table for general use in our classrooms and auditorium. Again this year we have added to the mobile library unit with the purchase of many fine books.

Each member of our organization has been assigned to a committee and each committee has a specific duty. The groups are as follows:

1. Educational Committee
2. Program Committee
3. Social Committee
4. Sunshine Committee

Through these sections the work load has been distributed throughout our ranks.

In closing we wish to thank you, the members of the School Committee, the faculty, the pupils, the custodian, the parents and the townspeople of Norfolk, for the excellent cooperation and loyalty which were extended to us throughout the year. This was deeply appreciated at all times.

## REPORT OF PHYSICAL EDUCATION SUPERVISOR

To the Superintendent of Schools:

As Physical Education Instructor, I hereby submit my annual report:

Our Physical Education program is built around our seasons. During fair weather we use our spacious play area which has room for three ball fields plus many other types of outdoor games.

Seventh and eighth grade boys and girls use separate play areas at all times. The sixth grade pupils have a section by themselves. Grades four and five play together in a generally combined area. The primary playground which is used by grades one, two, and three, is located quite near the building and is definitely apart from the rest of the play areas. Each part is supervised daily during recesses and after lunch periods.

During the inclement weather or extreme cold we employ indoor games, sometimes using the auditorium, other times our respective classrooms.

Our games consist of basic skills and variations of these skills. As we progress into the year our games require more and more abilities. This year we are planning to incorporate some of these games in our program for higher grade levels. Volleyball, handball, table tennis and deck tennis are among our aims. We have baseball, basketball, and gymnastic teams.

In the springtime we shall hold our annual Physical Education Evening at which time we shall invite the parents and friends of the children of the Norfolk Central School.

## REPORT OF HANDWRITING

To the Superintendent of Schools:

I am pleased to submit the following report on the operation of the handwriting program in your schools for the school year 1954-1955.

In the initial handwriting tests administered to your pupils in September 1954, 16.5% received a grade of "A" (Excellent); 22.4% received a grade of "B" (Good); and 61.1% scored less than "B". In the tests administered to your pupils in June 1955, 81.1% received a grade of "A"; 12.3% received a score of "B" and 6.6% scored less than "B". Handwriting Certificates were awarded to 44% of your eighth grade pupils.

During the school year we graded approximately 3000 samples of handwriting for your pupils. A formal test was administered at four teaching week intervals and a report was furnished each teacher giving a careful diagnosis of the handwriting of each pupil in her room.

We furnished the following instructional materials: teachers' outlines, pupil folder outlines, room motivation certificates, handedness tests, individual certificates to pupils who qualified, envelopes, etc.

My supervisors join with me in expressing our appreciation for the splendid cooperation we have received from you and your teachers at all times. We are very pleased with the results obtained in your school.

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## REPORT OF MUSIC SUPERVISOR

To the Superintendent of Schools:

I am happy to report another year of progress in Music in the Norfolk School. Much credit must be given to the grade teachers who during the week carry out the methods introduced in our brief lesson periods.

New books have been purchased for each grade, except the third. The new series, *The American Singer*, contains a wealth of beautiful songs, carefully graded and well correlated with other subjects. The books in the third grade, while not of the same series, were purchased recently and are of a recent edition.

In March, children from the first six grades presented an operetta, which was well performed and well received. Thanks to several teachers and parents, the costumes were extremely colorful. Several boys from the upper grades assisted in constructing scenery.

In April, the seventh and eighth grade chorus shared honors with the band at an evening concert. The same group performed at the graduation program, and gave an even better performance.

This fall, the children of the four upper grades presented, in costume, a choral program of Early American Music. Due to our brief period of preparation, the performance was not as excellent as could have been desired, but the spirit of the group was splendid, and the audience was friendly and pleased with the effort. This was only one of the many times I have been assured of the loyalty of the children and the encouragement of their parents.

I am always conscious of the support and enthusiasm of Mrs. MacBride, and eternally grateful for the unfailing assistance of Miss Day. Truly, it is a joy to teach in Norfolk!

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## REPORT OF INSTRUMENTAL MUSIC

To the Superintendent of Schools:

I have the honor to submit to you my second annual report covering the work in instrumental music in the Norfolk public schools for the year 1955.

During the past year our school band has consolidated the gains made during the early period in the fall of 1954. The band has maintained a membership of about 50 members during the past year. Although a number of excellent players were graduated, and are now taking part in the instrumental music programs in high school, another group was started in the summer and fall of 1955 to take the places of these students who have left the school.

The band made several public appearances during the past year. For the first time, a band representing the school took part in the Memorial Day exercises on May 30. In addition, the band played at the

dedication of the monument in the Town Square, and also gave a public concert with the Dudley junior high school band of Dudley, Massachusetts. A return concert featuring the same musical selections was given in Dudley in April of 1955. The band also took part in a program for the Parent-Teacher Association during the fall of this past year.

One of the most important developments in the band program during 1955 was the organization of a band parent's club. The purpose of this new organization is to provide the support which the band needs to carry on its regular program. An open meeting of the band parent's club is scheduled for January 26, 1956, during which time officers for the year will be elected and plans worked out for various projects to aid the band during the coming year. It is expected that this new organization will give the parents an opportunity to help the boys and girls in the band and at the same time provide the necessary moral and financial support which is important to the all-round development of a school band.

Our string program, although small, has continued during the past year and opportunities have been provided for all students who wish to have string instruction to take part in the program. During the summer of 1955 a very successful summer program was operated. This was a self-sustaining operation with the pupils paying a small tuition fee.

Due to the expansion of the program and the large number of students served, it was necessary to obtain the services of an assistant. Mr. Walter Lewis, a recent graduate of the New England Conservatory of Music, has been assisting in the program during this past year. The availability of Mr. Lewis has made it possible to carry on a full program in the school

In closing may I express to you my sincere thanks and appreciation for the splendid cooperation which you have given as superintendent of schools. Mrs. MacBride, principal, has been most generous in her cooperation. ## REPORT OF ART SUPERVISOR

To the Superintendent of Schools:

Art at the grade school level should be creative fun. If centered around the needs of the student the art program will provide a means whereby each individual pupil takes pleasure in expressing himself as an individual.

If this is the value of art it will be clear that adult evaluation of pupils' work can be either constructive for all concerned or constructive for a few at the expense of their fellow students. Further, it is believed that honest presentation of free hand rendering best sustains and encourages the natural urge to create, which lies within each young child. (The mimeographed stencil has its values but they should not be mistaken for creative ones).

The function of the art supervisor is to supplement art work in the classroom. By introducing new uses for conventional materials, and new materials wherever possible; by helping pupils organize their ideas and themselves for group projects can a supervisor help the developing pupil. Especially in grades one through three must the strongest emphasis be placed on the ability for original and imaginative thinking: quite second to this, the smoothness of execution. By encouraging those students who are of an age where self-criticism plays a natural part of their growth to improve their draughtsmanship and their appreciation for colors, composition and textures through a closer observation of the natural world does a teacher help the young artist to maintain his self-confidence while gaining in ability—without sacrificing his creative imagination in the process.

## REPORT OF HEALTH DEPARTMENT

To the Superintendent of Schools:

I hereby submit the report of School Health Activities for the year ending December 31, 1955.

The School Health Department's duties consist of regular physical examinations, control of communicable diseases and consultations with the faculty on psychological problems. In addition, we render first aid, examine heads, test eyes and ears. The major objective of our program is to establish good personal hygiene among the children. Through the excellent cooperation of our teachers, good health habits are formed by the children at an early age.

**Pre-School Physical Examinations.** A pre-school clinic was held in April for the purpose of registering pupils entering public school in September for the first time. Each pupil was given a physical examination by Dr. Stagg with a parent present. Thus the parent was given an opportunity to talk with the doctor about her child. If the child had a physical defect or was in any way handicapped, necessary adjustments were made.

**Massachusetts Vision Test.** The Massachusetts Vision Test does not constitute a complete visual analysis, but rather it is designed to screen out those cases which show departures from normal in several of the different visual skills.

**Salk Poliomyelitis Vaccine Program.** In April we learned that the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis would provide, through March of Dimes Funds, sufficient amounts of the Salk vaccine to the State Health Department so that it could be given in our schools under the supervision of the School physician and the local Board of Health. We had hoped that all children in our School system would have the opportunity to receive the Salk polio vaccine, but this year it was available only for the first and second grades.

Minor first aid treatments were given throughout the year and several pupils were taken home because of being ill at school.

The health of the children appears, as usual, to be above normal and communicable disease have occurred at no more than the expected rate. Measles, mumps and colds seem to have caused the greater part of absenteeism.

May we take this opportunity to thank Mr. Roy, Mrs. MacBride, teachers and parents who have so willingly helped us to carry out a good school health program.




