## REPORT OF BOARD OF SELECTMEN

The Board of Selectmen meets every second and fourth Monday of each month at 8:00 P.M. at the Selectmen's Rooms at the fire station. In the event of a special meeting being held, the Town Clerk is notified.

The tax rate showed a decrease of \$8.00 per thousand in 1960 which it is hoped will hold steady this year also.

The Board requested an examination from Civil Service for the position of Chief of Police. The eligible list has not been issued as yet by the Director of Civil Service.

Several polio clinics were held during the year. Due to the threat of an epidemic in Rhode Island, the response was very good with a large percentage receiving their full quota of three shots. It was interesting to note that a great many coming to these clinics were receiving their first shots.

The Town Counsel was called upon to defend two town boards as a result of court cases being filed against them. The first case of Leon King et al vs. Selectmen et al was heard at the Norfolk Superior Court and a decree dismissing same was entered. The Second case of Lewis Mariani et al vs. Board of Registrars et al was heard at Norfolk Superior Court and Suffolk Superior Court and a decree dismissing the case was also entered.

We would like to call your attention to the urgent need for a Highway shed. It was very evident during the severe cold and snow of this year that a building that is heated and dry is necessary to properly maintain a fleet of trucks. An article for your consideration has been inserted in the Annual Warrant regarding this matter.

The Board would welcome a visit from any interested resident at any or all of our meetings.

## REPORT OF THE TOWN CLERK

Proceedings Annual Town Meeting—Monday, March 7, 1960

**For the Year Ending December 31, 1960**

COMMONWEALTH OF MASSACHUSETTS

Norfolk, ss.

At a legal meeting of the inhabitants of the Town of Norfolk qualified to vote in town affairs and elections, held in the New School, Monday, March 7, 1960, at 9:00 in the forenoon under a warrant issued by the Selectmen and dated February 12, 1960, duly attested and posted by Nels T. Carlson, a Constable of Norfolk, action was taken on the articles after the Election Officers were sworn in by the Town Clerk.

Article 1. To choose by ballot the following town officers; viz: One Moderator, for one year; one Selectman, for three years; (Selectmen to act as Board of Health); one Town Clerk; one Town Treasurer; one Collector of Taxes; one Tree Warden; two Constables, each for one year; one Trustee of Public Library, for three years; one member School Committee, for three years; one Water Commissioner, for three years; one Assessor, for three years; one member of Board of Public Welfare for three years; one member of Planning Board for five years; one member Regional District School Committee for three years.

Article 2. To fix the salaries of the several elective offices of the Town, and to determine whether any Town Board shall be authorized to employ for additional salary or compensation any of its members and to fix such salary or compensation.

Voted to fix the salaries of the several elective offices of the town as follows: Moderator, \$1.00; Selectmen, \$600.00; Town Treasurer, \$1,100.00; Town Clerk, \$300.00 plus fees; Tax Collector, \$1,600.00 plus fees; Tree Warden, \$2.00 per hour; Assessors, \$2,250.00; Board of Public Welfare, \$300.00; Board of Water Commissioners, \$225.00; School Committee, \$225.00; Planning Board, \$250.00; Regional District High School Committee, \$150.00.

Voted that the Town authorize the Board of Water Commissioners to appoint one of their members to the position of Superintendent as authorized under Section 4A, Chapter 41 and to be paid on an hourly basis of \$2.10 per hour, funds for the same to be obtained from the Water Department appropriation under Article No. 5.

Voted that the Town authorize the Appeal Board to appoint one of their members as Clerk and to set the rate of pay at \$1.50 per hour in accordance with Section 4A, Chapter 41 of the General Laws.

Voted that the Board of Selectmen be authorized to appoint one of their members, Samuel J. Johnston, as Deputy Chief of Police in accordance with the provisions of Section 4A of Chapter 41 of the General Laws and to set the rate of pay at \$2.06 per hour, funds for same to be obtained from the Police Department appropriation under Article 3.

Voted that the Town authorize the Board of Fire Engineers to appoint themselves firemen and to set the rate of pay at \$2.00 per hour in accordance with Section 4A, Chapter 41 of the General Laws, funds for same to be obtained from the Fire Department appropriation under Article 3.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning January 1, 1960 and to issue a note or notes therefor payable within one year, and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with Section 17, Chapter 44, General Laws.

Voted.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from Water Revenue a sum of money for Water Department Maintenance, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Voted the transfer of \$2,448.00 from Water Revenue to Water Department Maintenance Account and to raise and appropriate \$1,776.00.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury, a sum of money from the Machinery Fund to the Machinery Maintenance Account, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Voted to transfer \$2,731.14 from Machinery Fund to Machinery Maintenance Account.

Article 7. To see if the Town will appropriate from Surplus Revenue the amounts of the State and County share on Chapter 81 and Chapter 90 projects with a proviso that the sums received from State and County are credited back to Surplus Revenue upon receipt, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Voted to transfer from Surplus Revenue the sum of \$24,650.00.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury, a sum of money to purchase a new police cruiser and to grant the Board of Selectmen the right to trade or otherwise dispose of the present police cruiser or take any other action in relation thereto.

Voted to transfer from Surplus Revenue the sum of \$900.00.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to rescind an appropriation of \$1,800.00 made at the Annual Town Meeting, March 1959, for a replacement of the fire alarm system, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Voted No.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury, the sum of \$1,863.44 to pay Boston Edison unpaid bills for street lighting (\$262.87 in 1957, \$1,600.57 in 1958), or take any other action in relation thereto.

Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,863.44.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to accept Chapter 341, Norfolk County Mosquito Control Bill, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Voted to raise and appropriate \$2,569.17.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury, a sum of money for mosquito control, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Voted no action.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury, a sum of money to be used to build a new Town Garage, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Voted that the Selectmen appoint a Committee to make further study, and to report their findings prior to the next Annual Town Meeting.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury, a sum of money to construct a sidewalk on Main Street from the Center to Seekonk Street, or any part thereof, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Voted that the Selectmen appoint a Committee to make further study, and to report their findings prior to the next Annual Town Meeting.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate by a bond issue or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury, or raise by direct taxation, a sum of money to extend the water main along Boardman Street, beginning from the end of the Lars Peterson residence and running northerly for a distance of six hundred (600) feet, more or less, to be installed under the laws of Article 17 of the Town Meeting of March 6, 1950, and in addition the takers will pay the regular water rates, or take any other action in relation thereto. (Request of P. Prevett)

Voted No.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury, a sum of money to purchase a portable resuscitator and inhalator to be carried in the police cruiser, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Voted the sum of \$245.00 be transferred from Surplus Revenue.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury, a sum of money to install and maintain a street light on Union Street, pole 13-55, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Voted that the sum of \$20.00 be raised and appropriated.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury, a sum of money to surface (tar) Ware Drive, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint a committee to study the proper and safe storage of permanent Town records, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Voted to accept the recommendation that the Selectmen appoint a committee to study the proper and safe storage of permanent town records.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to accept Chapter 495, Section 8C of the General Laws of 1956 which authorizes the Town to establish a conservation commission to promote the development of natural resources.

An amendment by Gustaf Pearson regarding a vote to instruct the Board of Selectmen to appoint a Committee of seven to establish a conservation commission to promote the development of natural resources. So voted.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to accept as a Town Way a portion of Kingsbury Road from the end of the present Town Layout to the westerly lot lines of lots 6 and 17 (approximately 300 feet) as laid out by the Selectmen as shown on a plan recorded in the Norfolk County Registry District of the Land Court, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Voted to accept as a town way a portion of Kingsbury Road.

Article 22. To see if "the Town will vote to establish a quorum at Town Meetings" by adding Section 4 to Article 1 of the Town By Laws.

Amendment to question of whether a quorum at town meeting is necessary. Voted to include it in next Town Warrant.

Article 23. To see if the Town will choose any Committee or to hear or act on the report of any Committee or Town Officer or to instruct any committee or Town Officer.

**REPORT OF THE TREE WARDEN  
AND  
INSECT PEST CONTROL SUPT.**

Hurricane Donna caused a flurry of alarm, and its proximity seemed to justify the precautionary measures which were organized so efficiently by all town departments. Fortunately, the damage was relatively slight, and public hazard was quickly eliminated. This department wishes to congratulate and thank, publicly, all who co-operated so fully during this state of near-emergency.

Street tree planting was increased considerably this year. Norway Maple; Faassen's Red-Leaf Maple, Flowering Crab, and Flowering Dogwood were placed in desirable locations throughout the town. Also, after preparation by the highway department, the island in the town center was planted with flowering shrubs. A note of mild indignation may be found, however, in the report that, again, some of the trees were removed—not by vandals—but by someone with knowledge of proper transplanting techniques. This, in both the moral and the legal sense, is a serious offense against the public.

There was, for the second consecutive year, an encouraging decrease in the number of diseased elms. Excellent growing conditions, coupled with our previous sanitation program (the removal and disposal of all infected trees), are, without doubt, the factors to which this decrease may be attributed.

The Department's aims for the ensuing year:

1. A continued schedule of overhead trim and roadside thinning;
2. A spring spray program to combat elm bark beetle and tent caterpillar;
3. An increased amount of roadside planting of both shade and ornamental trees.

These practices, along with necessary tree removal, will continue to improve the town as a whole, both materially and esthetically.

## REPORT OF BOARD OF PUBLIC WELFARE

To the Board of Selectmen:

The Board of Public Welfare submits the annual report for the year 1960.

The total amount spent for Old Age Assistance and Medical Assistance for the Aged was \$20,840.18. The total number of cases aided was twenty-six.

The combined total spent on Aid to Dependent Children, Disability Assistance and General Relief was \$7,390.25.

1960 has been a year of many changes in the Public Welfare field.

The Medical Care Plan, a state wide plan providing competent controls while giving adequate medical care to the aged and needy, is of necessity continuously changing. A program of controlled medication was added to the Medical Care Plan this year.

In January of 1960 all who received Old Age and Survivors Insurance (Social Security) Benefits were granted an increase in their monthly award. This increase was deducted from our recipients standard budget as an added resource.

In July 1960 an increase of 5%, a cost of living adjustment, was granted.

As of October 1, 1960 a new category, to be known as Medical Assistance for the Aged was created by our legislators to conform with and take advantage of an Act under the Social Security Law passed by Congress in 1960.

On January 1, 1961 the Transportation Allowance given to Old Age Assistance recipients will be increased from \$2.50 to \$4.00 per month. As of January 1, 1961 recipients of Disability Assistance will, for the first time, receive a Leisure Time Activities grant of \$4.00 and a Transportation Allowance of \$2.50 per month.

Minor changes too numerous to mention have increased reports, case work, recording and clerical duties.

From time to time the Department of Public Welfare sponsors educational training courses for local, district and state personnel.

The Board of Public Welfare meets the first and third Thursdays of each month at 7:30 P.M. Recipients and prospective recipients may attend to discuss any problems.

During our first snow storm this winter, we had four trucks break down and require major repairs. However, the need for a garage was very evident in this emergency as it was extremely cold and we had no heated garage where we could even change plow blades. Fighting snow storms is tough work even when the equipment is adequate and the men have a place to get into to make the necessary adjustments and repairs such as changing blades and chains. Having no heated garage not only slows up snow removal operations but adds to the cost.

Due to the early snow storm and cold weather, we did not accomplish all the work we had planned because we had to spend the money on snow removal. However, we did the usual amount of resurfacing, repairing and drainage. We put in the curbing and shrubbery at the center, and widened the dump road which we hope to finish in 1961.

Chapter 90 Construction has been slowed up because of a large amount of ledge but will be finished early in 1961.

## ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF APPEALS

For the Year Ending December 31, 1960

The Board of Appeals held eleven (11) public hearings during the year 1960, six (6) on Zoning Law variances, two (2) on soil removal, two (2) on parking of house trailers, and one (1) on an advertising sign permit. One (1) Zoning Law variance request was approved, two (2) soil removal permits were granted, one (1) trailer permit was issued, and one (1) advertising sign permit was granted.

The Board of Appeals schedules their regular monthly meeting on the second Wednesday of each month when necessary, at the Selectmen's Rooms at 8:00 P.M. Any application to the Board of Appeals for a permit or Zoning Law variance must be in the hands of the Secretary of the Board by the fifteenth (15th) day of the preceding month.

Any applicant to the Board of Appeals must be present at his or her hearing, either in person or by an authorized agent, or no decision will be made by the Board.

Each application to the Board for a Zoning Law variance or a permit shall be accompanied by a fee of seven dollars (\$7.00) by check made payable to the Town of Norfolk.

The Board collected eighty-four dollars (\$84.00) in fees and paid out sixty-two dollars and thirty cents (\$62.30) for advertising expense.

Each application for a Zoning Law variance or a permit shall be accompanied by an accurate sketch, to scale, with dimensions of lot size, frontage, setbacks, street and side lines, building size, and street and lot number (if any).

Each application for soil removal shall be accompanied by an accurate drawing showing location, general contours and cross sections required to give a complete picture of the site, also the amount of soil, stone, loam, sod, or gravel to be removed and the reason for removal.

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## REPORT OF THE CIVIL DEFENSE AGENCY FOR 1960

Once again the past year was spent with emphasis on training and dissemination of information. A large amount of information was disseminated at the Health Fair held at the Central School last Spring. We would like to be able to mail all of the information pamphlets and other literature of interest to the townspeople directly to all individuals but the cost of such a program would be prohibitive. We do however, mail specific information to individuals who request it. If there is any particular piece of literature or other information you should desire we would appreciate hearing from you by post card or telephone.

The Auxiliary Police unit continued their training under the direction of the Regular Police Department and was also in attendance at several out of town training functions. This unit has recently been reorganized in an effort to enhance its functional ability during times of emergency. The unit was placed in service by the Chief of Police on a number of occasions during the past year. Much hard work was performed by the men of this unit during the Hurricane this Fall.

Two of the women members of Civil Defense were trained at the State level in "Fallout shelters and Home Preparedness". These women are now qualified instructors in these subjects and it is our hope that they will be able to present their program to most of the organized civic groups within the town in the coming year. "Fallout Shelters and Home Preparedness" are two very timely subjects that everyone should be familiar with.

Our communication unit was kept very active as always. Several drills were held throughout the year to keep its equipment and operators in peak performance. Once again this unit received a commendation award signed by the Governor and State Director of Civil Defense for excellence in achievement. The operators of this unit kept the station in constant contact with Area and State Headquarters for over 24 hours during the recent hurricane.

The radiology group under Dr. Barton was moderately active during the year. We would like to see more people take an interest in this very important arm of Civil Defense. We have all the necessary equipment. It was loaned to us by the State. What we need is more trained personnel to operate this equipment. We are planning to run another radiological instruction course soon and it is hoped that more people will show an interest in this very vital subject by their attendance at these courses.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all those who in any way contributed to the success of your Civil Defense Agency during the past year.

## TOWN GARAGE COMMITTEE REPORT

Board of Selectmen:

Gentlemen:

This committee has held four meetings and visited a number of other towns inspecting their garages and talking with the superintendents. After finding out the changes they would make and noting the size and cost of their buildings, Mr. Polson drew up a set of plans which incorporated the suggestions of the committee and the size and shape of the garage we feel would best serve the needs of this town.

This garage will be 40' x 60' with two doors in each end. It would be constructed of 12" concrete blocks and a suitable roof commensurate with the cost. There will be an office, toilet, two stock rooms (one for the Water Department and one for the Highway Department.) The furnace will be located in the center of the west side between the stock rooms. The committee recognizes the need of a garage and after much discussion recommend a building on the site of the present building of the size and plan approved by this committee. (This is a rough estimate. In order to give the exact cost, we would have to have final drawings.)

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## REPORT OF NORFOLK CONSERVATION COMMISSION

Board of Selectmen:

Annual Report for 1960

At the Annual Town Meeting held in March of 1960 the townspeople voted to accept provisions of Chapter 223, Acts of 1957, providing for the establishment of a Town Conservation Commission. Acting on this acceptance the Board of Selectmen appointed a Commission composed of 7 members.

During 1960 four meetings were held for purposes of organization and planning. Personnel from the State Department of Natural Resources were invited to attend the meetings to assist and guide the Commission in its formative stages. Much assistance was kindly given to the members from Mr. Frank Chase, Chairman of the Sharon Conservation Commission, one of the areas most outstanding boards. One field trip was taken which included inspections of the newly acquired Bristol-Blake State Reservation, the town's water-shed area, and two possible town recreation areas.

The purpose of the Commission is to promote and develop the natural resources and to protect the water-shed resources of the community. As the official resource agency of the community, the Commission maintains an index of all open lands (upland and wet-land) and makes recommendations to the State or municipality as to their proper use and management. It acts as the coordinating agency of the community on conservation matters. It may conduct researches on related problems and prepare informational and education materials for the community's benefit. It may accept gifts of lands, funds, or buildings on behalf of the community and manage donated or purchased properties in accord with the purposes of the act under which it is established. The Commission hopes that in the future, civic minded members of the community will donate gifts of land or buildings to the town to be managed as conservation areas as memorials to the donator or in memory of a loved one. Full information can be obtained from any member of the Commission as to the proper procedure to be used in making gifts under this act.

The Commission has been operating without funds during its first year of operation. A modest sum has been requested during 1961 in order to provide for basic working materials in order to do a more effective job during the coming year. Under the act authorizing its establishment the town may appropriate a sum not exceeding 1/20 of 1% of the assessed valuation, not to exceed \$15,000 in any given year. Money may be accumulated in a conservation fund and extended for any purpose consistent with the above, including the purchase of land.

## REPORT OF TOWN RECORDS COMMITTEE

Board of Selectmen  
Norfolk, Massachusetts

In accordance with our instructions we have made a study of the safe storage of town records.

We found that the Town Clerk's records are kept in two safes. Both are well beyond minimum voting age but are younger than the Town Clerk.

Although the fire-resisting abilities of the safes might be questioned, the information which they hold is, for the most part, on record with the state or county. Because of this duplication, a loss would be regrettable but not disastrous.

Current records are kept by the various Town Officials at different locations. The Tax Collector and the Assessors have safes. Again there is enough duplication so that if one location were destroyed the records could be reconstructed.

**CONCLUSIONS:** Provisions for safer storage would be of three types:

**IMMEDIATE:** It is our opinion that the purchase of a modern safe for storage of town records is not justified at this time. Because the records are, of necessity, in different locations it would not be practical to keep them in the safe.

**FUTURE:** In order to be completely protected records should share a common location. If and when it is decided to provide central Town Offices, a system for the storage and protection of records would be desirable.

**SPECIAL:** Certain past records of historical interest are not vital to the business of the town but, if destroyed, they would be irreplaceable.

**RECOMMENDATION:** We recommend that those town records which are of historical value and which are not in active use be placed in a bank storage vault. Such space may be rented reasonably, and the records will be preserved until proper central town facilities are created.

## REPORT OF THE SCHOOL COMMITTEE

To the Citizens of Norfolk:

The report of the Norfolk School Committee is hereby submitted for the year ending December 31, 1960:

Regular meetings of the School Committee are held at the Superintendent's Office at 7:30 P.M. on the Thursday evening before the fourth Monday of each month, except during July and August. Special meetings are held when necessary.

School business should be handled through the office of the School principal or superintendent, and they may be reached at their office in the Central School by telephoning Franklin 1225 for an appointment.

Last June, Mrs. Gertrude MacBride, Principal, retired after a period of forty-one years of loyal, faithful, unselfish and meritorious service to the town. Shortly after the Central School opened in 1950, following the death of Mr. Clarence Washburn, who was serving as Principal, Mrs. MacBride was appointed to this position. She has served the town in an outstanding manner. We wish her a long and pleasant retirement.

Mr. Eldred Readell, Custodian at the Central School, passed away on Wednesday, November 16, 1960. He took great pride in his work and did much for pupils, faculty and townspeople. He will long be remembered.

The Committee is pleased to announce the following appointments:

Miss H. Olive Day was raised to the position of Principal July 1, 1960 following Mrs. MacBride's retirement. She has rendered service for about twenty years in Norfolk serving as teacher and then as Assistant Principal-teacher. Mrs. Elizabeth Sefton, a sixth grade teacher, was appointed Assistant Principal-teacher at the same time.

The School Administration which includes the Superintendent, Principal and Assistant Principal, is constantly studying new methods and techniques and is reviewing the School program to see that it is kept up with the changing times.

In September 1961, the new entrance age to grade one will be five years, eight months or five years before the first of January for entrance the following September. This will be more in keeping with the overall state situation.

The Committee pointed out in its report last year that local pupils in grades seven and eight attending the King Philip Regional High School have made it possible for the classrooms formerly used in the Central School by these grades to be used by other classes. All avail-

able classroom space is now being used at the Central School. The Committee believes that plans should be made and studied for an addition to the Central School. An article in the Warrant covers this matter.

The teamwork of the faculty, administration, and personnel is outstanding and we wish to compliment them for their untiring efforts for the Youth of Norfolk.

To the parents and residents of Norfolk who cooperate with us may we express our appreciation.

## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Committee of the Town of Norfolk:

Herewith I submit my twelfth annual report as Superintendent of Schools in Norfolk. It includes reports of the Principal, Assistant Principal, and other key personnel.

In this brief report it is intended to give but a bird's eye view of the major activities of the school year.

In 1960 Mr. Harry Coulter who had served on the School Committee for years completed his term in March. He rendered faithful and untiring service for the benefit of the Youth of the Community.

### Personnel:

Last June, Mrs. Gertrude MacBride, Principal, retired after a period of forty-one years of service to Norfolk. She had served in about all teaching and administrative positions. She has served as Principal of the Central School practically since its opening. She replaced Mr. Clarence Washburn, deceased, shortly after the building was opened in 1950. Mrs. MacBride had under her jurisdiction pupils who were in class during the past ten years, and some years back had their parents and in many instances their grandparents. Yes, she taught three generations of pupils in many families. She has left a favorable impression upon pupils, parents, faculty and townspeople. She was recognized as an expert in her field by her colleagues. May we wish her a long happy and blessed retirement.

Miss H. Olive Day was appointed Principal to succeed Mrs. MacBride. Miss Day has been associated with the Norfolk Public Schools for twenty years. She had served as Assistant Principal and teacher for the past ten years at the Central School. She graduated from Bridgewater State Teachers College with a B.S. in Education degree in 1940. We are fortunate to have her in this important position.

Mrs. Elizabeth Sefton was named to fill the Assistant Principal's position when Miss Day became Principal. Mrs. Sefton graduated from Emmanuel College with a B.A. degree and has done graduate work at Harvard University and Boston College. We are pleased to have her in this Administrative position.

#### **In Memoriam:**

The Norfolk Central School suffered a great loss when Mr. Eldred Readel, Custodian, passed away. Mr. Readel who had been Custodian since the opening of the school in 1950 had rendered outstanding service. He was highly respected by pupils, faculty, parents, School Committee and Administration.

Miss Leanna Johnson, former Secretary to the Superintendent died the same day, November 16, 1960. She had resigned in 1959. She was respected by all.

#### **School Plant:**

The Central School now accommodates Grades One through Six. There are now fifteen classrooms.

At present the school enrollment up through grade six establishes a new high with a figure of 394 pupils in grades one through six. There were approximately 261 Norfolk students attending the King Philip Regional High School. The enrollment has been increasing for the past ten years and continues to do so.

The need for additional classrooms for the elementary grades is here again. It is expected that a Committee will be appointed to study all phases of this problem. Double sessions present serious problems. It is hoped that we shall be able to avoid them by having the much needed addition by September 1962.

At the National Level both Political parties mentioned the need of general support for education in their campaigns. The Republicans felt that there should be Federal support for school construction which would eventually affect teachers' salaries. The Democrats felt that there should be Federal support with a freedom of choice, decision to be made by the States for teachers' salaries and/or school construction.

For informational purposes all classroom area are used. The office of the Superintendent is now in the former Health Room. As mentioned in my report of last year, I recommend the study of a cafeteria along with four additional classrooms. In addition to the space requirements in education, importance of the teacher must be kept in mind. We are most fortunate in Norfolk to have on our faculty the quality of the staff that is maintained.

#### **Insurance:**

For the eighth consecutive year the Pupil School Insurance Policy has been made available on a voluntary basis to all students.

Applications are received each September and notices sent home for parents concerning the policy. We ask parents to consider the matter of the Pupil Insurance Policy seriously. To date all claims forwarded to the office have been paid. On the basis of the present price the charge is less than a cent a day.

#### **Professional Participation:**

The Norfolk Teacher's Club is active at four levels:

1. Local Level—Norfolk Teacher's Club.
2. County Level—Norfolk County Teacher's Association.
3. State Level—Massachusetts Teacher's Association.
4. National Level—National Education Association.

The Norfolk School Committee holds membership in the Massachusetts Association of School Committees. The Committee is represented at many of the area and state meetings.

Your Superintendent is serving for the fourth consecutive year as Secretary-Treasurer of the Massachusetts School Superintendents' Association. He follows legislation actively at the State and Federal levels. He is serving as Co-Chairman of the Legislative Committee of the Massachusetts School Superintendents' Association and also on the Advisory Council on Legislation to the State Board of Education. At the national level he is State Chairman of the National Education Association Legislative Committee.

Last year the School Union voted that the Superintendent spend a day a week in Norfolk and four in Millis.

If it is necessary to contact the Superintendent, appointments may be initiated through the office at the Central School.

**Entrance Age:**

It is well to note that the School Committee has formerly approved that the entrance age be five years, eight months as of the first of September or five years before the first day of January for entrance the following September. Following this entrance age the pupils will be older chronologically and mentally which will work to their advantage.

**Conclusion:**

Education is a state function. The control of our public schools is delegated to local school committees. The reimbursement from the state level is worthy of note. Please check the proposed budget for 1961 along with the reimbursements in this report. You will find that the state contribution is substantial, better than fifty per cent.

It would seem that support of federal funds for public schools will be extended in 1961.

Whether we support or oppose legislation at the state or federal level we should make our stand known to our representative accordingly.

You may feel certain that all of us are working for the Youth of Norfolk.

May I at this time extend my appreciation for the cooperation and assistance rendered by the members of the School Committee, the Principal, the Assistant Principal, the entire school personnel, all local organizations and townspeople.

## REPORT OF NORFOLK CENTRAL SCHOOL

To the Superintendent of Schools:

We are pleased to submit our first report as administrators of the Norfolk Central School.

Last spring the teachers and pupils were sorry to learn of the retirement of Mrs. Gertrude D. MacBride, Principal, who had faithfully worked in the Norfolk School system for forty-one years. To show our gratitude and appreciation for her untiring efforts over that period of time, a testimonial in her honor was planned for Saturday evening, June 11, 1960 under the direction of her successors and the Teachers' Club. This was a tremendous undertaking as we attempted to contact all former teachers in Norfolk from 1919 to the present time as well as citizens of the town. The cooperation we received from the townspeople was wonderful. At this time we sincerely thank all the citizens of the town for their loyal support, assistance, generosity and many kindnesses which contributed to the success of the evening.

In observance of National American Education Week an invitation was extended to all parents to attend Open House on Wednesday evening, November 9, 1960. Over two hundred parents took advantage of this opportunity. Each classroom teacher used the first fifteen minutes to briefly explain her daily schedule, her objectives, the methods used in her daily teaching and some of the projects or activities in operation in her classroom. The rest of the evening was consumed by five minute conference periods with the teacher. These enabled the teachers to become better acquainted with the home and helped to develop a clearer understanding of the child and his study habits.

Strong emphasis is placed upon citizenship training including self reliance, honesty, teamwork, leadership, initiative, courtesy, thoughtfulness of others and discipline. We believe these are most important as the pupil prepares for the part he will someday play in the community. He cannot develop the proper study habits necessary for the junior and senior high school unless he has pledged himself to adopt and maintain these principles of citizenship which are so indispensable.

The most important subject in our curriculum today is reading. At all levels our teachers fully realize the value of reading and place great emphasis on this subject in the educational program. No one method is used, but a combination of techniques helps to stimulate interest and a desire to read after the proper phonetic basis has been established. Vocabulary drills are included in the reading program.

In November we held an assembly in observance of Book Week. The purpose of this assembly was to stimulate interest in leisure time reading which is so essential for the successful student. The Trustees of the Norfolk Public Library were our special guests. We wish to thank the Library Trustees and the librarian for again allowing us to borrow books from the library for supplementary reading.

This fall the faculty and pupils were saddened by the sudden passing of Mr. Eldred Readell, our beloved custodian. Mr. Readell was very devoted to his work and took great pride in keeping the building in such excellent condition. He assisted in countless ways and we deeply feel his loss. In his memory new science reference books have been purchased.

Through the generosity of our School Committee we are able to participate in the Audubon Society Program. This supplements our regular sixth grade science course of study and is furnished on a bi-weekly basis to a combined sixth grade. We are fortunate this year to have Mr. Albert Bussewitz, the director of Moose Hill Bird Sanctuary in Sharon, as our instructor.

As has been our custom in the past, the boys and girls at all grade levels in the Norfolk Central School participate in the April P.T.A. program to show our and their appreciation for the class trips provided by the P.T.A. The theme of this year's program was "Music in the Children's World of Make-Believe." A great deal of poise and social training is gained by our boys and girls from the preparation and presentation of these programs.

From middle to late spring field trips are scheduled for each class. The purpose of these trips is to correlate the various classroom activities with actual experiences at the different levels. Trips this year were made to the Moose Hill Bird Sanctuary, Edaville Railroad, Children's Museum, Franklin Park, Capron Park and to Cinerama at the Boston Theater.

In addition, the sixth grades spend one day at the end of the school year as guests of the King Philip Regional School and receive very valuable information from this orientation program.

We are very grateful to our School Committee for allowing us to participate in these valuable extra-curricular enrichment programs. We feel that our pupils gain a great deal in citizenship training and leadership qualities from these programs.

It might be mentioned here that the boys and girls of Norfolk have earned, and justly so, a reputation for being an orderly, responsible, well-behaved group at all these outside functions. It is a pleasure for a teacher to accompany them, and they are a credit to their parents, school and community.

A most sincere word of appreciation should go to Mr. Walter Holmes whose unfailing courtesy and cooperation makes these field trips a pleasure for both faculty and pupils.

The Teachers' Club is again happy to have 100% membership of Administrative and teaching staff. We are, as usual, members of the Massachusetts Teachers' Association and associate members of the National Educational Association.

It is our pleasure to be honorary members of the Norfolk Neighborly Club and would like to take this opportunity to again thank them for their generous gift to be used for film strips. The Film Committee will make a wise choice to add to the already well-planned program. We are sure it will be appreciated by the children and teachers during the lunch hours these stormy months. The committee works throughout the summer using available resources of free and rented films that correlate with the curriculum of the classroom, the season and the weather. The teachers are provided with a copy of the program for the school year. In this way the children can be prepared for the film at their respective grade level. The films are arranged so we have more throughout the months when we expect to have the poorest weather.

The other committees, namely: Educational, Program, Social and Sunshine cooperate to make the school program more enjoyable.

The teachers also take pleasure in providing sports equipment, books, refreshments for the children's Christmas Party and paying for the tickets to Cinerama for the Sixth Grades in recognition of their seniority.

May we take this opportunity to thank you, the School Committee, the faculty members, the pupils, the custodian, Mrs. Parsons, the nurses, the parents and citizens of Norfolk for the loyalty and exceptionally fine spirit of cooperation which we have received this fall.

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## REPORT ON HANDWRITING

To the Superintendent of Schools:

Handwriting is one subject taught in schools that lends itself to the teaching of concomitants such as neatness, accuracy, attention to details, and good work habits. It is not enough to teach technical handwriting with a view to merely achieving the grade norm. If

handwriting is to continue to function acceptably in high school and college, each letter must be taught to the point of mastery and should become automatic to the extent that a writer is free to concentrate on the work at hand without being distracted from time to time to stop and think how a particular letter should be made.

A child who has been taught to write well does not lose the ability to write well thereafter. He may become careless if permitted by teachers to do so but he retains the ability to write well when challenged to do so.

Our handwriting program constantly strives to achieve these desirable objectives. Instructional and motivational materials are provided for pupils and teachers. Teachers are instructed at regular intervals in methods to be used in teaching and the handwriting product is checked at the end of each interval with a diagnosis of same given to the teacher in writing for remedial purposes.

At the close of the last school year our records show that 91.3% of the pupils scored excellent, 7.6% scored good, 1.1% fair and no % were poor on the formal handwriting test. It was found in checking the informal handwriting that there had been excellent transfer in handwriting quality to spelling, arithmetic, English composition, etc.

The cooperation of the administrative staff and teachers was all that could be desired and I take this opportunity to express my appreciation.

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## REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF INSTRUMENTAL MUSIC

To the Superintendent of Schools:

### Statistics:

1958-59 program consisted of approximately 25 pupils. (Accordion and Band group.)

1959-60 program as follows:

- a. Advanced players—11
  - b. Accordion players—10
  - c. New band players—30
- Total in this year's music program—51

**Program:**

The accordion ensemble is a homogenous group, since learning levels are varied. The pupils are following the Palmer Hughes Accordion course. Book I, which is the elementary book, is being used by 8 players, and more advanced pupils are using Book II.

The advanced band is playing music from the technique and song book, Easy Band Book.

The beginners band is studying from the Easy Steps to Band.

**Plan:**

A request has been given so that the Norfolk Elementary School purchase basic music literature so that a varied selection of studies, and music be available to keep and motivate the youngsters' interest. With a budget of \$30.00 for three consecutive years toward the purchase of music, there will be a changeable repertory enabling any music instructor to make the program challenging, as well as musically valuable to the child.

**Attendance:**

Attendance for the music program this year is close to perfect. The average absence (either because the child forgot his instrument at home, or did not attend school) is on the average of 3 absences out of 51 students.

**New Instrumentation:**

This year's beginners' band has the addition of a Baritone Horn player, and three trombones, which will give the group more depth musically. In the past, the instrumental program did not have any instruments outside of the basic trumpet, clarinet, and drums.

**Recommendations:**

It would be desirous if the school, along with owning the bass drum, possessed a baritone, and a flute to serve as permanent band instruments. Since parents often overlook these instruments for youngsters, if they were owned by the school, they could possibly be loaned free of charge to the student, thus adding instruments that would enrich the quality of the ensemble, along with exposing the musical values and training which go into playing either the baritone horn or the flute.

## REPORT OF MUSIC AND ART SUPERVISOR

To the Superintendent of Schools:

Since this is my first report to you as Supervisor of Art, as well as Music it may be well to re-state our affirmation of purpose concerning these subjects at the Elementary level.

Because we are all consumers of the arts in one way or another, we try in the limited time allotted, to cultivate good taste, gain a better understanding and a greater appreciation of the arts with which we must live. Since one learns best by doing, in Music classes we try to sing with pleasing tone quality, to read a simple melody, to harmonize a part, to recognize basic rhythms, to appreciate our musical heritage, and to a limited extent, to evaluate the music we hear every day. In art we are learning simple printing, basic color harmony, simple figure drawing and beginning design. So far this year most of the work has been in crayon, but we plan to use water color in the two upper grades before the year is out.

Our musical program last year was called "This World We Live In and the World of Make Believe," referring to the World from a child's point of view. Each grade presented a group of songs interpreting the various phases of childhood. Beginning with the first grade the program started with "We Go to School," then carried through the other grades with "The Games We Play", "We Make Believe," "We Watch T.V.," and "We Enjoy Being Silly". We concluded the program with a group of serious songs—"We Are Growing Up," sung by the sixth grade.

As always, I am grateful for the unfailing help I receive from the Central School Staff, and for the joy I experience in working with the Norfolk children.

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## REPORT OF THE SCHOOL HEALTH PROGRAM

To the Superintendent of Schools:

In planning the school health program we have tried to improve and maintain the health of all children within the school system.

### Duties of the School Health Personnel:

1. Physical examinations of the new pupils and all pupils not having had a physical examination within three years. Also, frequent examinations of children with continuing problems.

2. Consultations with the faculty on psychological problems and emotional problems which keep the child from having good social adjustments.
3. Helping with the handicapped children and children who need special handling due to varying degrees of retardation.
4. Control of communicable diseases; rendering First Aid; establishing good personal hygiene among the pupils and making home visits when necessary.
5. Arrangements were made with the State Department of Dental Health whereby a State Dental Hygienist presented an illustrated program on dental care and needs to all the children.

In the spring a Pre-school Clinic was held for the purpose of registering pupils entering public schools for the first time in September.

**Purpose of Early Registration:**

1. To examine the children entering school for the first time and to discuss health problems with parents.
2. To give the parent and child an opportunity to become acquainted with the school personnel and surroundings.
3. To help the School Department ascertain and plan for the number of children entering school in September.

Most of the pupils were found to be healthy, with only a few needing medical follow-up. The major needs were dental.

Vision and Hearing tests are given at some time during the year to all pupils. Notices are sent to parents if a child fails to pass either of these tests. The tests are merely a screening process. If any child shows symptoms of eye difficulty or hearing loss, parents should not wait for the next school examination, but have medical attention when the problem is discovered.

On the whole the children are healthy and happy and well-adjusted. Every effort is being made to maintain and improve their health.

We thank everyone who helped carry out the above program.

## REPORT OF THE SCHOOL DENTAL HEALTH PROGRAM

To the Superintendent of Schools:

The Johnson and Johnson study was assigned to the Norfolk and Foxboro Schools, Grades two, three and four will have the mouth wash testing program and dental health education is offered in all grades through the sixth.

Letters were sent to the parents of children in grades two, three and four requesting their permission and cooperation in the mouth wash program. Personal telephone calls were made to all parents who could be reached in event that permission was not given. The usual reason for refusal was the fear of the danger of x-ray. After the program was more fully explained, most of these parents wished their children to participate. A few children had orthodontic bands and one had x-ray therapy.

Individual folders were typed for each child's record and x-rays in the Norfolk Central and the Robinson Hill School in Foxboro.

A dental health exhibit was held in Foxboro at the Robinson Hill School on the occasion of the Open House. Many parents visited this exhibit and asked questions concerning dental health and the new dental program.

### **To the School Committee and the Citizens of King Philip Regional School District**

May I present my fourth annual report as your Superintendent of Schools.

As has been the practice for many years, included in my general report are the reports of the Principal, Vocational Director, Supervisors, Department Chairmen, School Nurse, plus the usual tables and statistical data.

#### **Enrollment Trends and Building Space**

King Philip Regional High School opened on October 14, 1957 for grades 7-12 with an enrollment of 840 pupils. Since that time the enrollment has increased and will continue to grow as shown by the following data:

From the above data on enrollment trends—King Philip Regional High School will be lacking in classroom space in September, 1964 and every year thereafter. We will not be able to accommodate in the present building Grades 7-12 in September, 1964.

### Conclusion No. 1

No. 1—Plans and research should be formulated **now** so that a **750 pupil Regional School for Grades 7 and 8** would be ready for occupancy in September, 1964.

No 2—Enrollment data shows that it would be educationally sound to build a separate Regional School for these grades.

No. 3—Educational research and even our own experience show that for all purposes, Grades 7 and 8, should be in a separate building.

### Conclusion No. 2

No. 1—From the enrollment data we can continue to use the present building for Grades 7-12 until September, 1964. With the building of a **new Regional School for Grades 7 and 8**, we would be able to accommodate Grades 9-12 in the present building to September, 1971.

No. 1—From the enrollment data the year September, 1971 looks like another critical year in terms of classroom space. It might become necessary to build **another Regional School** for Grades 7 and 8 and return Grade 9 to this building so that the present school will accommodate only Grades 10-11-12.



**REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL OF KING PHILIP  
REGIONAL HIGH SCHOOL**

To: The Superintendent of Schools  
Regional School Committee  
Citizens of the District

The program for the King Philip Regional High School has continued to improve as we seek ways to provide a high standard of quality to the increasing student population.

The Program of Studies which was put into operation in 1957 which defines the minimums of content for all subjects has been reviewed. The Department Chairmen presented their program to the School Committee. The offering and operation of the department was discussed and suggestions were recorded for further study and action. I believe this was an outstanding achievement and brought new understanding of the operation of the program. The review and revision of all courses of study should be done at least every three years.

The method of reporting pupil progress to the parents has been revised with the level of instruction indicated on the report card. The Honor Rolls are also reported to the public based on level of instruction.

The Student Council has developed very quickly and has worked hard on policies and regulations of the Student Activity Program. The Student Council sponsored the program of recognizing the honor student with a King Philip Honor Key. The Council is now making plans for the establishment of a local chapter of the National Honor Society.

The recognition which has come to King Philip as we have seen the students achieve a higher standard has contributed to the excellent school spirit that has been displayed by the students.

The Problems of Counseling and its relationship to scheduling are being studied to reduce the human error in student programs and the level of instruction assignment.

The team work of Parent-Student-Teacher produced a successful Exchange Program with Bradenton, Florida. The Student Exchange received national recognition through the May 1960 issue of the N.E.A. Journal which has both national and foreign circulation.

## MUSIC DEPARTMENT

Raymond R. Hill, Director

The Music Department is pleased to report another year of steady progress in the Program offered to the students at King Philip Regional High School.

**General Music**—As previously stated, General Music is required at the seventh grade level and it is scheduled one period per week. During this past year the course of study has been revised to more definitely meet the requirements of the students entering King Philip from the Elementary level. The text books, the audio and visual facilities and the excellent supplementary material prepared by the instructor are all combined to provide these first year students with the knowledge that there is something in music for everyone; whether it be the aesthetic value derived from the recognition and appreciation of music of real beauty and greatness, the practical value of its association with the academic subjects, particularly the sciences and social studies, or the factual value which can be gained through the study of the history and theory of music.

**Instrumental Music**—The Band had an active as well as a productive schedule during the 1960 school year. The members meet twice a week during the Activity period for rehearsals, and in addition to this, each member is required to schedule one period per week for instrumental class instruction. This instruction is important because here the group is smaller and the instructors can aid the students in overcoming their individual problems of technique and the mechanics of their particular instruments. The Music Department is proud of the quality of the instrumental music performed during this past year; and the following schedule of activities and performances is the result of the constant and earnest effort rendered by these young instrumentalists: The first Band Exchange with The Valley Regional High School from Deep River, Connecticut was very successful both musically and socially, and we look forward to a continuation of this activity; a trip to Brockton, Massachusetts to attend the Southeastern District Music Festival, where the members competed with ten other high school bands in Class C and again were awarded a final rating of A by the Adjudicator; paraded for The Little League in Norfolk and Wrentham; the Memorial Day Exercises in Plainville, Wrentham and at the State School; performed at the Baccalaureate, Class Night and Graduation Exercises at King Philip; a Concert at each of the Elementary Schools in Norfolk, Plainville and Wrentham; marched in the Wrentham Lions' Club Parade; performed at the football games both at home and away; participated in school assemblies, and performed at the Christmas Concert. Besides the Senior Band we have a class of seventh and

eighth grade instrumentalists scheduled to meet one period per week. Some of the more advanced members of this group performed along with the Junior Choir at the Christmas Concert.

**Choral Music**—During this past year, we have begun a reorganization of the Choral Program at King Philip, and to date the following has been accomplished: In September, 1960, a new rehearsal schedule was established in order to eliminate conflict with the instrumental rehearsals; thus providing the opportunity for more students to elect Choir and also the new schedule frees both instructors to work with the Choral groups. Time and schedule permitting, the Music Department hopes to continue the plan to develop a sound musical organization in the Choral Program at King Philip during the coming year. At the present time we have two Choral groups—the Senior Choir is elective in Grades IX-XII and it is scheduled to meet two periods per week during the Activity period. The Junior Choir is elective in Grades VII-VIII and it is scheduled to meet one period per week during the Activity period. The Senior Choir participated in the Exchange Concert in the Spring, the Graduating Exercises at King Philip and both the Senior and Junior Choirs performed at the annual Christmas Concert.

The music class organized during 1959 for those students assigned to the Fourth Level continues to meet one period per week. Participation, both as a group and individual, is the principal objection of this course of study, and the materials utilized are specifically prepared by the instructor to meet the requirements at this level.

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### READING PROGRAM

Alice E. Church, Chairman

Our Developmental Reading program is designed to help students recognize and better their reading skills—especially vocabulary, comprehension and rate. Emphasis at the upper levels is put on critical reading.

Due to the growth in student population and need we now have two full time reading instructors. We offer reading two or three hours per week for one half year to all seventh and eighth graders. In grades nine through twelve, the course, which is elective, has to be limited on a rotating basis to one marking term because of the enrollment.

The student is tested for placement and then through the use of multilevel materials progresses at his own rate.

Vocabulary development, listening skills, study skills, communicative skills, perception and accuracy (by way of Tachistoscope) comprehension and rate (Controlled Reader) are used for class work.

Students, especially at the upper grade levels, are becoming ever more aware of their need for improvement in the area of reading and the further development of the skills basic to the program which is in its turn basic to the whole school curriculum.

### **SOCIAL STUDIES DEPARTMENT**

Erick Sargent, Chairman

The year 1960 proved to be a productive one for the Social Studies Department. Once again there was no turn over in the department and with strong teachers like Mr. Philip Burr, Mr. John Dwyer, Mrs. Elizabeth Foster, Mr. Francis Gallipeau, Miss Clara Manteca, Mr. William Nowick and Mr. John Robbins the Social Studies Program moved forward smoothly.

In addition to regular class room work, several field trips were taken and numerous projects started. The most interesting and most rewarding field trip was the trip to the United Nations Building in New York, with Mr. Nowick. The outstanding project was King Philip's initiating the idea of an annual forum for the Hockamock League and other schools to discuss the vital issues of the day. This past year the forum was held at King Philip and was on the Presidential Election. Ranking state and national speakers attended and took part in the program in addition to 25 area schools. The forum idea was widely acclaimed by all area schools and will become an annual event.

The following courses were offered in 1960:

- 7th Grade—World Geography
- 8th Grade—U. S. History (from exploration to Civil War)
- 9th Grade—Citizenship Education
- 10th Grade—World History, Ancient Civilization
- 11th Grade—U. S. History (from Civil War to Present)
- 12th Grade—Problems of Democracy—Contemporary Affairs  
—Europe Since 1914

Courses being considered as possible electives for the future are Advanced Geography and Economics.

The Social Studies Department felt that the Audio Visual Aids director was most co-operative during the year with timely films, etc., and the administration most helpful on co-arranging our field trips and projects.

## **PHYSICAL EDUCATION DEPARTMENT**

Elmer Silva, Director of Physical Education and Athletics

### **Physical Education:**

Instruction in Physical Education at King Philip may be placed into three major categories:

1. Development of Physical Fitness
2. Knowledge and skills of team and individual athletic activities
3. Introduction to many leisure time activities

Each student has at least two classes per week and all are required to take physical education unless they are excused by their family physician or because of the extent of their academic load they are unable to fit it into their schedule.

It is the ultimate aim of the department that all students will become aware of the importance of physical fitness and carry on their activities in the interscholastic athletic program or recreational agencies in the area.

Miss Marcia Conners is the girls' Physical Education instructor this year. In addition to all girls' Physical Education classes she coaches all girls' athletic teams.

Many students are advancing rapidly in tumbling and gymnastics. These individual activities are an excellent stimulus for physical fitness. In these activities each boy and girl may progress at his or her own rate of physical ability. A gymnastic and tumbling club is being formed for boys interested in gymnastics so that they may specialize in one or two activities of their choice. For the present time, the club will be limited to the more physically talented in each grade.

### **Interscholastic Athletics:**

Our athletic teams are making tremendous progress with student interest, both as participants and spectators, growing rapidly. Attendance at games is higher and approximately one-third of the student body is taking part in some athletic activity.

The students and coaching staff work very hard to develop good athletic teams. We hope you will take time out of your busy schedule, come up to the school and see our young people in healthy competition. We are sure it will be a couple of hours well spent.

**Health Education:**

This phase of the educational program is not offered this year. It is hoped that in the future this will become part of the physical education curriculum.

**Driver Education:**

Classroom instruction is offered to all students. Behind-the-wheel training must be obtained by the parent from a commercial driving school.

We in the department of physical education and athletics are pleased with the progress being made and hope that it will continue for it would not be possible without the cooperation of all departments, the administration and the district.

**FOREIGN LANGUAGE DEPARTMENT**

Mildred T. Wallace, Chairman

Since national attention was focused upon the learning of foreign languages there has been an increasing yearly enrollment in language classes. This year pupils are studying French, German, Spanish, and Latin. In line with the newest emphasis in language teaching, stress is laid upon a listening-speaking or so-called aural-oral approach. As much of the foreign language as possible is spoken in the course of instruction. There is much emphasis placed upon accurate pronunciation. Students have the opportunity to record their voices and to have their statements in the language evaluated. The student hears the model statement and may compare its stress and intonation with his own recorded effort.

Since a foreign language is best taught in a context of the foreign culture, language students also are introduced to the culture and society of the country whose language they are studying. Filmstrips, movies, still pictures, recorded native speakers, and other pertinent regalia supplement and enrich the study of the particular language.

In the more advanced classes literary works and the complexities of composition are studied. Again, however, the target language to be mastered is held to be a living element which is to be used. At all times the aural-oral emphasis underlies the program of instruction. Because of its nature and relation to the modern European languages and to English, the study of Latin follows a more traditional line.

The Language Club, comprising 150 members, offers a rich opportunity for the students to use and discuss their new language and cultural skills. Membership in the Language Club is not restricted to language students. Anyone interested in learning about a foreign culture may hold membership.

#### **BUSINESS DEPARTMENT**

Helen Kelleher, Chairman

The Business Department for the school year 1959-1960 showed an increase in the students taking business subjects. Beginning typewriting was the course having the largest enrollment with over 100 students electing this subject. All students regardless of their major are permitted to study typing which meets daily, one half year on manual typewriters and one-half year on electrics.

Office Practice courses showed the greatest increase. A new 2-year Clerical Practice course was instigated for those students who showed little or no aptitude for shorthand or bookkeeping, but still wished to be employed in the business world.

Senior business students were assigned to work for a week in the school's front office. Here they learned not only the switchboard, but were able to use their acquired skills in an every-day work situation.

Representatives from the Federal Civil Service Board administered both the Stenographic and Clerical tests to students who either wished to test their skills or who were looking for a Civil Service job. This proved to be very rewarding to several students who were employed after graduation.

In February, 18 students who had their subject teachers' approvals were permitted to leave school an hour early to work in an office. Most of them remained for full time employment after graduation. Factory Mutual Insurance in Norwood took 15 students, two were employed at Crosby-Ashton, and one at a local insurance office.

All students who had a satisfactory school record were successful in locating employment. The starting pay ranged from \$43 to \$63.75

The business teachers spared no effort in attending both business and teaching forums to ensure that the latest and best methods, information, and equipment were available to the King Philip business students.

#### **MATHEMATIC DEPARTMENT**

The basic educational policies and goals of attainment initiated three years ago are now beginning to show satisfactory results. By expanding the program offerings, we have found an ever-increasing interest in mathematics. This interest has necessitated the addition of another teacher in our department.

Many offerings in Modern Mathematics courses for the advance placement students, as suggested by the College Board Committee on Mathematics, are being considered, and some are being put into operation. This will allow our students an equal opportunity to meet the demands necessary to compete for college placement and scholarship. Members of the department have recently completed advanced study to better prepare themselves to teach these courses. An accelerated program is now in effect, and the staff is making a continued study and research into new subject materials and methods of instruction.

Although emphasis is now being placed on the education of the exceptional child, we in this department have not allowed ourselves to deviate from the basic principle involved—equal opportunity for all students. Each pupil, regardless of his ability, is given the opportunity to elect some mathematics course which will satisfy his immediate needs and vocational aims. Many of the students who have completed the General Mathematics program have attained standards which have qualified them to continue in a college preparatory mathematics course.

#### **VISUAL EDUCATION DEPARTMENT**

Francis J. Gallipeau, Chairman

The equipment and facilities of the Visual Education Department provided approximately 3800 hours of supplementary teaching material and aids for the faculty and students of the King Philip Regional High School in the past year. This includes the use of films, both rental and free, filmstrips, opaque projector, phonographs, cameras and overhead projector. A new piece of equipment was added to the department, an automatic slide projector, to be used primarily in the school auditorium for school and public use. This projector can also be used in classroom.

Five football films were taken this fall, (approx. 2500 ft.).  
One (1) basketball film (400 ft.) scheduled  
One (1) hockey film (400 ft.) scheduled  
One (1) baseball film (300 ft.) scheduled

The above films will be used by coaches for study and improvement of players and also for public relations.

At the present time, and continuing until completion, 16 mm films are being taken of the construction of a house in Plainville by the King Philip Regional High School Vocational students. It is planned to use this film to orientate and instruct future vocational students at the school. Also this film will be used in publicity releases. (Clips of this film have been shown on all the Rhode Island and Massachusetts television stations.)

The production of one 15 minute 16 mm sound film in color is scheduled this coming year showing the operation and facilities of the King Philip Regional High School. This film is to be used to orientate the new 7th grade students coming into the school. It is also to be lent out to other regional schools who request it to help them in establishing their programs.

The King Philip produced film, "THE KING PHILIP LIBRARY STORY" showing library use and function, has been rented to over thirty institutions throughout the United States, both at the high school and college levels. The revenue from these rentals has more than covered the cost of the production of this film.

The photography laboratory has been invaluable in the taking and processing of all our pictures involving sports, social functions, and for publicity releases.

#### **LANGUAGE ARTS DEPARTMENT**

Grace W. Capron, Chairman

In each level of each grade, seven through twelve, the work includes literature and grammar. Anthologies are used to present a variety of reading types to help pupils gain literary appreciation. Reading and listening skills are developed from such a reading program. Speaking skills through oral reports and panel discussions are emphasized. Book reports are correlated with the authors and types of reading studied in class. Cumulative records are kept of each pupil's reading. Writing skills are developed through the study of formal grammar for correctness and accuracy. Development of practical expression is emphasized through letter writing, reports, and essays. Much stress is placed on spelling and vocabulary mastery from grade

seven through grade twelve. Pupils are encouraged to participate in writing contests and several students have won recognition and have had original work printed in high school anthologies. Films and records are used when they are appropriate for the subject. The library facilities are a requisite for reference and research work as well as for reading reports. Cooperative Tests in English Expression and Reading will be administered to every pupil in the school to measure present abilities and help determine means of bringing pupils up to high accomplishments. This testing program will continue annually.

The department holds monthly meetings to discuss policies and problems that will further raise the standards and better the English language opportunities for the students of King Philip Regional High School.

### **SCIENCE DEPARTMENT**

The Science program at King Philip Regional High School offers a wide selection of science courses, and most of them are offered on a three level program to meet the needs of the students. At the present time there are 866 students enrolled in science courses. This represents 85% of the entire student body.

The Second Annual Science Fair was held at King Philip this year with over 100 students participating as compared to 62 in the previous year. The quality of the science projects showed definite improvement in scientific application and construction. David DaVia, one of the winners of the King Philip Science Fair, won a Second Prize in the Massachusetts State Science Fair.

King Philip students appeared on WHDH Channel 5 in a Science Quiz Program sponsored by the American Chemical Society. The manner in which our students expressed themselves clearly indicated they possess a sound background and understanding of scientific principles.

The Bausch and Lomb Honorary Science Award Medal was awarded to David L'Herault. The Award Medal is presented at graduation to the student who has achieved the best record in the study of science. The winner of the Honorary Science Award is eligible to compete for one of the several scholarships awarded annually at the University of Rochester.

Advanced Biology, which is offered in Grade 12 has doubled its enrollment this year. There are now two classes of Advanced Biology. The course of study for Advanced Biology was revised this year to meet the needs of both the student entering nursing and college.

Advanced Chemistry was offered for the first time this year. This course is an elective for Grade 12 students. Advanced Chemistry is designed to acquaint the students with principles and problems of College Chemistry.

Next year we plan to offer to Grade 12 students a new course in Modern Physics. This program is referred to as PSSC Physics. The course of study was developed by the Physical Science Study Committee. This course offering will complete the science course of study at King Philip Regional High School for the present.

As the needs of our students change, the science program will be revised to meet these needs.

### **HOME ECONOMICS**

Pauline Pfeffer, Chairman

The growth and development of the Home Economics Department this past year has been encouraging to all those interested and participating in its work. The curriculum has been expanded to include work with retarded children. The Vocational group did volunteer work at the Wrentham State School last year, working in the nurseries. Each girl derived some benefit from this interesting and worth while venture. This program is to be expanded next term to include work in the industrial shops at the school, where they will gain valuable work experience with factory type, power sewing machines.

Another new experience this year was the canning and preserving of garden produce, to include vegetable fruits, chutney, pickles, relishes and mince meat. Some of these were made for customers, using their recipes and materials. Certain baked food products may be ordered through the department, and are made for customers by the Vocational students.

The annual fashion show held in May was indicative of a great deal of student talent and skill in the art of dressmaking, planning and producing complete wardrobes.

This year the girls will be showing the results of the latest addition to their skills, hand knitted garments ranging from mittens to Scandinavian type ski sweaters. There will also be many toddlers modeling the unusual products of the special children's clothing class.

### **GUIDANCE DEPARTMENT**

John B. Davidson, Director

The Guidance Program at King Philip Regional High School has extended its services in many areas this past year.

The class of 1960 has 43% of its graduates attending institutions of higher learning—this in comparison to 33% in the class of 1959, and 18% in the first class to graduate at King Philip. Members of the class of 1960 show greater geographical distribution in choice of academic institutions of higher learning. They are attending Brown, Ohio-Wesleyan, Grinnell, Baker University, St. Lawrence University, Marietta, University of Massachusetts, University of Washington (NROTC), Northeastern University, Bryant College, Framingham and Bridgewater State Colleges, Brigham Young University, Stonehill, Eastern Nazarene, Keuka, Bryant College, Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute, Syracuse, Baldwin-Wallace College, Hilleyer College, Becker, Dean and Bravard (Florida) Junior Colleges, Faulkner and New England Baptist Hospitals for nurses' training, Katherine Gibbs School, New England School of Practical Art, Wentworth Institute, Industrial Tech, Franklin Tech, Coyne Electrical School, Grace Downs School, Huntington Prep and Pondville Hospital. Reports indicate that our graduates are adjusting favorably to the rigid standards of college life.

Our testing program has been extended to include the following: Otil Mental Ability (Grades 7 and 10), SRA Achievement, Iowa Tests of Educational Development, Kuder Preference Inventory, School and College Abilities Test are all part of the administrative program. Annually juniors have an opportunity to participate in the Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test and The National Merit Scholarship Examination. Sophomores may check their educational growth through the National Education Development Tests. This past year there were two semifinalists for national merit scholarship awards and six seniors received certificates of commendation for high scores obtained. Five sophomores received certificates of commendation for achieving in the top 25% academically in Massachusetts. Results of the SCAT (School and College Ability Tests) show that the seniors median at King Philip is higher than the publisher's median (overall picture in United States).

This year all members of the classes 9-12 have completed a four-year projected planned program of courses. This indicates that all students have been counselled at least once, and seniors have been counselled many times. All students and parents have access to the counselling services at all times.

Orientation is held in May for the three 6th grade classes. An orientation session is held for parents of 8th grade students to discuss programs for the next four years.

Seniors who plan to attend college and have need are urged to explore every avenue for scholarship assistance. Many institutions use the College Scholarship Service form and parents are strongly urged to file an accurate report as requested on the parent's confidential statement. All scholarship announcements are made known to the students.

The National Education Act allows students to borrow up to \$5000 for expenses, interest begins a year after graduation and if a student enters the field of teaching and stays in it for 5 years 50% of the loan is forgiven. The class of 1960 received scholarship awards or equivalent totalling \$22,000.

The seniors in the class of 1960 who sought employment after graduation were assisted in placement by the Guidance Department and the Business Department. Jobs were obtained by contacting business and having them contact us. Federal Civil Service co-operated by administering the clerical and stenographic tests in the High School and several girls are now employed as a result of a rating received. In March, 1961, the Civil Service Commission will again administer the exam to interest business trainees. Business students are also urged to take the State Civil Service Exam.

The past year great strides have been made in assembling the occupational and educational resource materials. They may be used by students and faculty at their convenience. All materials are filed according to occupations using the Dictionary of Occupational Titles (D.O.T.) issued by the Federal Government. College catalogs are arranged alphabetically and all other types of schools are also filed in their category alphabetically.

Northeastern University again is sponsoring occupational information via careers presented by 18 speakers during the school year. These are in co-operation with the Guidance Department.

Each year sees an increase in students and an increase in guidance services.

### HEALTH SERVICES

Margaret G. Keady, R.N.

The health in general of our school pupils at King Philip has been good during the year of 1960.

Routine physical examinations were given by our school physicians to the following groups:

It is the policy of the school that a yearly physical is adequate for competitive sports, unless the student has had an illness or injury. In cases of illness or injury the pupil's family doctor or the school doctor must determine the physical fitness of the student before return to competitive sports.

The King Philip students, faculty, and personnel took part in the Mantoux tuberculin skin testing program in conjunction with the Plainville Community Program in May, 1960.

A joint meeting of the Boards of Health and the school health services from the region was held in October with the Chairman of the Regional School Board, Mr. Semple, and Mr. Delaney, the Regional School District Superintendent, to consider the health programs of the three communities and see if any recommendations could be given to King Philip Regional District to make health services more complete. After discussion at local levels, another meeting will be held in 1961.

In September Dr. Eugene Brooks took over the duties of school physician.

I wish to thank Dr. Bradley Raymond and Dr. William Guillette for their services and co-operation in the school health program, also the communities, hospitals, clinics, agencies, Lion's Club, Salvation Army, and all who have helped in our school health services.

#### **ART DEPARTMENT**

Barbara Bracey, Chairman

The art department has been making gradual, but steady, progress over the period of this past year.

A revised course of study was developed and inaugurated to be used as a curriculum guide in planning art projects, which will enable students in this area to have a better knowledge and understanding of the world of art. This guide is geared primarily to the student of average ability, although it is flexible and general enough to give students a chance to use their imagination and initiative in developing their own interpretation of a basic idea. They may go as far as their ability will carry them.

At high school level, our primary aim or goal, of course, is to acquaint the student with the criteria for making selective or discriminating choices of art and art products. Actually a very small percentage of our students will be gifted or dedicated enough to follow art as a career, but as in any subject they can be taught to form objec-

tive opinions of what is good, bad and indifferent in an area which closely touches all of our lives. All of our students will be consumers of art and art products and their lives will be the richer from having had an experience of this kind.

We have discovered that art is very much akin to the other sciences. Part of it is theory, part is logic and part experimentation, a combination of intellectual and manual skill plus, in the fine arts, an emotional overtone, which because of the fact that it is a creative area, must be present to make it successful. Real success depends largely on how much drive and ambition the student has to make good or excel. This is the premise on which we have based our work this year.

In regard to subject matter we have covered the meaning and structure of art, the basic elements of art, painting, advertising, costume, interiors, the theatre, graphic arts, the meaning and structure of form, sculpture industrial design, architecture, etc.

We have been involved as a department in many extra curricula projects from participating in our program for open house with exhibits and demonstration groups to the addition of four panels to our Christmas display for the school. We have designed and made program covers for various functions here at school, posters for advertising purposes, decorations for graduation, etc.

This year for the first time we have two upperclassmen representing our school attending Saturday morning classes at the Massachusetts College of Art. These students are interested in art as a career and hope that this experience will give them a broader view and background and an opportunity to meet other young people from the Boston area, who have mutual interests.

We also have an art club this year made up of students who have a serious interest in art. The club meets once a week for a more specialized type of work than we have time to cover in class, and to plan everything from looking into entrance requirements at art colleges and universities and job opportunities offered upon graduation, to making plans and arrangements for exhibitions, contests, etc.

This brief summary covers what we have accomplished thus far in the art area, and we look forward to continued progress this coming year.

### **INDUSTRIAL ARTS**

Gilbert Rishton, Sr., Chairman

This department has four divisions, i.e., Woodworking, Metalworking, Crafts and Mechanical Drawing.

Mr. Richard Young is in charge of Mechanical Drawing; Mr. Paul Wills, Metal-working and Crafts; and Mr. Gilbert Rishton, Woodworking. Brief reports of the work being done in each of these divisions are as follows:

#### **Woodworking**

About 135 pupils elected to work in this shop this year. About ninety of these were from grades 7 and 8 with the rest being largely ninth and tenth graders.

The work in this shop is almost entirely woodworking. However, just about every project has to be finished and we have a section of work that concerns wood finishing with the boys having experience in staining, varnishing, and other operations which have to do with wood-finishing. The projects under construction are many and varied with the emphases being placed on the usefulness of the article to the boy. Your instructor urges that parents with boys in this course consult with their sons concerning his project. This could result in many useful articles being made for use in the home.

#### **Metal-Working — Crafts**

Metal shop and crafts with about one hundred and forty students of which ninety-seven are seventh grade—the boys working in metal shop and the girls in crafts. We are trying to teach the use of hand tools and the basic rudiments of the lathe and milling machine. The girls are taught to tool leather, hammered copper and aluminum, enamel work and basketry

#### **Mechanical Drawing**

Our Mechanical Drawing classes consist of fifty-four boys from all grades in the High School. First year students take Basic Mechanical Drawing which includes basic fundamentals that apply to any type of Industrial Drawing. This is continued in the second year on a more advanced basis. Third and Fourth year students are given an opportunity to select Machine Drawing, Architectural Drawing, or Pre-Engineering Drawing and progress according to abilities and interest. We also have three classes of 7th and 8th grade boys who are engaged in basic drawing and planning for shop and life activities.

### **FOURTH LEVEL INSTRUCTION**

Michael Cosentino, Chairman

Level four is still in its infancy here at King Philip High School. In September, 1959, we started with 16 pupils and one teacher. This year we have 25 pupils and two teachers.

Our program aims to provide every possible avenue to enable our students to be self-supporting upon graduation. The curriculum offers a multitude of experiences and possible vocations. The following academic subjects, mathematics, science, social studies, English, reading, spelling, and health are made more meaningful and appealing through the use of specially selected textbooks. These books are of very high interest, colorfully pictured with a lesser degree of vocabulary. Many devices and activities are made and used to enhance the teaching of level four.

Most of the classes are co-educational except for certain specialized areas. Other subjects incorporated in our program are: Art, physical education, sewing and cooking, wood and metal work, mechanical drawing and music. We use the school library weekly but are in the process of building our own mobile classroom library. These books are generally short but interesting stories.

Occasionally we may travel to a specific place outside the confines of the school when our studies require special direction or emphasis. These field trips are vital to our program. Entrance to level four is based on the student's ability and achievement. The I.Q. of the child is not the sole governing factor.

If a student proves capable and progresses satisfactorily he may be transferred to another level. While in level four a student may progress at his own rate of learning. In this manner provisions are made for individual differences. The valuable instruction of level four is made possible only through the co-operation of the specialized teaching areas and the guidance of the administration at King Philip Regional High School.

### **VOCATIONAL SCHOOL**

Preston I. Titus, Director

There were sixty-six pupils enrolled in the Machine Shop and Carpentry Divisions of the vocational school in September 1960. This number represents a near capacity enrollment.

There were eighteen graduates in June 1960. As of October 1960, nine graduates from each department were either employed or in the service. The average salary being earned by the graduates was at the rate of two dollars per hour.

The estimated productivity for 1960 amounted to \$11,628.00. This figure represents the total market value for all jobs completed by the two divisions during the year. Some of the larger jobs completed are as follows: A storage building for the Plainville School Department, a new tile ceiling and partitions for Sunday School classes for a local church, replacement of a tile ceiling at the Center School in Wrentham, and a school sign for the King Philip Regional High School.

The letters for the school sign were designed by the high school Mechanical Drawing Department. The Machine Shop Department cut, finished and attached brackets to the letters. The school custodial staff installed the sign on the building. By using Government Surplus material as much as possible, the sign was constructed for less than \$100.00. The amount allowed in the original school building contract was in the vicinity of \$900.00.

The replacement of the ceiling at the Center School was done by the Carpentry Division at a cost for materials only. The cost of materials did not exceed \$300.00. The estimated cost of materials and labor for this job was over \$600.00.

There were many lesser jobs completed during the year. These were done for students, teachers and outside customers. Some of the work done was in maintenance and repair for the School Department.

The school has taken advantage of obtaining as much Government Surplus material and equipment as possible. By doing this we are able to help the Regional District in keeping down the cost of operating this phase of education at the King Philip Regional School. We were able to secure much of the material that is used for instruction in the Machine Shop from Government Surplus supplies. We were also able to obtain a 24" hydraulic shaper to add to our Machine Shop equipment. The cost of this machine was only a fraction of its estimated value.

On October 20, 1960, the Carpentry Division began a building program. The program is planned to give the students practical on-the-job trade experience. This is the type of work that will be expected of them by their employers after graduation. It is intended that the program continue and that a complete new home be constructed each year. In this type of program the customer furnishes several thousand dollars worth of instructional material. We have found from our experience to date that this is a very worthwhile and realistic training program.

The Evening Trade Extension Adult Education Program is in operation two evenings each week. The Vocational courses are: Machine Shop Practice, Licensed Practical Nurses and Machine Blueprint Reading and Drafting. These courses are highly appreciated by those who attend. We have found by past experience that the knowledge gained from the Adult Extension Courses has aided the student in his daily work and in some cases, he has been able to advance to a better paying job because of this training.

The Vocational Division of the King Philip Regional High School appreciates the help and understanding that has been received from the high school administration and teachers. We would also like to thank the School Committee and Advisory Committee. Without their help and understanding we could not show the amount of progress that has been made.

**Section IV Operating Costs**

Operating Costs shall be apportioned to the Member Towns annually in December for the ensuing calendar year on the basis of their respective enrollments in the Regional District School. Each Member Town's share of the total Operating Expense shall be determined by multiplying the total of the budgeted Operating Costs to be apportioned, by a fraction, of which that town's pupil enrollment in the Regional District School on October 1 of the year in which the apportionment is determined shall be the numerator, and the total pupil enrollment from all the Member Towns in the Regional District School on the same date shall be the denominator; in the event that enrollment in the Regional School District has not been accomplished by said date, on the basis of enrollment in Grades 7 through 12 of pupils residing in each Member Town and receiving education at such town's expense as of October 1 of the preceding year.

**CAPITAL COSTS**

Capital Costs shall be apportioned annually in December for the ensuing year as follows: Payment of principal and interest on notes or other obligations issued by the Regional School District to finance Capital Costs shall be apportioned to the Member Towns on the basis of the equalized valuation of such towns, as set forth in Chapter 559 of the Acts of 1945 entitled "An Act Establishing the Basis of Apportionment of State and County Taxes" or any later equalized valuations enacted by the General Court of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts in effect on the date the vote authorizing such bonds or other obligations become effective. Each Member Town's share shall be determined by computing to the nearest one-tenth of one per cent, the ratio which its equalized valuation bears to the total of the equalized valuations of all the Member Towns, and the ratio shall not be changed during the period such bonds or other obligations are outstanding, except as provided in Section VII. All other Capital Costs shall be so apportioned to the Member Towns on the basis of the last such equalized valuation of such towns enacted by said General Court which is in effect on the date on which such apportionment is so determined.

To see if the Town will appropriate from Surplus Revenue the amounts of the State and County share on Chapter 81 and Chapter 90 projects with a proviso that the sums received from State and County are credited back to Surplus Revenue upon receipt, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury, a sum of money to purchase a new police cruiser and to grant the Board of Selectmen the right to trade or otherwise dispose of the present police cruiser or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to rescind an appropriation of \$1,800.00 made at the Annual Town Meeting, March 1959, for a replacement of the fire alarm system, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise by bond issue, or raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury, a sum of money to construct a new highway garage, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury, a sum of money to construct a sidewalk on Main Street from the Center to Seekonk Street, or any part thereof, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury, a sum of money to construct a sidewalk on Rockwood Road, or any part thereof, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to transfer to the Norfolk Public Library Account the amount of money received from Library fines in 1961, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to transfer to the Norfolk Public Library Account the amount of money received by the Town under Chapter 760, Acts of 1960, An Act Providing State Aid for Free Public Libraries, or take any other action in relations thereto.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury, a sum of money to install and maintain the following street lights, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Cleveland Street, Wills residence at curve

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to elect a recreation commission under the provisions of Chapter 45, Section 14 of the General Laws; such commission to consist of five members, for terms of such length and so arranged so that the term of at least one member will

expire each year and their successors shall be elected for terms of three years each, with the provision that the members of the recreation committee now in office shall serve as members of the recreation commission until the next annual town meeting, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to accept as a public way that portion of Spring Street known as Spring Street Extension as laid out by the Selectmen and shown on a plan approved by the Planning Board, a copy of which is filed in the office of the Town Clerk, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury, a sum of money to provide drainage and surface for Litchfield Avenue, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 26. To see if the Town will authorize the Board of Health to Cooperate with the Department of Mental Health by providing a Regional Health Service as Provided in Section 5, Chapter 40 of the General Laws, Clause 40-C, and to vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury, a sum of money for the above purpose, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated funds in the Treasury a sum of money to purchase and replace two-way radio equipment in accordance with recent Federal Communication Commission regulations, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the present method of electing members of the Board of Selectmen for three years and instead to vote to elect at the annual town meeting for the calendar year 1962 one member of the Board of Selectmen for a term of one year; at the annual town meeting for the calendar year 1963, two members of the Board of Selectmen for a term of one year, and thereafter three members of the Board of Selectmen shall be elected annually for a term of one year, or do anything relating thereto. Petition.





## GLOSSARY

**CHAPTER 81.** This is a statute law of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts and pertains to the construction and maintenance of all roads. The state contributes a certain amount per mile and the town makes up the balance.

**CHAPTER 90.** This is a statute law of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts and pertains to the construction and maintenance of through roads, leading from one town to another. The state contributes 50%, and the town 25% and the county 25% of the cost.

**OVERLAY.** The Overlay is the amount raised by the assessors in excess of appropriations and other charges for the purpose of creating a fund to cover abatements granted and avoiding fractions. Any balance in the Overlay account of a given year in excess of the amount of taxes for such year not collected or abated is transferred to Overlay Reserve.

**OVERLAY RESERVE.** This is the accumulated amount of the Overlay for various years not used or required to be held in the specific Overlay account for a given year and may be used by vote of the town for extraordinary or unforeseen purposes.

**RESERVE FUND.** This fund may be established by the voters at an ANNUAL TOWN MEETING only and may be composed of (a) an appropriation (not exceeding 5% of the tax levy of the preceding year), (b) money transferred from Overlay Reserve, or (c) of both.

Any unexpired balance thereof at the end of the year is closed out to the surplus revenue (E & D) except however that from such balance there shall first be deducted and credited back to overlay reserve, to the extent possible, a sum equal to the amount if any which was appropriated from it to the reserve fund.

Transfers from the Reserve Fund are within the exclusive control of the Finance Committee.

**SURPLUS REVENUE.** (Generally referred to as Excess and Deficiency, though that phrase nowhere appears in the statutes.) This fund represents the amount by which Cash, Accounts Receivable and other floating assets exceed the liabilities and reserves. This amount of the Excess and Deficiency account over and above uncollected taxes of prior years constitutes "Free Cash" or "Available Funds."

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## PLEASE NOTE CAREFULLY

The Town of Norfolk adopted "Zoning By-Laws" in 1946. They were amended in 1953, 1954, 1955 and 1956.

'Regulations for Cesspools, Septic Tanks, Sewers, Etc.'" were adopted in 1958.

Some of the important sections as as follows:

1. A "Building Permit" is required from the Building Inspector for any building erected, altered, rebuilt, remodeled or moved.
2. Lot size shall be a minimum of 30,000 sq. ft. with 150 ft. frontage.
3. Set back of a building in a residential area shall be at least 50 ft. from the street, right of way or county taking. No building may be erected closer than 25 ft. from the side lines of a lot.
4. Only one family dwellings are permitted unless a variance is granted by Board of Appeals.
5. Be sure to get a copy of the "Zoning By-Laws" and "Regulations For Cesspools, etc." before you start any construction or excavation. These may be obtained from the Building Inspector.
6. A building permit must be obtained from the Building Inspector.
7. The Building Inspector is Olaf Olsen, Boardman Street, Norfolk, Mass.
