REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN

The manner in which a Board of Selectmen functions today has changed considerably from methods employed by our predecessors of years ago. In the "old days", a board made decisions and determinations which seemed to be best for all concerned and although some voiced objections, the rulings of the Board remained and were accepted and adhered to.

Today, a Board of Selectmen must employ legal advice on most matters that they are called upon to arbitrate. This process is time consuming and greatly slows down progress, sometimes causing weeks of delay on what seems to be a relatively simple matter.

One project in point is the so called "Spring Street drainage problem". This started in what seemed to be a simple problem but investigation brought out many obstacles and legal entanglements which caused the whole project to drag on for a year before being resolved.

Another example of a time consuming activity is the enforcement of zoning rules and regulations.

Coinciding with the annual election, Mr. William Pitt, who has served as Veteran's Service Officer most faithfully for some time, resigned. The Board of Selectmen regretfully accepted his resignation and appointed Mr. William Murphy to serve in this capacity.

Two other changes in our administrative methods occurred during the year. The Board of Health became a separate office which has proved to be a wise move permitting this Board to give full attention to a most important department of the Town.

In August, as a result of a decision of the Bureau of Standards, the office of Sealer of Weights and Measures was abolished in towns of less than 5000 population. Mr. Clarence Evans has filled this position for many years and we wish to express our thanks and appreciation for a job well done.

During the year several "Slow, Children" signs have been erected in congested areas. Also, one hour parking regulations have been adopted in front of the store block in the Center of Town. This seemed to be necessary due to the limited parking facilities in that area. Further work was done on posting speed signs on Union and North Streets. Your attention is called to an article in the warrant for funds for payment for these signs.

In May, at the request of the Board of Selectmen of Medfield, the Norfolk-Medfield Town line was perambulated and the necessary dates affixed to the markers. This function is performed at the request of the older Town.

Two committees were appointed to report to the Board of Selectmen: a Capital Outlay Committee to aid the Advisory Board by trying to schedule capital expenditures in an orderly manner over a period of years; and, the other committee, a Historical Committee, is to gather pertinent information in view of our upcoming 100th anniversary. We feel that the work of the Capital Outlay Committee is so important for long range planning for the Town, we have included an article in the warrant to make this a permanent committee.

Natural gas mains were installed on Everett Street by the Brockton-Taunton Gas Co. This seems to be the beginning of another service to the Town.

The excavation of the swimming pond was completed and has filled with water to a degree anticipated by the Conservation Commission. We hope all residents will avail themselves of an opportunity to visit this area. It has many possibilities for recreation, outings, picnics, etc.

The sidewalk has been completed from the Center to the intersection of Main and Seekonk Streets. This project is a worth while effort. A new sidewalk committee is proposing further extension of sidewalks and will have an article in the warrant to this effect.

The Fire and Police Station is fast becoming a reality and will provide a much needed facility. Because of the space which will therefore be available in the present fire and police station, the Board appointed a committee to study future uses of this building. The committee is proposing that the building be used for town offices and will report their findings at town meeting.

It has been brought to our attention that our Girl Scouts have planted honeysuckle on roadside slopes and banks in certain areas of the Town in an effort toward beautification and control of erosion. Credit is due civic minded groups such as these.

The Board of Selectmen wishes to thank all department heads and town employees for their complete cooperation during the year.

The Selectmen meet the second and fourth Mondays of each month at 8:00 P.M. at the Selectmen's Office in the fire station. These meetings are always open to the public.

Official Vote of Articles

Voted at Adjourned Town Meeting

Held on March 15, 1965

John Allan and Alan Mackey were sworn in as tellers by the Moderator, Walter T. Holmes.

Article 1. Disposed of.

Moved: That the reading of the warrant be dispensed with.

Motion passed.

Article 2. Moved: That the Town of Norfolk fix the salaries of the several elective offices of the Town (effective as of January 1, 1965) as follows: Moderator, \$1.00; Selectmen, \$600.00; Town Treasurer, \$2,000.00; Town Clerk, \$600.00 plus fees; Tax Collector, \$2,400.00 plus fees; Tree Warden, \$2.50 per hour; Assessors, \$2,250.00; Board of Public Welfare, \$300.00; Board of Water Commissioners, \$225.00; School Committee, \$225.00; Planning Board, \$250.00; Regional High School Committee, \$150.00; Board of Health, \$150.00; and to authorize any Town Board to employ for additional salary or compensation any of its members and to fix such salary or compensation.

Amendment: Moved: That the salary of the Board of Selectmen be increased from \$600.00 to \$1,200.00 and the Regional School Committee Salary be increased from \$150.00 to \$1,650.00.

Amendment: Not a vote.

Original motion passed.

Moved: That the Town authorize the Board of Water Commissioners to appoint one of their members to the position of Superintendent as authorized under Section 4A, Chapter 41 and to be paid on an hourly basis of \$2.10 per hour, funds for the same to be obtained from the Water Department appropriation under Article 5.

Motion passed.

Moved: That the Board of Fire Engineers be authorized to appoint themselves firemen and to set the rate of pay at \$2.00 per hour in accordance with Section 4A, Chapter 41 of the General Laws, funds for same to be obtained from the fire department appropriation under Article 3.

Motion passed. Unanimous.

Moved: That the Board of Selectmen be authorized to appoint one of their members as Fire Engineer in accordance with the provisions of Section 4A of Chapter 41 of the General Laws and to set the rate of pay at \$25.00 per year, funds for same to be obtained from the Fire Department appropriation under Article 3.

Motion passed. Unanimous.

ANNUAL REPORT OF FIRE ENGINEERS

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen:

Gentlemen:

1965 has been a significant year to the Fire Department.

At the annual March meeting \$10,000.00 was appropriated to purchase and equip a new ambulance. Bids were requested and an Oldsmobile ambulance was purchased at a considerable saving over the requested appropriation as is shown in another part of the Town Report. This vehicle is now in service and seems to be more than satisfactory.

The Fire Station Study Committee completed their plans and at a Special Town Meeting in June \$150,000.00 was appropriated to construct a new combination Fire and Police Station. The contracts have been awarded and the work has commenced with a completion date of April 30, 1966. This facility has been badly needed for some time. Some of the equipment should have been replaced some time ago, but space has been a deterring factor in asking for replacement equipment.

The Board of Fire Engineers feel the time has arrived to replace Engine IV. This truck is 15 years old and has had a great deal of use as it is used both for building fires and woods fires alike. It is, basically, a 600 gallon tank truck with a small amidship pump used to pump out the tank, however, it also has a 500 gallon front end pump. For some time the tank has been deteriorating and several major leaks have been repaired, fortunately these leaks have occurred in areas that were accessible for welding. How much longer the tank will last is problematical. Before long the clutch will need replacing, tires will also be needed. All in all, it is the feeling of this Board that the truck should be replaced at this time in order to insure uninterrupted, and also more adequate service. Therefore, it is our plan to ask at the Annual Town Meeting for a replacement for Engine IV

During the year 500 feet of 2½ inch hose was purchased, replacing hose some of which was twenty years old. 1½ inch hose and 1¼ inch hose was also replaced. Gated valves and nozzles were purchased to replace badly worn equipment as well as miscellaneous items, such as coats and boots, small tools, etc.

The electronic alerting system purchased a few years ago is functioning perfectly with an absolute minimum of maintenance. However, small work crews at alarms during the hours of 8 A.M. to 5 P.M. is still a serious problem and if it were not for our Highway Department men we would be seriously hampered many times.

We are planning an open house in the spring after moving into the new building and it is our hope that every taxpayer will come to visit at that time.

Once more the Board of Fire Engineers wishes to thank the members of the Department for their loyalty and also extend thanks to all officials and departments for good cooperation during the year.

RECREATION COMMISSION REPORT

A four-week swimming program was held in July at Mann's Pond with 186 school children attending under the direction of Miss Andrea Carr and Miss Jean Carver. Registration and attendance records were handled by Miss Margaret Rogers and mothers who volunteered. It is our aim to attract many more children to this life saving program in the coming year.

We wish to thank Mr. and Mrs. William Ray, Sr., of Seekonk Street and family for their generosity in allowing the Town to use their beach and Mann's Pond for the last five years.

Miss Barbara Bartholomew and Miss Carver directed a three-week arts, crafts, and games program for 189 children held at the Central School in August. Due to an increase in attendance this year, the commission needs 3 additional tables, 30" x 60".

We are indebted to the Norfolk Grange and the Girl Scout Board of Directors for loaning us 13 work tables.

A major league baseball field was constructed on the Central School property and a softball field was partly completed. We saved the Town \$450.00 by turning over the excess loam to the School Dept. to be used in landscaping improvement. We further saved \$1,000.00 by using fill from the swimming pond to level the hollow in the ball field.

Francis P. Bagwell was hired to keep the Central School grounds, the Little League field, baseball and tennis areas mowed and picked up all season.

Other duties performed including furnishing sand for the Mirror Lake beach through the courtesy of the Highway Dept., a tennis clinic directed by John Dwyer, and repair of tennis equipment.

We wish to thank Lewis Rawl for the donation of a new tennis net at the court.

We realized the completion of a five year project with the construction of the swimming pond by the Highway Dept. and sponsored by the Conservation Commission. We consider the pond to be an asset to the Town for recreational purposes of swimming, picnicking and nature studies for many generations to come. Our needs to completely furnish the area are many and we invite donations or gifts of any of the following items: resuscitator, life guard stand, picnic tables and benches, diving board, flagpole, flag, first aid equipment, life buoy ring, 60' line for life ring, additional rope, fireplaces, painted signs (Men's, Ladies', Pool Regulations, Lost and Found, Entrance, Parking), bulletin board, trash cans, floating raft, ladders for docks, oxygen bottles, lifeguard surfboard, chain link gate, assorted wood for docks (2 x 6 construction fir 1/16, 2 x 6 con. fir 44/4, 2 x 6 con. fir 40/10, 52 $\frac{3}{8}$ x 6 galvanized machine bolts, 52 $\frac{3}{8}$ gal. washers, 28 lbs. 16 penny box nails, 10 lbs. 8 penny gal. finish nails, 144 SE fir flooring 160/4'0").

Although we did not sponsor a skating program this year, many persons enjoyed skating at the new pond which froze early in the season and stayed frozen due to the shady location.

Under a special account as directed by Art. 11 of the 1965 Town Meeting, we handled communications and clerical work for pupils who attended the Dutton Day Camp of Recreation for the Handicapped.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF APPEALS

For the Year Ending December 31, 1965

The Board of Appeals held ten public hearings during the year 1965: eight (8) on Zoning Law variances, one (1) on parking of a trailer and one (1) on soil removal. Six (6) Zoning Law variances were approved, one (1) trailer permit was granted and no soil removal permits were issued.

The Board of Appeals schedules their regular monthly meeting on the second Wednesday of each month, when necessary, at the Selectmen's Rooms at 8:00 P.M. Any application to the Board for a permit or variance request must be filed with the Town Clerk by the fifteenth day of the preceding month.

Any applicant to the Board of Appeals must be present at his hearing, either in person, or by an authorized agent or no decision will be made by the Board.

Each application shall be accompanied by a fee of fifteen dollars (\$15.00) by check made payable to the Town of Norfolk. The Board collected one hundred and fifty dollars (\$150.00) in fees and paid out one hundred and fourteen dollars and fifty cents (\$114.50) for advertising expense.

Each application for a Zoning Law variance or a permit shall be accompanied by an accurate sketch, to scale, with dimensions of lot size, frontage, setbacks, street and side lines, building size, street and lot number and names of abutters.

Each application for soil removal shall be accompanied by an accurate drawing showing location, general contours and cross sections required to give a complete picture of the site, the quantity of soil, stone, loam, sod or gravel to be removed and the reason for removal must be given.

In accordance with your instructions, I have made an audit of the general accounts of the Town of Norfolk for the period from December 1, 1962, and of the Tax Collector's accounts from March 17, 1963, the dates of the previous examinations, to May 19, 1965, the following report being submitted thereon:

The records of financial transactions of the several departments receiving or disbursing money for the Town or committing bills for collection were examined, checked, and verified by comparison with the records in the offices of the Town Treasurer and the Town Accountant.

The Town Accountant's ledger accounts were analyzed, the receipts being checked with the Treasurer's books and the payments being compared with the warrants authorizing them and with the Treasurer's records of payments. The appropriations, loan authorizations and reserve fund transfers were checked with the Town Clerk's records of Town Meeting proceedings and with the amounts authorized by the Advisory Committee. A trial balance was taken off, and a balance sheet, a copy of which is appended to this report, was prepared showing the financial condition of the Town on May 19, 1965.

The surety bonds on file for the several Town Officials required by law to furnish such surety for the faithful performance of their duties were examined and found to be in proper form.

The books and accounts of the Town Treasurer were examined and checked. The receipts, as recorded, were compared with the records in the several departments in which money was collected for the Town and with other sources from which money was paid into the Town Treasury, while the payments were checked with the Selectmen's warrants authorizing the disbursement of Town funds.

The cash book additions were verified, and the cash balance on May 19, 1965 was proved by reconciliation of the bank balances with statements certified by the banks of deposit, by examination of the savings bank book, and by actual count of the cash in the office.

The recorded payments of maturing debt and interest were checked with the amounts falling due and with the cancelled securities and coupons on file. The outstanding coupons on May 19, 1965 were listed and reconciled with a statement certified by the bank of deposit.

The savings bank books representing the investment of the trust funds in the custody of the Town Treasurer were examined and listed. The income was proved, and all transactions and balances were verified.

The records of tax titles held by the Town were examined and checked. The amounts transferred to the tax title accounts were checked with the Tax Collector's books, the reported redemptions were checked with the receipts as recorded on the Treasurer's books, and the tax titles on hand were listed, reconciled with the Town Accountant's ledger accounts, and checked with the records at the Registry of Deeds.

The employees' cards for payroll deductions on account of Federal and State taxes, the State teachers' and County retirement systems, and group insurance premiums were examined and checked.

The books and accounts of the Tax Collector were examined and checked in detail. The taxes and motor vehicle and trailer excise recommitted at the time of the previous audit, as well as all subsequent commitments, were audited and proved with the Assessors' warrants for their collection. The recorded collections were checked with the payments to the Treasurer, the abatements as entered were compared with the Assessors' records of abatements granted, the transfers to the tax title account were proved, and the outstanding accounts were listed and reconciled with the respective controls in the Town Accountant's ledger.

It is recommended that action be taken to effect a prompt settlement of the delinquent taxes and motor vehicle and trailer excise.

The records of departmental and water accounts receivable were examined and checked in detail. The commitments were proved, the recorded collections were checked with the Treasurer's and the Accountant's books, and detailed lists of the outstanding accounts were drawn off and reconciled with the Town Accountant's ledger controls.

Further verification of the outstanding tax, excise, departmental and water accounts was made by mailing notices to a number of persons whose names appeared on the books as owing money to the Town, the replies received thereto indicating that the accounts, as listed, are correct.

The Town Clerk's accounts pertaining to dog and sporting licenses issued, as well as to the collection of miscellaneous receipts, were examined and checked. The payments to the Treasurer and to the State were verified.

The records of departmental cash collections by the Board of Selectmen and the Sealer of Weights and Measures, as well as by the Police, Building, Health, School, Library and Recreation Departments, and by all other departments in which money was collected for the Town, were examined and checked. The payments to the Treasurer were verified, and the cash on hand in the several departments was proved by actual count.

In addition to the balance sheet, there are appended to this report tables showing reconciliations of the Treasurer's and Collector's cash, summaries of the tax, excise, departmental, and water accounts, as well as schedules showing the condition and transactions of the trust and investment funds.

While engaged in making the audit cooperation was received from the several Town Officials, for which, on behalf of my assistants and for myself, I wish to express appreciation.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CIVIL DEFENSE AGENCY

Another year of active participation by your Civil Defense Agency comes to a close. In this year we accomplished most aims set forth. There are many things that should be done, but we realize the funds are not available and would be hard to bear, with our present tax situation. Thought should be given to the feasibility of a proper Emergency Operations Center and your agency will do some preliminary planning for the future.

In 1966, with the completion of the new Police and Fire quarters, this agency will move to that location, with all public safety units of your town government together, as they should be.

This agency is most fortunate in having police and fire departments, which cooperate to the fullest with the best of their abilities. This is not the usual; so with sincerity we thank them.

At this time some credit must be given to our Communications Dept. and Auxiliary Police; they are our most active groups in Civil Defense. No one likes to bring up old news but credit must be given to these two groups. When the East Coast was blacked out this past fall, your communications unit was on the state C.D. radio network

within five minutes after our auxiliary power plant was put into operation, which was almost immediately. Then within thirty minutes every Auxiliary Police Officer responded to duty and were mobilized, with local and C.B. radio equipment. This was a credit to them both, and proves diligence and a great sense of duty to their town.

I would like to thank all members of this agency, other department heads, and interested citizens for their cooperation and support and hope they realize we are available to help with any problems or aid we might give.

REPORT OF THE SPECIAL WATER STUDY COMMITTEE

The special water study committee working with the members of the Water Board, has met and discussed the future of Norfolk in regards to the feasibility of a central water system.

Norfolk must face up to the reality that it no longer can remain an isolated community depending on the State and generosity of neighboring towns to supply water for the citizens of Norfolk.

A professional survey was conducted by Whitman and Howard, an engineering firm specializing in water systems. The results of this survey was a proposal for a gravel packed well, pumping station and storage reservoir with connecting mains.

Your board has been advised that as of October 1965, a Bill was passed by Congress authorizing the Federal government to make grants to towns of less than 5500 population of 50% of the cost in installing a water system.

Contact has been made with Mr. Starr, the government representative in charge of this area, pertaining to this bill to see if the Town of Norfolk will qualify for this grant.

A complete report will be delivered to all families before the Annual Town Meeting.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF PUBLIC WELFARE

To the Board of Selectmen:

The Board of Public Welfare submits its annual report for the year 1965.

The total amount spent for Old Age Assistance and Medical Assistance to the Aged combined was \$35,624.97 in aid of 38 cases. The combined total expenditure for Aid to Families with Dependent Children, Disability Assistance and General Relief was \$21,052.28 in assisting 19 cases.

In November, 1965 the Board regretfully accepted the resignation of the Director, Mrs. Doris M. Carr. Mrs. Carr served the Town of Norfolk ably for 15 years, during which she organized the services and operation of the Norfolk Public Welfare Agency which she has administered with faithfulness, efficiency and devotion. The Board wishes her success in fulfilling of her duties as full-time Director in the Town of Medfield.

The office of Director in Norfolk is presently filled by Mrs. Janet G. Sievert, who was appointed to fill the vacancy.

The aim of Public Welfare is the eventual elimination of poverty through the cooperation of the Federal, State and local Public Welfare Agencies. Financial, medical and social service assistance rendered

under the standards of both the Federal Department of Health, Education and Welfare and the State Department of Public Welfare are planned with this goal in mind. Under the Economic Opportunity Act of 1965 new education and training programs have been instituted and social services emphasizing stronger family life have been expanded under the Social Security Act of 1965. In addition, the new program known as Medicare is expanding medical assistance to our aged.

Expenses for medical care to fill medical needs continue to increase, due in part to increased longevity and the accompanying illnesses of the elderly which tend to be chronic. Enactment of the Medical Care program should help to reduce these costs. However, Americans have a life expectancy of 70 years as of 1960 compared to 60 years in 1950. Assistance to the elderly is, and will continue to be, a major expenditure in Public Welfare.

The administration of these programs will increase the work load of our local personnel as they seek to give adequate service to the recipients in accordance with State regulations.

Mrs. Jane Sullivan, Junior Clerk, continues to serve with efficiency and the Board wishes to thank her for her able assistance.

Board meetings are held on the first and third Thursday of each month. Applicants and recipients may take the opportunity to discuss any problems with the Board at that time.

REPORT OF THE REVALUATION COMMITTEE

March 1966

Pursuant to a vote taken on Article 19 of the March 1965 town meeting, the Selectmen appointed a committee of seven members (three of which are the Assessors) to look into the advisability of having the town's real estate revalued by a survey company and to submit their findings at the March 1966 town meeting.

The committee finds:

1. There are now, and have been for years, inequities in property valuations. These disproportionate assessments have been caused by different methods in assessing being practiced by different Boards of Assessors over the years.
2. The courts have clearly stated that Assessors shall assess real estate at "full and fair" value. The committee offers these two examples:

a. Millis Taxpayers vs. Town of Millis.

The Town of Millis was prevented by court order from sending out tax bills until the case was settled. The town had to borrow and pay interest on \$500,000. in order to continue to function. The court found in favor of the Millis taxpayers.

b. Beverly Taxpayers vs. City of Beverly.

The Beverly Assessors were ordered by the court to make plans for a revaluation no later than January 14, 1966 and to have the results of this revaluation in effect as of January 1, 1967.

Summary

1. Inequities in property assessments exist now and the situation will get worse.
2. The courts are insisting that the law be followed: that Assessors carry out their sworn duty and assess at full and fair value.

Solution 1.

Have the Assessors revalue the town themselves. We estimate that it would take at least 1200 hours for the Assessors to revalue (700 hours to gather data and 500 hours of calculations). The Assessors are employed on a part-time basis and do not have the required time to do this within a single calendar year. It is reasonable to assume at least 6 years would be required to complete the job and that the data collected would be stored and not used until the entire revaluation were done. By that time, many inequities would again result.

Solution 2.

Have an outside appraisal company revalue the town. Using modern appraisal techniques and recent sales data, experienced appraisers will place a "fair market value" on each parcel of property, and do it within a 12 month period. The estimated cost for this survey is \$13,000 or \$4,333 each year for three years.

It is important to remember that, in the final analysis, the Assessors, and not a survey company, are responsible for the valuations. Consistent with current practice, taxpayers will have the opportunity to discuss any change in assessment after a revaluation has been completed.

The revaluation committee favors solution 2.

REPORT OF THE CONSERVATION COMMISSION

1965—to describe it in the mildest possible manner—has been a busy year. The scope of our work has multiplied, our field of vision has necessarily broadened, and the possibilities of the future have become limitless.

With this future in mind, we again fostered the Poster-Essay contest at Central School. In each class, a boy and girl winner were chosen, and awarded a year's enjoyment by means of the Audubon magazine, "Curious Naturalist". All these young entrants showed amazing perception in their interpretations of assigned subjects.

Kingsbury Pond demanded a share of our attention, and, after consulting five separate State and Federal agencies, a report was compiled, and filed with the Selectmen and Board of Health.

Interest and concern is continually building up with regard to the Charles River, as evidenced by the number of participating State, Federal, and local agencies. This Commission is taking an active part in the work, and our chairman, in the Fall, was elected Chairman of the Board of Directors of the Charles River Watershed Association.

One of our more important accomplishments was the purchase of land, by means of the Self-Help Conservation Program, and the construction of the swimming pond as the basic part of the family recreation-conservation area. The cost of this project was underestimated, but it seems to be a general concensus that the results have vindicated the extra expenditure.

In conjunction with this, we reached an agreement with Mr. Gottfred Olsen whereby the Town will be granted a strip of land, adjacent to the Highway Department property, so that an access road to the recreation area may be constructed, with the result that traffic to and from the swimming area will not interfere with Highway Department activity.

The survey of the Town Forest area was completed, and we are now in the process of obtaining a right of access to the area. This is a property consisting of 18 acres of marshland and woodland on Stop River, off Seekonk Street, and downstream from Campbell Street, ideally situated as a wildlife refuge and nature study area.

Aside from many meetings of lesser importance, representatives from the Norfolk Commission attended the semi-annual meetings of the Massachusetts Association of Conservation Commissions. These meetings serve not only to acquaint us with the work of other commissions, but to coordinate the work of all commissions for the future of the entire State.

In November, a public meeting was held as a sort of progress report of our general activities, and featured a showing of the slides taken by our members throughout the year. Unfortunately, our publicity fell far short of expectations, and the attendance was small. Those who did attend have encouraged us to promote another meeting as soon as possible, and this we have promised to do.

Water quality being one of our major concerns, and having become impatient with the lassitude of the State laboratory, we have, at small expense, set up a small biological laboratory. This will enable us to test all the streams and ponds in the Town, including the swimming pond, and determine the degree of pollution which may be present. Several other towns are interested in the program, and a pamphlet has been prepared for distribution through the Charles River Watershed Association.

Again with an eye to the future, we have prepared and distributed the booklet entitled "Land-Water Resource Planning for the Town of Norfolk—Why?" This is a succinctly total explanation of our reason for existence. The preservation, the planning, the maintenance and the protection of the physical environmental quality of the town of Norfolk is our primary goal. We invite not only your interest, but your help. Come to our meetings and join in the understanding of the "New Conservation".

REPORT OF THE NORFOLK PLANNING BOARD

Twelve regular meetings were held on the second Monday of each month plus twenty-four special meetings and three public hearings.

The Town Master Plan was completed and accepted and 100 copies have been received. Copies have been distributed to all Town departments and committees and are available to the general public at the library and office of the Town Clerk.

Your Planning Board has implemented this plan by adopting the Subdivision Rules and Regulations as recommended. Our next step to present to a Special Town Meeting in the spring a new set of zoning by-laws for their approval is being planned. Your Board is certain that the adoption of these two recommendations will greatly aid the orderly growth of the Town.

A subdivision off Holbrook Street of 23 lots was approved.

A subdivision off Rockwood Road of 16 lots was accepted as complete.

A subdivision off Fruit Street of 180 lots was disapproved by the Board because of several nonconforming features. The Town Clerk has certified that this disapproval was not received within the time limit prescribed by law.

The election of a Board of Health should be of great assistance to our Board in regulating the conditions pertaining to health in all future subdivisions.

The Board is grateful for all the Committee members, Town Officials and other citizens who have aided the Board in completing the Master Plan and hope that the recommendations contained therein will be implemented by the Town.

This application must be completed by a registered sanitary engineer and approved by us and the building inspector before a building permit can be issued.

In the fall we started the immunization program for diphtheria, tetanus, and whooping cough sponsored by the State Department of Public Health. Speakers attended our meeting to aid us in this program. The clinic was very successful.

Another project undertaken was the cleaning up of and regulating the use of the Town Dump. We hired a keeper to enforce the hours of operation, keep the dump area orderly and keep the fire lanes open.

These projects and various complaints brought before us made an interesting and busy first year for the Board of Health.

The Board of Water Commissioners wishes to thank water takers for cooperating in conserving water during the period of drought. The overall consumption was reduced more than one million gallons.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL COMMITTEE

To the Citizens of Norfolk:

The report of the School Committee is hereby submitted for the calendar year ending December 31, 1965.

The first order of business following the Town Election last year was the organizing of the committee as follows: Alvin J. Freeman, Chairman; Mrs. Eva Holmes, Secretary and Representative to the King Philip District, and Arnold Dalghren, member of the local committee.

Regular meetings of the School Committee are held at the Superintendent's office at 7:30 P.M. on the Thursday before the fourth Monday of each month except during July and August. Special meetings are held during the school year and during the summer as the need arises.

School business for pupils in grades one through six should be handled through the office of the Principal or Superintendent and they may be reached at the Central School by telephoning 528-1225 for an appointment.

In order for a child to enter the first grade in September he or she must have attained the age of five years on or before January first of that year. The above age is the entrance age used in most schools in Massachusetts.

For the second school year the new addition is in use. These eight rooms, all-purpose, health office, foyer and administrative areas are quite functional. Grades assigned to this area include three second grades, three third grades and two fourth grades.

The left hand wing, or first addition to the building, is used to house four first grades. On the second floor of the building one room is used for grade four, two rooms for grade five and three rooms for grade six. Temporarily, vacant rooms are used for a library and an art room.

Your School Committee wishes to acknowledge the following gifts to the school from our local Parent Teacher Association:

Registration to the "21 Inch Classroom" and sponsoring of educational trips.

Your School Committee maintains an active membership in the Massachusetts Association of School Committees. Last October your chairman, secretary and superintendent attended the annual state convention of the association at the Belmont Hotel in Harwich, Mass.

The Committee wishes to thank the townspeople for their cooperation given to the School Committee and to the school authorities. Recently a state supervisor of elementary education visited the school

and was highly impressed with the personnel, school program and plant. Professionally, the faculty and administration work hand in hand for the benefit of the student body.

To the parents, townspeople and leaders of the various departments—police, fire and highway, we express our appreciation for your cooperation.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Committee of the Town of Norfolk:

Herewith I submit my seventeenth report as Superintendent of Schools in Norfolk. It includes reports of the Principal, Assistant Principal and other key personnel.

This brief report only covers the highlights of the year's activities.

Personnel:

You will note from our School Personnel Chart that three teachers resigned and four appointments were made. To equalize the teacher-pupil load, an additional teacher was added. Two days a week are devoted to vocal music, compared to the previous one day a week.

We extend a cordial welcome to our new members and wish success and happiness to them and to those who have left our service.

School Plant:

The division of classes this year is as follows:

Grade One—Four Classrooms—Previous Addition
Grade Two—Three Classrooms—New Addition
Grade Three—Three Classrooms—New Addition
Grade Four—Three Classrooms—Two in New Addition
 One on Second Floor
Grade Five—Two Classrooms—Second Floor
Grade Six—Three Classrooms—Second Floor
Total—Eighteen Classrooms

The new addition is working out exceptionally well and we are grateful to the townspeople and the School Building Committee for working out and making available these facilities.

Eight classrooms, principal's office, health office, reception area and the Gertrude MacBride Hall are housed in this section.

Curriculum:

In our program we strive to develop each individual according to his maximum potential.

The program has been devised to develop horizontally as well as vertically at each grade level, as well as from grade level to grade level.

We use the self contained classroom, or one teacher to a class, basically in grades one through four. In grades five and six we departmentalize in the area of English, mathematics, science, social studies and reading. We believe that this plan in grades five and six will best serve our purpose. We are desirous to prepare each pupil for the King Philip Regional School in every way possible. The introduction of subject matter teaches in grades five and six an excellent experience before pupils go to the King Philip Regional School.

Basically we cover the areas of language arts which includes English, and reading, mathematics, science, social studies, art, music, health and physical education.

Temporarily we are using two of our vacant classrooms for a library and art room. This enables us to offer library experiences and art appreciation to all of our students under teacher direction on a scheduled basis. To begin to use library facilities early in life is advantageous for the students. Boys and girls begin to know that books are friends and like association with good friends, association with good books are beneficial for the students.

Practically 100% of our faculty and administration has taken or is taking courses since our last report to keep up with the current change in education. Teachers pursue courses in areas which are related to their teaching assignments.

Point of View:

As Thomas Jefferson said: "If a nation expects to be ignorant and free in a state of civilization, it expects what never was and never will be." Education gives us the ability to enjoy a greater variety of things, to live more comfortably, and in greater agreement with ourselves, our surroundings and our neighbors. Education benefits the individual, his family, his community and the nation.

Education formerly depended to a large extent on the personal relationship between teachers and pupils, printed books and workbooks, and laboratory areas. More recently radio, television, records, audio and visual tapes and overhead projectors have been added and used extensively.

We plan and are using these audio visual aids more and more. This year, thanks to the help of our Parent Teacher Association, we are participating in the "21 Inch Classroom".

Insurance:

For the thirteenth consecutive year the Pupil School Insurance Policy has been made available on a voluntary basis to all students

Applications are received each September and notices sent home for parents concerning the policy. We ask parents to consider the matter of the Pupil Insurance Policy seriously. To date all claims forwarded to the office have been paid. On the basis of the present price the charge is less than a cent a day.

Professional Participation:

Faculty members of the Central School participate in the local, county and state professional organizations and many are National Education Association members. The Norfolk School Committee holds active membership in the Massachusetts Association of School Committees. Your Superintendent serves as Co-Chairman of the Legislation Committee of the Massachusetts Association of School Superintendents and also on the Advisory Council on Legislation to the State Board of Education.

Last summer your Superintendent was the recipient of an award which allowed him to study government in Washington for five weeks and to spend one week in New York City at the United Nations.

Quality Education:

In last year's report I mentioned that the report of the Willis Commission, which had been studying public school education in Massachusetts from kindergarten through college for about two years under the direction of Dr. Benjamin C. Willis, Superintendent of Schools, Chicago, as Executive Director, has made its recommendations to the General Court. This was passed by our General Court and was a major highlight of the 1965 session. In order that the report be put into effect as recommended, financial support is needed from the state level for the towns and cities.

As this is being written the Governor has presented his sixth tax proposal and there is a deadlock between the House and Senate concerning their tax proposals.

Reimbursements:

It is well to know the amount received from the state for reimbursement purposes. Please check chart in this report relating to finances. Federal programs are in effect under the National Defense Education Act and Public Law 89-10 with its five titles namely:

- I —Helping the Underprivileged
- II —Textbooks and Libraries
- III—Research and Educational Centers and Services
- IV—Educational Research and Training
- V —Strengthening the State Department of Education

We have profited financially by the National Defense Education Act and are working to set up programs under Public Law 89-10.

Conclusion:

We believe that the teaching of phonics is basic to successful reading. In this case we develop ear-training so that the pupil at an early age is able to move from listening skills to speech and to the printed word.

Standardized tests are used diagnostically so that we may discover our strengths and weaknesses. In all cases our class averages are above the national norms.

Every Pupil working to capacity is our goal.

May I take this opportunity to thank the Parent Teacher Association for its financial support in making it possible for us to participate in the "21 Inch Classroom" and for financing our educational class trips.

May I at this time express my appreciation for the cooperation and assistance rendered by the members of the School Committee, the Principal, the Assistant Principal, the entire school personnel, all local departments, organizations and townspeople.

REPORT OF THE NORFOLK CENTRAL SCHOOL

To the Superintendent of Schools:

It is with pleasure that we submit our fifth annual report as administrators of the Norfolk Central School.

Last spring the parent-teacher conferences were instituted as an important part of the school reporting procedure. This fall, during American Education Week, parent-teacher conferences were again held and the response was inspirational with very few cancellations. These conferences proved informative and beneficial as they helped to develop a mutual understanding of the child both at home and at school through the exchange of ideas. Attitudes were discussed and insights gained. We plan to schedule these conferences again in the spring as the end of the year approaches.

In observation of American Education Week, Open House was held on November 10, 1965 from nine to twelve o'clock. Approximately two hundred fifty parents took advantage of the opportunity to visit the classrooms.

The Savings Stamps Program which has been so successful in recent years is again in progress under the direction of Mrs. Stobbart. During the 1964-1965 school year our sales surpassed all previous years as the sales of stamps totalled \$2,744.45 and \$1,650.00 for bonds. We feel this program provides an excellent lesson in thrift.

We extend a special word of thanks and appreciation to the Norfolk Parent Teacher Association for providing the opportunity for the Norfolk Central School to participate in The 21 Inch Classroom Television Program this year. This is another wonderful means of visual education which enriches the curriculum and broadens the scope of knowledge. Outstanding programs in science, children's literature, English, phonics, music and historical field trips are viewed regularly. Faculty members provide suitable but essential introductory lessons in advance of the television program.

As in previous years pupils in grades four, five and six participated in the annual S.P.C.A. Poster Contest with the following results:

1st prizes—Barbara Ehnes, David Eisner, Maureen Masterson, Constance Stacey.

2nd prizes—Barbara MacNeil, Walter Zagieboylo, Patricia Wright.

3rd prizes—Sharon Collins, Christine Lighty, Karl Jacobson, Stephen Larsen, Diana Menzel, Katherine Howard, Edward Mackey and Samuel Zeigler.

This has been the best showing we have made in recent years.

Many outstanding science projects were submitted for consideration in the Eldred Readell Science Awards Contest. The awards correlate the Webster Classroom Science Library with personal interest, project activity and initiative. After lengthy consultation the following awards were made:

1st prize—Barbara Gowen for her project on An Ant Colony.

2nd prize—Christopher Armen for his project on Six Simple Machines.

3rd prize—Michael Carter for his project on the Diagram of An Eye and Ronald Tibbetts for his project on How Electricity Travels.

Honorable Mention to Jonathan Evans, David Eisner, Susan Parsons, Michael Moore, Bruce Petrovick, Britton Robson, Susan Handy, JoAnn Preston, Christopher Mackey, John Finase and Maureen Masterson.

Outstanding geography and history projects were also on display from time to time throughout the year in correlation with the social studies curriculum.

We are deeply grateful to both the Norfolk Conservation Commission and Norfolk Grange No. 135 for their interest in the youth of Norfolk. Again this year the Conservation Commission conducted a poster contest for pupils of grades one through four with prizes of subscriptions to The Curious Naturalist awarded to a boy and girl at each grade level. Pupils of grades five and six wrote essays showing the value of soil and water to the Town of Norfolk. The Norfolk Grange Conservation Committee sponsored a sixth grade conservation project with prizes of \$5, \$3, \$2 and \$1 awarded to the winners. Wendy Pink won the first prize.

In compliance with the request from Dr. Owen Kiernan, Commissioner of Education, a special Flag Day program was presented under the direction of the classroom teachers, Miss Elinore Cole, music super-

visor, and the administrators. Opening exercises were held on the front lawn with pupils assembled around the flagpole. The afternoon program consisted of an impressive Flag Drill by fourth grade girls as well as appropriate songs and poems emphasizing the importance and significance of the American flag. Flag Day poster awards were made during the program.

We wish to thank the Sixth Grade Class of 1965 for the gift of the beautiful red maple tree which will add beauty and grace to our school yard.

Last April the faculty members presented a special evening program devoted to the areas of reading and mathematics. The program to which all parents were invited was in the form of a panel discussion with Miss Day serving as moderator. Faculty members at each grade level explained the methods and procedures used in teaching reading and arithmetic, especially the new approaches in the modern math program. A short question and answer period followed the discussion and demonstrations.

Faculty members, supervisors and administrators have all attended various workshops and conferences throughout the year to obtain a broader knowledge of new methods and approaches in teaching subject matter and presenting enrichment material as the desire for professional growth becomes greater. Workshops in phonics at North Attleboro, reading at Dedham, the initial teaching alphabet at Norton, the non-graded school at Foxboro and the Space Age Conference at Sharon and special Horace Mann Day program in Franklin were all well attended. In addition Norfolk was well represented at the art, music and science workshops in Walpole conducted by the Norfolk County Teachers Association. This fall several faculty members have been taking the modern math course at Norwood under the leadership of Mr. Clarence Bennett of Brookline and sponsored by Norfolk County Teachers Association.

In addition to the regular S.R.A. testing program in April, the Gates Reading Tests were administered to all grades at the half year period. The results of these tests were most encouraging since reading plays such a vital part in all areas of the educational program. To achieve success and maintain high scholastic standards proper reading skills must be developed, a good command of phonics is essential and the ability to comprehend is most important.

The Massachusetts Audubon Society Course, consisting of bi-weekly lectures by Mr. Albert Bussewitz, Director of the Stony Brook Nature Center and the Bristol-Blake Reservation, has enriched the sixth grade science program again this year. The interesting presentation of the natural sciences includes displays, specimens, diagrams, slides and field trips. We are grateful for the opportunity of having

Mr. Bussewitz as our instructor. Through his skillful lessons he has created a keen awareness of our natural environment and the responsibility of all to protect our natural heritage.

The class trips for grades one through six covered a variety of places and interests appropriate for grade level. Grade six visited the University Museum in Harvard Square, grade five visited Concord and Lexington, which correlates with their history and literature. The fourth grade enjoyed the many interests at the Science Museum. Grade three had a tour of the famous Old Ironsides and visited the State House where the procedures were explained. Lunch in the Boston Common was enjoyed by all. The second grade enjoyed Franklin Park and feeding the baby animals and the first grade enjoyed a trip to the Trailside Museum.

The usual orientation day at the King Philip Regional High School was replaced this year by an assembly in our own school where the program for the seventh grade was presented by Mr. Charles Manos, principal of the King Philip, and Mr. Francis O'Regan, Jr., the guidance director. A question and answer period followed. The band from the King Philip provided the entertainment. This presentation of the opportunities awaiting the students created an awareness of new horizons awaiting them in the years to come.

The first, second and third grades presented a musical at the May P.T.A. meeting under the direction of Miss Cole, our music supervisor. The title was *The Three Elizabeths* and presented "the community helpers" and how they changed in the 18th, 19th and 20th centuries.

The Norfolk Teacher's Club actively participates in educational programs both locally and nationally. Our past president, Mrs. Fernald, is still active in the Norfolk County Teacher's Association, where Mrs. White, as president, is responsible for representing the Teachers Club at the Massachusetts Teachers' Association meetings. The Teacher's Club has a substantial membership in the Norfolk County Teacher's Association, the Massachusetts Teacher's Association and the National Education Association. Contributions were made by the Teacher's Club to the Stony Brook Nature Center, Care, the King Philip Scholarship Fund and the Prince Edward Free School Association. The Teacher's Club supplied the films for the visual education program this year and provided refreshments for the pupils at the annual Christmas parties. This year Barbara Gowen was sent by the Teacher's Club to the Stony Brook Nature Camp for two weeks due to her appreciation of nature and wildlife.

May we take this opportunity to again thank you, the School Committee, the faculty, the students, the custodians, Mrs. Potter, the P.T.A., the Conservation Commission, the Norfolk Grange, the librari-

ans, the nurses, the dental hygienists, the parents, and the citizens of Norfolk for your many kindnesses, words of encouragement, understanding, splendid cooperation and fine spirit of friendliness which have been so much in evidence throughout the year.

REPORT OF THE AUDUBON CONSERVATION PROGRAM

To the Superintendent of Schools:

In addition to the in-school teaching the Norfolk classes enjoyed guided field trips to the local Bristol-Blake Reservation.

REPORT OF HANDWRITING

To the Superintendent of Schools:

The handwriting program in the Norfolk Central School attempts to do the following things:

1. To secure an excellent handwriting product with a minimum expenditure of time, effort and materials;

2. To predicate all techniques on the idea that the welfare of the child is of major concern and that everything possible will be done to insure correct posture and angle of vision. All handwriting and hand lettering is built on the natural writing slant of the child in order that this correct posture and angle of vision may be maintained with ease and to reduce to a minimum the problem of transition from lettering to cursive handwriting;
3. To provide expert direction in the operation of the handwriting program;
4. To provide adequate instructional and motivational materials for teachers and pupils with careful direction and followup to see that these materials are used properly;
5. To make adequate provision for individual differences as they relate to the handwriting of each child, also to permit teachers to proceed at the rate best suited to the class;
6. To give adequate attention to the problem of left-handed writer and make available effective tests to determine the ration of dexterity in prescribing for a beginner;
7. To teach the concomitants of neatness, accuracy and attention to detail along with the mastery in technical handwriting;
8. To achieve and surpass national norms in speed and quality of handwriting;
9. To secure a handwriting product that will favorably impress the parents of the children to a degree that it will reflect credit on the entire school system;
10. To correlate handwriting with arithmetic, spelling, etc. To achieve this we make the actual spelling lesson, arithmetic lesson, etc., the contextual material for the penmanship instruction. To use a creative approach and have the pupil make his own compendium from writing activities involved in these related subjects.

The following statistics will indicate the degree of effectiveness of the handwriting program. At the close of the last school term our records indicate that 87% of the pupils scored excellent, 12% scored good, 1% scored fair and no% were poor on the formal handwriting test.

I wish to take this opportunity to thank the teachers and pupils for the interest and effort they have manifested and for the excellent results that have been forthcoming.

REPORT OF THE NORFOLK SCHOOL HEALTH PROGRAM

September 1964 to June 1965

To the Superintendent of Schools:

During the 1964-1965 school year all the children at the Central School had their vision and hearing tested, as well as their heights and weights recorded to ascertain any deviation from a normal growth pattern. Notices were sent to parents of twenty-six children advising them to seek further examination of possible vision problems. Of the twenty-two children seen by an ophthalmologist, twenty were found to be in need of treatment. Notices were also sent to parents of sixteen children advising them to seek further examination for possible hearing problems. Of the twelve children who were seen by their family physician or a specialist, eleven were found to be in need of attention.

Again, may we remind the parents that our Titmus Vision Testing and Pure Tone Audiometer Testing are simply screening tests and do not serve as a conclusive examination.

One hundred seventy-five physical examinations were made by our school physician, Dr. A. Ritchey Stagg. These included Grade One pre-entry examinations, all of Grade Four and the new students who transferred here from other schools.

The Heaf Tuberculin Test was given to seventy-seven students in Grade One. It is our pleasure to announce that there were no positive reactors.

There were scattered cases of measles, German measles, chicken pox, mumps and scarlet fever this year. Our regulations still state, for the protection of your children, that any child who has had a communicable disease or has been absent for five consecutive days must have a doctor's certificate to return to class. The school physician will issue these certificates free of charge from his office in Medfield or your family physician may issue them.

The usual number of minor playground casualties were given first aid treatment and several sick students were dismissed over the past school year.

The Norwood Mental Health Center is still available to any one who seeks help with emotional problems in the school child.

We wish to say a sincere "thank you" to the parents and school personnel for their fine cooperation and helpfulness.

Please feel free to contact us at the school on Tuesday and Thursday mornings if there are any questions about a particular problem or about our school health program.

DENTAL HEALTH REPORT

To the Superintendent of Schools:

In cooperation with the Tufts University School of Dental Medicine, pupils in grades four, five and six brush their teeth in class after lunch each day and the dentifrice is furnished for the entire family for home use.

X-Rays and a clinical dental examination was done in the fall. Notices were sent to the parents of those children who were in need of dental attention. Dental inspections were done also for the pre-school children in cooperation with the school nurse and physician.

In an attempt to find the cause of dental decay, a group of twenty-five pupils have been participating in a basic research study of saliva and plaque. These studies were initiated in the spring and continued through the summer and the fall school session. Much gratitude is due to both parents and pupils for their cooperation in this important study.

There has been a notable improvement in the dental hygiene since the program has been established and most parents have cooperated in providing the needed dental care.

May we extend our sincere thanks to the staff, parents and family dentists who helped carry out the program.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

1965 - 1966

TO:

King Philip Regional School District Committee

Citizens of the King Philip Regional School District

I am pleased to submit to you my first annual report as your Superintendent. Having started work, full time, on April 1, 1965 this has been a period of orientation and learning for me. It has been a very busy period and yet most rewarding. It has been a period with a variety of challenging problems—planning and construction details in the construction of the new Junior High School, orientation to a new budget, interviewing and recommending personnel, maintenance work at the present building, and the numerous difficulties inherent in the operation of the District with an extended session.

The major effort this year has been in relation to the new Junior High School. The general contract was awarded to Westcott Construction Corporation on June 11, 1965 and the ground breaking held on July 13, 1965. Work on the School is progressing satisfactorily with very few lost days due to inclement weather. The amount and number of change orders are being very carefully scrutinized by the School Committee and the Superintendent. Sizeable change orders caused by the need for additional "fill" and cement were necessitated because of discrepancies in the topographical survey of the property. Some delay was experienced due to problems involved in the acquisition of land. As of the end of the year construction of substantial portions of the

masonry walls had been achieved. Very favorable weather conditions have permitted continued progress by all trades. We are most fortunate to have a contractor who keeps the project moving by accurate delivery dates of material and by his willingness to employ as many men as the work area will permit.

In early 1966 advertising for equipment bids will occur. Prior to this the School Committee and School Administration, with the assistance of the Heads of Department will review the equipment plans and specifications. Advertising for bids on site development will occur in late winter or early spring. It is also hoped that the School furnishings will be out for bids as early in the spring as possible in order to assure delivery prior to the anticipated opening of school in September.

We are pleased with the design work of Haynes, Lieneck and Smith. Both Mr. Paul Lienick and Mr. Richard Smith have worked closely with the School Committee and Superintendent. Their field man, Mr. Ronald Bartlett, has kept the project under careful scrutiny by regular visits to the site. We have been most fortunate to have as our Clerk of the Works, Mr. John Apsit, whose many years in construction work as a Contractor's Superintendent, enable us to keep well-informed on the progress of the building. Mr. Apsit's counsel and advice on construction problems have been most helpful and financially beneficial to the District. We believe that our Junior High School will be a building of which we can all be proud. It will also be a building which looks to the future and will permit us to have a curriculum which meets the needs of our boys and girls.

The opening of the Junior High School will cause adjustments to be made in the School. During the transition period we hope that parents, pupils, and staff will be as cooperative and understanding as they have been during the current School Year. The addition of the new Junior High School will not only provide much needed space but will permit us to offer a much improved and enriched program for our boys and girls.

A future need which has become apparent to me is the necessity for improved coordination of the Elementary and Secondary Programs during this current year. Steps to minimize this problem have been taken by meetings with my three Colleagues and similar meetings between the three Elementary Principals and the Director of Guidance at the High School.

An article in your Town Warrant which needs your careful consideration is the proposal to establish a Vocational Technical School for the Towns of this area. This school would provide a much broader Vocational Program for our boys and girls in Grades 9-12. It would also provide two years of post High School Technical Training.

One of my problems was adjusting to the workings of our budget and its inherent problems. Although based on the Federal Code it varied slightly from my previous experience. We have done our best to work within the budget limits and believe that we have been reasonably successful. The budget for the School Year 1966 has been carefully reviewed and revised at least six times. The School Committee and Budget Committee have diligently worked on the budget and your Superintendent has had to justify increased expenditures as well as those remaining the same. The meeting in November with the Tri-Town Finance Committee was most beneficial and we hope informative. The current operating budget for 1966 has increased about 11% or approximately \$99,000.00 over 1965.

The recruitment of teachers is probably the most time consuming task in School Administration and the most important for the education of our boys and girls. Each applicant is interviewed, references are checked in writing and in person, and whenever possible, observed in a classroom. This last year we employed 19 teachers new to our School District. The reasons for employing these teachers were: retirement—2; moved to other schools—10; family reasons—3; and additional teachers due to increased enrollment—4. We do not feel that this turnover was excessive. We believe that a competitive salary schedule will enable us to attract good teachers as they are needed, that a schedule which rewards a teacher for service and competency will help us to retain good teachers, and that a good schedule will encourage our teachers to improve their knowledge and techniques of teaching. We, as a District, should be proud of the dedicated teachers whom we now employ to aid and assist our children in pursuing their educational objectives within the limits of their ability. It has been a rewarding experience to work with our Staff. Your School Administration will continue to strive to obtain the best possible candidates to recommend to the School Committee for appointment as teachers in our Schools.

During the past summer a number of projects essential to the maintenance of the District property were accomplished. As provided in the budget and after competitive bidding a grounds care contract for the football field was awarded to Bancroft's, Inc. This plus regular watering resulted in a much improved playing field. This project was a start and must be continued for several years. In relation to the football field, we also installed concrete curbing along the track with the assistance of Charles Sharon and under the supervision of Mr Lyman H. Parmenter, the Custodial Staff spread and rolled masslite aggreg on the track. The tennis courts received some much needed attention late in the year when the cracks were filled in. In the very near future these courts must be resurfaced.

In the present building in addition to routine cleaning of walls, floors, windows and furniture several projects were undertaken which have greatly improved the appearance of the building. The lower

ceiling of the Auditorium and Gymnasium lobby was recoated with acoustical plaster. Through the efforts of the High School Administration, Faculty, and Custodial Staff plus the cooperation of the Students, this area has been improved.

During the summer vacation the Custodial Staff repainted all of the first floor corridor walls as well as the stairwells. We hope to continue this program in the summer of 1966 by redecorating the second floor corridor as well as some classrooms.

Another major project was the refinishing of the Auditorium seats which has already been commented on by several people. Here again this is a result of the combined efforts of the High School Administration, the Faculty, and the Custodians with the cooperation of the Students.

This annual report would not be complete if I did not commend: the Custodial Staff for their conscientious and cooperative efforts under the supervision of Mr. Clayton Cummings; Mr. Julius Candela for the fine Lunch Program and the many hours of assistance which he has willingly given in work on plans for the new Cafeteria and Kitchen in the Junior High School; the Clerical Staff of the High School and Vocational High School for their untiring efforts; the cooperation and diligence of the Faculty of the High School and Vocational High School, who had the problem of orienting a new Superintendent; Mr. Francis X. O'Regan, Jr. and his Guidance Department for making it a highly effective part of the program; Mr. Preston Titus for his assistance in helping me to become familiar with the operation of the Vocational High School; and to Mr. Walter White for his faithfulness in carrying out assigned tasks willingly and effectively.

I believe that we are most fortunate to have Mr. Charles Manos as our Principal. He deserves a special commendation for his effective efforts as Acting Superintendent and Principal. The learning atmosphere of the High School reflects his leadership. His assistance was invaluable in helping me to become familiar with the building, the Staff and the Junior High School project.

My Secretary, Mrs. Mildred Hill and Bookkeeper, Mrs. Katherine Sheehan, deserve special attention for their patience, understanding, and their willingness in helping me to adjust to my new position as well as the additional time and effort needed with the work involved in the new Junior High School.

Finally, I wish to express my appreciation to the members of the King Philip Regional School District Committee for their confidence in appointing me as well as their patience and cooperation in helping this first year to be successful. They should also be commended for the many additional meetings and hours necessitated by the Junior High School construction project.

In the year ahead let us all strive to make the King Philip Regional School District one which is recognized as placing the educational needs of our boys and girls, at both Elementary and Secondary levels, as the most essential undertaking. We will do our best to keep you informed of School affairs and look forward to an atmosphere of cooperation by all. We welcome all efforts to help us build better School Community relations.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL

TO:

Mr. David W. Eaton, Superintendent, King Philip Regional School

It is with pleasure that I submit this annual report on developments during the past year at the King Philip Regional School.

Again this year, the enrollment at King Philip soared to a new high with a record of 1254 in attendance on the opening day of school. Although in September the new Junior High School building in Norfolk was progressing satisfactorily, several adjustments had to be made in the program in the present building in order to successfully cope with the increased enrollment. This year, the regular school day for grades 8-12 starts at 7:50 A.M. and ends at 2:21 P.M. The seventh grade students arrive at 9:30 A.M. and remain until 3:47 P.M. By utilizing this staggered or extended session we have been able to create thirty-six additional teaching stations each day and thus alleviate some of the problems of overcrowding. This plan has also enabled us to avoid the necessity of going on double, or in effect, on half sessions.

In an effort to better meet the needs of the students at King Philip, several new courses were added to the curriculum while other already established courses became required courses for certain grades. New courses included: speech, general business, world geography, general math IV and calculus. The established courses that are now required for certain groups are: home economics for grade 8 girls, industrial arts for grade 8 boys, reading for all students of grade 7 and grade 8,

art for grade 7 and grade 8, and music for all grade 7 students. In a further effort to aid our students, all class periods have been increased from 40 to 46 minutes in length. It is my hope that there will be additional increases in the next school year also.

For the second year another successful Education Week "Open House" was held with almost 900 parents and friends in attendance. For this educational observance, demonstration classes with actual students performing, were conducted in every phase of school learning. After an interesting and enjoyable "evening at school" all parents and students were treated to an impressive array of delicacies by the Cafeteria Manager, Mr. Julius Candela and members of his staff.

Mr. Candela as "purveyor of fine foods" at King Philip provides us with a lunch program second-to-none in the State of Massachusetts. We are extremely proud of the program and its contributions to the overall educational picture in the region.

I have also been extremely pleased with the interest and competence of the members of the King Philip custodial staff, under the direction of Mr. Clayton Cummings. Everyone in this department deserves special praise for his "top level" performance during the past year.

Several other comments concerning our efforts to improve our educational program are mentioned in the reports of department chairmen and teacher specialists. Excerpts from these reports follows:

Guidance Dept.—" . . . This past summer the members of the Guidance Department had an opportunity to review and re-check the student program elections for the school year. Considerable time was spent on each student's record, insuring that each had the proper background for the course that was selected. The single most important aspect of the summer work program was the availability of trained counselors for parents and students new to the region and, also, to the students currently at the regional school . . . "

Art Dept.—" . . . the entire school was treated to a large showcase featuring the arts and crafts of the faculty members of King Philip. In April the art department sponsored its first annual exchange art show with the students of Franklin High School . . . "

Business Dept.—" . . . It is the objective of the business department to train each business student with a saleable skill upon completion of their high school education. The department encourages students to elect courses which will satisfy their immediate needs and vocational aims . . . "

English Dept.—" . . . We have encouraged a Summer Reading Program, expanding this year's program with a greater variety of selections offered to each grade. Because of the increase in the num-

ber of the college preparatory pupils, we anticipate that the 1966 Summer Program will have the largest number of students participating since this project was inaugurated. We have raised the standard for successful college preparatory achievement, and introduced new and sequential writing assignments while relating composition to literature. Creative writing has been emphasized, in association with the study of literature and composition . . . ”

Foreign Language—“ . . . Students who seem particularly gifted in language ability are encouraged to study two foreign languages. In French I, II and III classes and Spanish I classes the program has been completely reorganized along the lines of the audio-lingual approach.

The culture of the people whose language is being studied is made more vivid by filmstrips, selected readings, records, bulletin board displays and other realia . . . ”

Home Economics—“ . . . Job opportunities for the girl with training in foods, clothing and child care fields, are increasing rapidly. Money management and proper use of time and energy are becoming more important in today’s world where homemakers are more than mere cooks . . . ”

Industrial Arts—“ . . . A future development in mechanical drawing will be the introduction of a course in engineering drawing designed to equip a boy for college and advanced drafting work . . . ”

Mathematics Dept.—“ . . . The program initiated for the accelerated students has been placed in full operation with the introduction this year of a course in Analytic Geometry and introduction to Calculus in grade twelve . . . ”

Music Dept.—“ . . . During the past year, the music program as a whole has progressed considerably. The King Philip Band, during the football season presented a variety of shows during the half-time period. The members of the band gave up many after school hours preparing for these events . . . ”

Reading—“ . . . Our program coincides with the higher level authoritative thinking for we have reading classes at all grade levels for as many students as space and scheduling will allow. Present plans call for the institution in September 1966 of a corrective-remedial program in addition to the present developmental program . . . ”

Science Dept.—“ . . . During monthly meetings, gaps and weaknesses in the program were recognized as the needs of the students changed. Most of the meetings were also devoted to studying and collecting information concerning new programs including all versions

of the Biological Sciences, Curricula Study, the Earth Science Curriculum Project, Chemistry study and C.B.A. Chemistry, the Harvard Physics Project, and Introductory Physical Science Program of E.S.I. . . . ”

Social Studies Dept.—“ . . . King Philip students participated again in the Annual Hockomock League Forum. Students attended conferences held by the World Affairs Council of Boston. The department has been expanded and the curriculum revised to meet the growing needs of the individual citizen.”

The school nurse, Miss Margaret Keady, has worked diligently on what I consider is an excellent school health program. In addition to her numerous duties she has worked as an advisor to the Future Nurses Club. We are proud of the work of this group at the Wrentham State School and at Pondville Hospital.

Once again this year King Philip participated in the Boston University Graduate School of Dentistry toothpaste project under the direction of Dr. Spencer N. Frankl and Miss Patricia Fowler, Dental Hygienist. Well over 300 students participated in a program that has definitely improved the dental health of these students.

Speech therapy under the direction of Mrs. Mary L. Voegtlin was continued this year. Many youngsters have been cured while others are well on the way to recovery from a variety of speech defects as a result of this program. We are pleased to be able to offer this beneficial program to the citizens of the region.

Our school secretaries, and clerks, contribute a tremendous service to our school with their untiring efforts. Their's is the mammoth task of being receptionists, completing local and state records, assisting in the clerical aspects of scheduling, preparing numerous reports, keeping the registers, assisting the teachers and a multitude of other tasks too numerous to mention.

I have been very much pleased with the loyalty and devotion to duty of all members of the school staff. The complete cooperation of everyone is essential if a school is to function as a cohesive unit and successfully complete its assigned educational tasks.

A special vote of praise to my assistant, Mr. Walter White, and to Mr. Francis O'Regan, the director of guidance. Both of these gentlemen have worked untiringly during the past year, giving freely of many hundreds of hours of their time in an effort to make the King Philip Regional School the best school in the Commonwealth.

My sincere thanks to the members of the regional school committee, to Mr. David Eaton, Superintendent of the Regional School District and to the staff of the King Philip Regional School.

**YEARLY REPORT KING PHILIP REGIONAL VOCATIONAL
HIGH SCHOOL — 1965**

The King Philip Regional Vocational High School graduated seven students in June of 1965. There were three from the machine shop and four from the carpentry shop. All graduates were employed or in the armed service before or immediately after graduating.

There were eighty students enrolled as of October 1, 1965. Forty-eight students in a doubled carpentry division and thirty-two in a single division in machine shop training.

The doubled carpentry division allows the first and second year students to receive training in shop carpentry and mill work while the third and fourth year students are being taught house carpentry out on the job in conjunction with our building program.

On June 20, 1965, an open house was held at the site of the fifth new home constructed by the carpentry division. Again, as before, there was keen interest shown by all those who made a visit to inspect the work done by the students. Again there were favorable comments received in regard to this type of an educational program and on the fine quality of workmanship displayed. The students are now well under way in the construction of their sixth new home in the region.

The carpentry students in the shop continue to gain valuable trade knowledge by completing many jobs throughout the school year. These jobs are done for schools, municipal departments, churches, charitable organizations, students, teachers, and anyone interested in having work of suitable instructional value done by the students.

The machine shop department works in a similar manner by doing jobs adapted to the machine trade. Besides doing work for other departments, the students turn out many different machine shop tools during their four year program. For training purposes each of the tool projects are assigned to them in order of difficulty so that they advance from the simple to the more complex. The tool that is made by the students belong to them for the cost of materials involved, and by the time they graduate they will have obtained a sizable number of machinist's tools.

A glassed-in enclosure was installed in the machine shop by the carpentry division and is being used as an inspection and testing center. Included in the testing equipment is an optical comparator that measures machine tools to extremely close tolerances.

Because of the Vocational Education Act of 1963, the school has received this year over \$16,000 worth of new equipment. The machine shop has a new surface grinder, a turret milling machine, and a Cincinnati V.H. milling machine. The regional district also purchased a new geared-head lathe for the machine shop.

The carpentry shop received a Delta 10 inch uni saw, a belt finishing machine and a long bed 6 inch Delta jointer.

A Blu-ray whiteprinter was part of the list of new equipment received. This makes it possible for the related classroom students to develop their drawings into prints.

The vocational school is now taking part in a work study program. A sum of money has been allocated to the district to be used to pay needy students for part time work while they are attending school. The student is allowed to make up to \$45.00 per month or \$350.00 per school year.

Beginning the first of the year we expect to be established in a part-time cooperative program. The program will be in conjunction with a toolmaking company and our machine shop division. Students accepted in this program would receive the shop training on alternate weeks in the tool room of the industrial plant instead of the school shop. They would be on the payroll while receiving their training. This might ultimately lead to a well paid, full time job with the company after graduating.

The Norfolk-Bristol County Regional Vocational Technical School state survey has been completed. There have been several meetings with superintendents, school board members and state department representatives. If the people in the towns are interested in learning more about the advantages of having a large regional vocational technical school then they will authorize a planning committee to be appointed at the March town meeting. A planning committee would consist of three members from each town that would work together as a group compiling all the information needed so that it could be presented to the voters.

As in the past, we at the King Philip Regional Vocational High School will continue to serve the needs of the youth of the region to the best of our ability.

ANNUAL REPORT OF DIRECTOR OF GUIDANCE — 1965

The variety and number of guidance services provided to students, parents, teachers, administrators, and community were vastly expanded during the past year.

Some of the more significant activities and changes handled by the Guidance Department are described in the following report.

Cumulative Record

The record procedure was revised with the prime objectives of continuity, clarity, and conciseness. A system was devised whereby two cards will contain all pertinent information about a student from the time he or she enters Grade 7 until they are graduated. These forms will bring together in one central file all information about the individual. The record forms contain personal history, achievement, attendance, test data, interests, activities, honors, anecdotal information, and follow-up information. This work is now in progress and thus far the records of students in Grades 7 through 10 have been revised and brought up to date.

In recent months, the Director of Guidance and the Elementary School Principals of the three communities have held meetings to revise the record systems that are currently in use. The cooperation and assistance extended by the principals has been invaluable and it is hoped that a revision of the elementary record will be completed in the near future.

Testing Program

The school district is involved in a comprehensive testing program, with the primary emphasis placed on the assessment of the student's strengths and weaknesses. During the past twelve months the students have been given the results of these tests. Numerous meetings have been conducted with students in all grade levels so that they may thoroughly understand the test results. In addition, a representative of the Science Research Associates presented an informational program for the faculty and parents in November, concerning the Iowa Test of Educational Development which was administered to the students in Grades 10 and 11.

Summer Work Program

This past summer, the members of the Guidance Department had an opportunity to review and re-check the student program elections for the school year. Considerable time was spent on each student's record, insuring that each had the proper background for the course that was selected. In many instances remedial work was recommended in order that individuals could proceed with their desired course of study.

Concomitantly, the members of the Guidance Department worked at length with the Principal and Assistant Principal in the development of the schedule for the current school year.

The single most important aspect of the Summer Work Program was the availability of trained counselors for parents of students new to the region and, also, to the students currently at the regional high school. The educational and occupational reference library was available and was utilized by many students during the summer.

Occupational and Educational Conferences

Approximately thirty-five (35) institutions of higher learning have met with the guidance staff and students during the past year. In addition, numerous personnel officers have visited the school, thus enabling wider contact for terminal students with the world of work.

The Career Forum, sponsored by Northeastern University, provided fifteen (15) guest speakers on a wide variety of subjects. The areas covered are selected during the previous school year by a panel of guidance people, in order to obtain comprehensive coverage and develop the areas which appear to be of interest. The Career Forum was expanded this year to include Grade 8 students so that they will have an opportunity to obtain occupational information prior to the time that they must designate their high school course.

Monthly Bulletins

The Guidance Department provided each senior with a bulletin of information prior to his or her entrance into the senior year. In order to supplement this information, a monthly bulletin is distributed to all juniors, seniors and faculty members. The bulletin covers such information as representatives visiting the high school, important test dates, informational meetings, scholarship meetings, job opportunities, and new educational programs.

This bulletin is also distributed to the five newspapers serving the regional district, in order that the parents may also be kept informed.

Bulletins of information of immediate interest, such as meetings on course elections, are distributed to the parents through the students.

Counselor Assignments

The practice of assigning each student to a counselor who would continue as that child's counselor for the four-year high school period has been continued. However, at the junior high school level, it was necessary this year to assign all in-coming Grade 7 students to Mr. Stanley Hamilton so that there would be continuity of counselor assignments when the new junior high school opens.

Guidance Library

The educational and occupational library has been completely updated during the past year. There is now available to the students and parents a comprehensive file of information on institutions of higher learning at all levels. The occupational library has been expanded to include the Chronicle Guidance Service, which provides the counselors with a monthly revision. This same service provides an annual revision of college information.

Part-Time Job Placement

At the beginning of the current school year, a part-time job placement service was initiated. Forms were made available to the students which, when completed, provided the director with an immediate list of students interested in part-time employment. The major gain from this procedure was very rapid placement of students in after-school work situations. The response from local business establishments has been steadily increasing in the past four months. A secondary result of this program has been the establishment of contacts with local business men which will hopefully lead to employment opportunities for the terminal student.

Research Reports

Many research studies have been conducted during the past year, in cooperation with the Superintendent's and Principal's Offices. Two of the most note-worthy for the region are the Drop-out Study and the Follow-up Study of the Class of 1964.

Parent Conferences

Evening Parent Conferences were initiated during the time of student course elections in the Spring of 1965. The conferences were expanded in the Fall of 1965 to the first and third Wednesday evenings of each month. The primary aim of these conferences is to provide the parent with every opportunity to consult with their child's counselor concerning individual achievement, aptitude, ability, interests, skills, attitude, effort, and school adjustment.

Transcripts

A system of accounting was established during the past year whereby receipt cards are mailed to the colleges with the transcripts. This procedure enables the high school to be sure that the transcript has been received by the institution of higher learning. It also provides an assurance to the student and parent that the transcripts have been properly processed.

The most recent survey conducted by the Department of Education indicated that the Commonwealth's secondary schools hold 97.4% of the students through graduation, with a drop-out rate of 2.6%. These figures place Massachusetts among the nation's highest ranking states in holding power. Local statistics indicate that, for the period of October 1, 1964 to October 1, 1965, the King Philip Regional School District had a drop-out rate of 1.9%, with 98.1% of the school population remaining in school.

ADULT EDUCATION YEARLY REPORT — 1965

This year there are twenty-six different evening classes being conducted with a total enrollment of well over 300 adults.

The evening classes are divided into four categories and each includes the following courses:

1. Vocational Evening Trade Extension: These courses are for those who are employed at the trade but wish to learn more about it and become more proficient. The courses being held are machine shop practice, which is held for 120 hours; and machine shop blueprint reading and math, which is held for 80 hours.
2. Vocational Practical Arts: These courses are designed to help people in home making and a more satisfying use of leisure time. Classes being held are in beginning and advanced sewing, rug braiding, knitting, rug hooking; tailoring, decorative painting, floral craft and decorations. All the practical arts classes are in session for 60 hours.
3. Vocational Apprenticeship Carpentry: This course offers classroom instruction in related math, blueprint reading, estimating, architectural drafting, house framing, and trade science. This course is for men who are serving an apprenticeship or learning the trade. It is held for 150 hours each year and the complete course is for four years.
4. Academic Classes: The classes being held this year are in typing I and II, bookkeeping, contemporary art, psychology, algebra I and II, English, woodworking, securities and invest-

ing, and income tax returns. All of the academic classes are in session for 40 clock hours except woodworking, securities and investing, and income tax returns. The securities and investing and income tax returns courses are in session for 20 hours each. The woodworking course is in session for 30 hours.

Several of the academic courses are offering credits that are acceptable to the State Department of Education, Division of University Extension, and may be applied toward a state high school diploma.

The King Philip Regional District will continue to promote education not only for the young people but also for the adults who desire to continue their education.

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money in anticipation of the revenue for the financial years beginning January 1, 1966 and January 1, 1967, in accordance with provisions of General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 4, and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year, in accordance with the provisions of General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 17, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from Water Revenue a sum of money for Water Department Maintenance, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury, a sum of money from the Machinery Fund to the Machinery Maintenance Account, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 7. To see if the Town will appropriate from Surplus Revenue the amounts of the State and County share on Chapter 81 and Chapter 90 projects with a proviso that the sums received from State and County are credited back to Surplus Revenue upon receipt, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury, a sum of money to install and maintain the following street lights, or take any other action in relation thereto:

Pole #14/45, Main Street

Pole #14/84, Main Street

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to add to Article III of the Town By-Laws the following: Section 11—A committee to be known as the Capital Outlay Committee shall be established, composed of two (2) members of the Town Finance Committee appointed by and from it, one member of the Planning Board appointed by and from it and four (4) additional members to be appointed by the Selectmen. One member from the Finance Committee and two at large shall be appointed for one year terms. The other appointees and all replacements shall be appointed for two years and in the manner of the original appointments. The committee shall annually prepare a Capital Budget Program for use by the Finance Committee, the voters, other town boards and officials in their deliberations. The committee shall publish such report or a summary thereof in a suitable manner and deposit the original with the Town Clerk.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury, a sum of money for the recreation program for the physically and mentally handicapped under the direction of the Recreation Commission, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury, a sum of money for the Norfolk Guidance Center, Norwood, Mass., or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury, a sum of money to be added to the Stabilization Fund under the authority of Section 5B of Chapter 40, General Laws, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to accept Sections 42G-42I inclusive of Chapter 40 of the General Laws, pertaining to special assessments to meet cost of laying water pipes in certain ways, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to levy special assessments to meet the whole or part of the cost thereafter incurred of laying pipes in public or private ways for the conveyance or distribution of water to its inhabitants to be paid and assessed upon the owners of land which receives benefit therefrom and determine which of the methods authorized by the applicable provisions of the General Laws for the apportioning the cost thereof shall be used, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury or raise by bond issue a sum of money for the construction of pumping station located on land now owned by the Town, including wells, pipes, original pumping station equipment, roadway and water mains of not less than six (6") inches in diameter, but less than sixteen (16") inches in diameter, to make a connection to Medway Street, and determine whether the money shall be provided for by borrowing under authority of Chapter 44 of the General Laws or otherwise, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury or raise by bond issue, and determine whether the money shall be provided for by borrowing under authority of Chapter 44 of the General Laws or otherwise, a sum of money for the purpose of acquiring, either by purchase or by taking by right of eminent domain, land consisting of approximately one acre, situated on the high ground, whose elevation is approximately 300 feet above mean sea level, being the highest point on the hill located approximately 1250 feet south of Main Street and 1200 feet west of Union Street in the Town of Norfolk, together with a 40 foot right-of-way connecting with Union Street, for the purpose of constructing a stand pipe or reservoir of 1,000,000 gallons minimum capacity; to construct said tank, the necessary water main connecting to existing mains of not less than six (6") inches, but less than sixteen (16") inches in diameter, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury or raise by bond issue, and determine whether the money shall be provided for by borrowing under authority of Chapter 44 of the

General Laws or otherwise, a sum of money for the purpose of laying water mains of not less than six (6") inches in diameter, but less than sixteen (16") inches in diameter, from the point on Medway Street where the connection is made to the well field, on Medway Street, Main Street, and Union Street, a distance of 1.9 miles to make a connection with the new standpipe, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury, a sum of money for the purpose of installing a meter pit at the intersection of Shear and North Streets to make a connection with the Mass. Dept. of Mental Health (Wrentham State School) and the present Town of Norfolk water system, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury or raise by bond issue, and determine whether the money shall be provided for by borrowing under authority of Chapter 44 of the General Laws or otherwise, a sum of money for the purpose of laying water mains of not less than six (6") inches in diameter, but less than sixteen (16") inches in diameter, from Union and North Street intersection near the Center of Norfolk along Union Street to the end of the existing main on Union Street, a distance of 1.5 miles to a location in front of the Roy Carlson residence, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury or raise by bond issue, and determine whether the money shall be provided for by borrowing under authority of Chapter 44 of the General Laws or otherwise a sum of money for the purpose of laying water mains of not less than six (6") inches in diameter, but less than sixteen (16") inches in diameter, from the Franklin line on Miller Street, on Kingsbury Road, Leland Road, Priscilla Avenue, River Road and Lake Shore Drive, a distance of 3.7 miles on the condition the Town of Franklin will agree to sell water to the Town of Norfolk, and to construct a meter pit at the Franklin, Norfolk line on Miller Street, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury, a sum of money for the purpose of installing a water hydrant in the rear of the Central School to be used at the athletic fields, and to install 900 feet of 6" main from Boardman Street to said hydrant, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to accept as a public way "Ferndale Avenue", a distance of 750 feet and "Fleetwood Drive", a distance of 1000 feet more or less, as laid out by the Board of Selectmen in accordance with the plan by McIntyre & Johnston, Inc., October 9, 1961, a copy of which is on file with the Town Clerk, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury, a sum of money to purchase and equip a fire truck to be used by the Fire Department and grant the Board of Selectmen permission to trade or sell a 1950 Ford fire truck designated as Engine IV, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury, a sum of money to purchase a new truck for the highway department, and to grant the Board of Selectmen the right to trade or otherwise dispose of one 1951 Dodge truck, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury, a sum of money to purchase a new police cruiser and to grant the Board of Selectmen the right to trade or otherwise dispose of the present police cruiser, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to transfer a sum of money received or to be received from the Commonwealth under the provisions of Chapter 679 of the Acts of 1965, said transfer being for the purpose of making repairs to King Street as approved by the State Department of Public Works, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury, a sum of money in order to complete payment for the construction of the Norfolk Recreation Pond, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated funds in the Treasury, a sum of money for the construction of a bath house with proper leach bed, make roadway and parking area and stockpile loam, construct rafts and diving board, benches, purchase necessary safety equipment, maintain the area and provide life guards for the season, at the new swimming pond, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 29. To see if the Town will vote to create a special unpaid committee to be known as a Vocational Regional School District Planning Committee to consist of three members to be appointed by the moderator, including one member of the School Committee, in accordance with the provisions of Sec. 14 of Chapter 71 of the General Laws as amended and that there be appropriated a sum of money for the use of said committee, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 30. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury or raise by bond issue, a sum of money for the purpose of renovating the old Fire Station for a Town Office Building, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 31. To see if the Town will vote to change the term of office of the Tree Warden from one year to three years, to take effect at the next annual election, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 32. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury, a sum of money for the purpose of appraising real estate for assessment purposes and authorize the Board of Assessors to contract for said appraisal for a period not exceeding three years, in accordance with the provisions of Section 4 of Chapter 40 of the General Laws, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 33. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury, a sum of money for the construction of a sidewalk on Rockwood Road from the Center of Norfolk to Boardman Street, a distance of approximately 1500 feet, said construction to be under the direction of the Highway Department, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 34. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury, a sum of money to purchase speed signs on Union and North Streets, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 35. To see if the Town will vote to delete from the by-law adopted at the adjourned town meeting held on March 16, 1964, Article 13 in the warrant for said meeting the words "Section 19" and insert in place thereof the words "Section 21" or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 36. To see if the Town will vote to delete from the by-law adopted at a special town meeting on June 23, 1965 under Article 2 in the warrant for said meeting the words "Section 19" and insert in place thereof the words "Section 22" or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 37. To see if the Town will vote to rescind unissued portions of bond issues as follows:

Article 38. To see if the Town will vote to accept as a public way "King Philip Trail", a distance of 912.51 feet easterly from Seekonk Street as laid out by the Board of Selectmen in accordance with the plans #1307 of 1960, Plan Book 210 and Plan #590 of 1961, Book 3900, Page 300 filed in the Norfolk Registry of Deeds, Dedham, Mass., copy of which is on file with the Town Clerk, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 39. To see if the Town will vote to transfer a sum of money from Surplus Revenue to decrease the Tax Rate.

Article 40. To see if the Town will choose any Committee or to hear or act on the report of any Committee or Town Officer or to instruct any committee or Town Officer.





TO ALL HOMEOWNERS:

We have been asked questions regarding what does and does not add to the value of property—that is, what does and does not increase assessments. It is the policy of this board to encourage the homeowner to:

- Protect his home.
- Improve his neighborhood.
- Preserve his property.
- Beautify the town.

The following normal maintenance or repair jobs may be done without increasing assessments:

- Painting outside and inside.
- Wire modernization.
- New fences.
- Lawns and landscaping.
- New furnace replacing worn-out furnace of same kind.
- Adding closets and other built-ins.
- Adding awnings.
- Replacing plumbing and light fixtures (if not part of complete modernization).
- New ceilings.
- New wall surfacing.
- *Removing delapidated buildings.

Adding underground shelters (if Civil Defense approved).
Asphalt, asbestos or aluminum siding placed over existing siding
(up to \$1,000).

New roof.

Repairing and replacing porches and steps.

Storm windows and storm doors.

Repairing or replacing sidewalks or drives.

*Removing unused porches.

Paving parking area (up to 500 sf).

Adding built-in vent fans.

Window blinds.

Flower boxes.

Adding or replacing gutter downspouts.

Replacing kitchen cabinets, cupboards and counters.

*Probably a reduction in assessment.

It is the policy of the Norfolk Board of Assessors to encourage improvements as described above—without an increase in assessed valuation. While items listed above fall within the scope of normal maintenance and repairs, the policy of no assessment increase cannot apply when major items on this list are grouped so that the total changes in property result in a substantial increase in the value of that property.

You may want to make more extensive improvements even though they may result in an increase in your assessment. The following improvements could bring a higher assessment:

Changing from a single-family to multiple family use—(See Building Inspector for regulations).

Adding new basement area.

Adding rumpus room.

Finishing new rooms in attic.

Enlarging present building.

Modernizing completely.

Replacing a stove or hot air gravity system with a forced air, automatic system.

Adding extra bedroom, bathroom, fireplace or porch.

Homeowners are encouraged to inquire of the board (prior to the undertaking of an improvement project)—if there is any question as to a change in assessed valuation.

Meetings are held each Wednesday, 8:00 P.M. to 9:30 P.M. at the Selectmen's Office (except the night before Thanksgiving). During June, July, and August, the Board meets on the 2nd and 4th Wednesday.

GLOSSARY

CHAPTER 81. This is a statute law of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts and pertains to the construction and maintenance of all roads. The state contributes a certain amount per mile and the town makes up the balance.

CHAPTER 90. This is a statute law of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts and pertains to the construction and maintenance of through roads, leading from one town to another. The state contributes 50%, and the town 25% and the county 25% of the cost.

OVERLAY. The Overlay is the amount raised by the assessors in excess of appropriations and other charges for the purpose of creating a fund to cover abatements granted and avoiding fractions. Any balance in the Overlay account of a given year in excess of the amount of taxes for such year not collected or abated is transferred to Overlay Reserve.

OVERLAY RESERVE. This is the accumulated amount of the Overlay for various years not used or required to be held in the specific Overlay account for a given year and may be used by vote of the town for extraordinary or unforeseen purposes.

RESERVE FUND. This fund may be established by the voters at an ANNUAL TOWN MEETING only and may be composed of (a) an appropriation (not exceeding 5% of the tax levy of the preceding year), (b) money transferred from Overlay Reserve, or (c) of both.

Any unexpired balance thereof at the end of the year is closed out to the surplus revenue (E & D) except however that from such balance there shall first be deducted and credited back to overlay reserve, to the extent possible, a sum equal to the amount if any which was appropriated from it to the reserve fund.

Transfers from the Reserve Fund are within the exclusive control of the Finance Committee.

SURPLUS REVENUE. (Generally referred to as Excess and Deficiency, though that phrase nowhere appears in the statutes.) This fund represents the amount by which Cash, Accounts Receivable and other floating assets exceed the liabilities and reserves. This amount of the Excess and Deficiency account over and above uncollected taxes of prior years constitutes "Free Cash" or "Available Funds."

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PLEASE NOTE CAREFULLY

The Town of Norfolk adopted "Zoning By-Laws" in 1946. They were amended in 1953, 1954, 1955, 1956, 1958 and 1962.

Sewage construction applications are to be approved by a registered sanitary engineer, the Building Inspector and the Board of Health before Building Permits can be issued.

Some of the important sections of "Zoning By-Laws" are as follows:

1. A "Building Permit" is required from the Building Inspector, Douglas C. Brown, Cleveland St., Norfolk, Mass. for any building erected, altered, rebuilt, remodeled or moved.

2. Lot size shall be a minimum of 30,000 sq. ft. with 150 ft. frontage.

3. Set back of a building in a residential area shall be at least 50 ft. from the street, right of way or county taking. No building may be erected closer than 25 ft. from the side lines of a lot.

4. Only one family dwellings are permitted unless a variance is granted by Board of Appeals.

5. Be sure to get a copy of the "Zoning By-Laws" before you start any construction or excavation. This may be obtained from the Building Inspector.
